New York, Jan. 4.—Mrs. Julio SangUILLY, wife of the Cuban general who was yesterday in Havana on board of the steamer Sartoro, said today that her husband was not on his way to rejoin the insurgents in Cuba, but was suffering from rheumatism and was on his way to Mexico in hope of finding relief there.

FRANCE CLAIMS THE ISLAND. Clipperton Has a New Claimant Alleging Uncontested Ownership. Paris, Jan. 4.—The Liberte asserts that Clipperton island, over which the Mexican flag is reported to have been hoisted by a party of marines from the gunboat Democrite, after the stars and stripes had been hauled down, in spite of the protest of the Americans there, really belongs to France.

WED TO A HINDOO

ENGLISH EARL'S DAUGHTER THE BRIDE OF A SWARTHY PRINCE.

Course of True Love, or Whatever Answered the Purpose of That Tender Emotion, Made to Run Smooth by Means of the Intervention of the Prince of Wales—German Count Makes a Countess of a Handsome Washington Widow—Marriage of a Chicago Minister—Igata Fatuus Donnelly Next.

London, Jan. 4.—Lady Anne Coventry, third daughter of the Earl of Coventry, was married this afternoon at St. Peter's church, Eaton Square, to Prince Dhuop Singh, son of the late Maharajah of Lahore. The courtship of the prince and Lady Anne has been marked by considerable opposition upon the part of the lady's family, which was mainly overcome by the intervention of the Prince of Wales.

There was a large and distinguished company present at the church. Decorations were elaborate. The Earl of Coventry gave away his daughter. The bridesmaids were Lady Dorothy Coventry, sister of the bride; the Princess Sophie, Bannan Dhuop Singh, Miss Brenda Van De Weyer, Lady Victoria Herbert and Miss Elsie Campbell.

Prince Frederick Dhuop Singh was the best man. The service was choral. After the wedding there was a reception at the Earl of Coventry's house on Park lane. The presents were costly. The queen sent a bronze statuette of herself. Prince Victor Albert Jay Dhuop Singh, who is 25 years of age, is the grandson of that East Indian prince whose struggle against the British earned for him the title of the "Lion of the Punjab."

Prince Dhuop Singh was educated in England and was for a time on the staff of General Sir John Ross, K. C. B., when the latter was in command of the British forces in Canada. The prince became quite prominent at Halifax and visited New York, Newport and Lenox. Lady Anne Coventry is the third daughter of the ninth Earl of Coventry. She was born in 1874. Her brother, Viscount Deobust, married Miss Virginia Bonying, formerly of California, and her first cousin, the Earl of Craven, married Cornelia, daughter of Bradley-Martin of New York.

ELECTIONS IN THE TRANSVAAL.

Oom Paul's Party Contributing to Split the Opposition Vote. Johannesburg, Transvaal, Jan. 4.—The voting in the presidential election commenced yesterday. The candidates are Messrs. Kruger, Joubert and Schalkburger. The latter's candidacy appears to be intended to split Joubert's vote and secure the re-election of President Kruger. Joubert accuses Schalkburger of breaking his engagement not to run. He declares that if President Kruger is elected he (Joubert) will continue in office as commandant general; but if Schalkburger is elected he will forthwith resign that post.

NOTED BASEBALLIST DIES.

Charles H. Byrne, One of the Real Found of the National Game. New York, Jan. 4.—Charles H. Byrne, who was president of the Brooklyn baseball club, died at his residence in this city today. Death was due to a complication of diseases. Mr. Byrne had been unaccountably sick of late week and death had been expected.

NEW YORK LEGISLATURE.

Caucus for the Organization of the House Are Held. Albany, N. Y., Jan. 4.—The Republican members of the assembly held a caucus today, 77 members being present, and unanimously nominated Speaker J. E. Grady. The caucus committee will be elected by the assembly. The Democrats of the assembly held a caucus and nominated a ticket headed by Thomas F. Donnelly, who will be the leader of the minority in the assembly.

SHOT LIKE BEASTS

FEW HUNDRED AFRICAN NATIVES MORE OR LESS DON'T COUNT.

Letter Received in France From a Member of the Marchand Expedition Relates the Imprisonment of Natives to Serve as Guards or Bearers, and How, When They Run Away They are Shot Like Jackrabbits—Villages Burned to Attract Their Fugitive Inhabitants Back Within Ditching Distance.

Paris, Jan. 4.—A letter from an officer of the Marchand expedition (which, according to the Authentic news received here yesterday, had arrived at Rafal, in the Tamboura district of the Nile basin, on September 17, and was proceeding to occupy Rumbek, in the Territory of Bah-el-Ghazal) published in a newspaper of Toulouse, says the French forces consist of twenty-four white men and 500 Senegalese riflemen. Describing the hardships endured, the writer says: "The native carriers give much trouble. We seized them forcibly and they attempted to escape at every opportunity. We vainly shot or hanged those who were captured, but others continued to escape. Many were recaptured, but several succeeded in getting away. We were obliged to enter the villages with a few riflemen and seize all the men and women found therein. Sometimes the whole population fled. Then we burned a few huts, which generally induced the natives to return. We then seized the chief and compelled him to give us the slaves to carry our loads. This is the only way to deal with these brutes, whom we have seen quarrel over their shot comrades for a food."

REGARDING A CHINESE LOAN

Important Negotiation Said to be Proceeding in London. Peking, Jan. 4.—The ministers and the Tsung Li Yamen (Chinese foreign office) spent the whole of one night in discussing the deposition of the Chinese commandant of Tsao Chou, province of Shan Tung, who is accused of having used threatening language to a German missionary. The commandant has not been summoned to Peking for examination, as previously cabled, the difficulty having been smoothed over. The general situation remains unchanged. Hostilities are feared. The German minister, Baron von Heyking, is understood to be temporizing until the arrival in China of Prince Henry of Prussia.

London, Jan. 4.—There is good reason to believe that the British government is considering the question of assisting China to raise a loan. The Chinese proposals on the subject are urgently supported by the business men here who are interested in China. The Evening News says it is reported in the city that negotiations for a Chinese loan of \$10,000,000, guaranteed by the British government, are practically concluded.

Berlin, Jan. 4.—The oblige Gazette, an authority from the best informed quarters in Paris, announces today that since Thursday last important negotiations have been proceeding in London for a Chinese loan, the attempt made in Paris and St. Petersburg to arrange a loan having failed. China thereupon offered to contract a loan for \$10,000,000 in London, at the same time asking the good offices of the British government. China, it appears, contemplates offering as security the land tax, under the control of Englishmen, and that, furthermore, an Englishman shall succeed Sir Robert Hart as director of the Chinese imperial maritime customs. In addition Great Britain will insist upon a concession of territory, relative to which secrecy, according to the informant of the oblige Gazette, must be temporarily observed. The Cologne Gazette adds that it is understood that Russia has renewed her offer to China, to conclude a loan in Germany on more favorable terms than obtainable in Paris or London.

Hong Kong, Jan. 4.—The British cruiser Edgar has arrived here and the British cruiser Grafion has sailed northward. The bulk of the British fleet is reported to be at Chusan, near Ning Po. Berlin, Jan. 4.—Captain Rosenthal, commander of the German warship Frederich Karl, has been appointed commander of the German forces ashore at Kiao-Chau Bay.

Rome, Jan. 4.—It appears that Monsignor Amer, bishop of the province of Shan Tung, China, in his recent visit to the pope, not only discussed the developments in China, but had an unofficial mission from Emperor William to enlist the aid of the pope on behalf of the naval bill, and it is affirmed that the pope, while refusing to intervene directly in German politics, promised to use his influence indirectly with the pope in support of the naval bill, having in view the interests of German Catholics in China.
