FOURTEEN TONS OF FLOUR AND SUPPLIES

Shipped Yesterday From Wichita to Cuba.

That the hearts of the American people are in sympathy with the sufferers in Cuba is manifest from the cars of supplies shipped out of Wichita yesterday.

For some time past a Cuban relief fund, of which Colonel H. G. Tozier is manager, has been receiving contributions of flour from all over the seventh congressional district.

Yesterday the grand total amounted to over fourteen tons of flour, donated by various cities in southern Kansas, which Col. Tozier shipped yesterday via the Frisco railway for New Orleans.

From New Orleans the flour goes direct to the Joint Traffic association of St. Louis, Mo., which will transport the flour through the Morgan Line steaming company to New Orleans.

This shows the kindly interest people generally are taking in a worthy cause, and by each helping a little a vast amount of good is being done in this direction.

The public is slow to realize how terrible is the condition of famine-stricken Cuba, and if all the cities would respond to the call of need as readily as those who have, untold want would be relieved.

TWO SUCCESSFUL OPENINGS

Wichita Republicans are getting enthusiastic over the candidacy of W. E. Stanley for governor. Dr. W. A. Minick, who attended the meeting of the congressional committee at Hutchinson, says that the sentiment was very pronounced for Mr. Stanley and that inquiries were numerous if a Stanley club had been formed here. Jno. Adams, after his return from a recent trip to Topeka, said that he met a number of gentlemen from Hesse's district and they reported sentiment there to be strong for Stanley for second choice. Sumner county is for Stanley while Harvey and McPherson counties are scarcely less enthusiastic for Wichita's candidate than Sedgewick county. Mort Albaugh of the Kingman Leader-Courier, came out with strong talk for Stanley. Harper and Barber counties have already spoken favorably for the Wichita man. Republicans here have recognized that there is a necessity for a Stanley club and after discussing the matter thoroughly have issued a call for a mass meeting to be held in Peerless Hall, Wednesday night. The call is not issued by any particular person, but is a request from Republicans. It reads: "Recognizing the importance of organized effort in a political campaign and in order to make the most of the general enthusiasm of Republicans in southwest Kansas for W. E. Stanley for governor of Kansas, a meeting of all Republicans is hereby called to meet in Peerless Hall on Wednesday evening at 7:30 p. m. for the purpose of organizing a Stanley club." A Republican club of one thousand members can be organized and the Stanley boom can be rolled over all the others in the state. The calling of the state convention for Hutchinson is regarded as another and substantial tip to Stanley. Wichita can send 500 people to the convention to whop up the Stanley fight and Republicans are ready to go.
