

CONCESSION TO SELL

Albert Hoff's Attorneys Appear in the Market

ASKING TWO THOUSAND

For the Alleged Story of Mrs. Clute's Murder.

San Francisco, March 14.—The Examiner says that a remarkable incident has developed in the case of Albert Hoff, the aged Russian who is now on trial for the murder of Mrs. Mary Clute. Two attorneys of this city, Benjamin W. McIntosh and Edgar B. Hayward, are trying to sell an alleged confession of the man who is on trial for his life.

The lawyers insist that they are acting as agents for Hoff. They declare that the prisoner will take nothing less than \$2,000 for his self-confession. The confession, it is represented, was made to McIntosh, who is now defending Hoff in court. It is characterized as an unqualified, holographic confession of not more than three hundred words, of the murder of Mrs. Clute.

Albert denies with all the vehemence he can command that he has ever made a confession or ever intends to do so.

NEW MILITARY DEPARTMENTS

Two New Ones Constituted and Old Ones Changed Name.

Washington, March 12.—The war department today promulgated its order creating the departments of the gulf and the department of the east. The department of the Missouri and Texas, the department of the east will embrace the states on the Atlantic coast to and including North Carolina. The department of the lakes will include Wisconsin, Michigan, Illinois, Indiana, Ohio, Kentucky and Tennessee, with headquarters at Chicago. The department of the gulf will comprise the states of South Carolina, Georgia, Florida, Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana and Texas, with headquarters at Atlanta.

General Brooke will command the department of the lakes and General Brigham the department of the gulf.

The war department is making efforts to execute the changes in the great military departments announced in the order with such reference was made yesterday. The important change by the order was the creation of new departments of the gulf by the combination of the old department of Texas with the southern portion of the department of the Pacific. The other changes made were in the direction of rectifying the lines of the central-western departments so as to make them more symmetrical and easily accessible in all portions from their respective central headquarters. For this reason the state of Ohio, for many years attached to the department of the east, has been thrown into the department of Missouri, which now rejoices in the new name of the department of the lakes. The change of name is for purely sentimental reasons.

The western states included in the department of the Dakotas have been transferred to the department of the Pacific, while to maintain the present proportions of his department the northern section has been drawn into the department of Dakota. No changes have been made in the department of the Columbia, the department of California or the department of the Colorado.

General Graham telegraphed the war department today he would go to Atlanta on Monday next to establish his headquarters there.

Heretofore there had been only one military center along the Atlantic, namely that at New York, but the present condition of affairs made it appear that a military standpoint it was desirable to have another military center. Accordingly, that heretofore known as the department of the Texas has been moved eastward and centered at Atlanta. The same commander, Brigadier General Graham, will be in command at Atlanta as had previously been in command of the department of the Texas.

The text of the war department order establishing the new department of the gulf and making other changes is as follows: General order No. 7.—Headquarters of the army, Adjutant General's office.

Washington, March 12, 1898.—The following orders have been received from the war department and are published for the information and guidance of all concerned: War Department, Washington, March 12, 1898.

By direction of the president the following changes are made in the territorial divisions, destination and headquarters of geographical departments:

1.—The department of the east, New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Delaware, Maryland, District of Columbia, West Virginia, Virginia and North Carolina, with headquarters at Governor's Island, N. Y.

2.—A department is hereby established to be known as the department of the lakes, in consist of the states of Wisconsin, Michigan, Illinois, Indiana, Ohio, Kentucky and Tennessee, with headquarters at Chicago, Illinois.

3.—The department of Dakota will embrace the states of Minnesota, South Dakota, North Dakota, Montana, and so much of Wyoming and Idaho as is embraced in the Yellowstone National Park with headquarters at St. Paul, Minn.

4.—The department of the Columbia will embrace the states of Washington, Idaho, except so much of the latter as is embraced in the Yellowstone National Park, and the territory of Alaska, with headquarters at Van Couver Barracks, Washington.

5.—The department of California will embrace the states of California and Nevada, with headquarters at San Francisco.

6.—The department of Colorado will embrace the states of Wyoming, except so much thereof as is embraced in the Yellowstone National Park, Colorado, Utah and the territories of Arizona and New Mexico, with headquarters at Denver.

7.—The department of the Platte will embrace the states of Iowa, Nebraska, Missouri, Kansas and Arkansas, the Indian territory and the territory of Oklahoma, with headquarters at Omaha, Neb.

8.—A department is hereby established to be known as the department of the south, in consist of the states of South Carolina, Georgia, Florida, Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana and Texas, with headquarters at Atlanta, Ga. The departments of the Missouri and Texas are hereby abolished.

Major General John R. Brooke is assigned to the command of the department of the lakes and Brigadier General William M. Graham to the command of the department of the gulf. The officers of the several army departments now on duty in the departments of the Missouri and Texas are assigned to like duties in the departments of the lakes and the gulf respectively. The travel required under these orders is necessary for the public service.

Mr. Meyer asserts that he found it unsafe to walk in the towns of Kansas after dark, except in the middle of the road, owing to crimes of violence.

In regard to his interview with President McKinley, Mr. Meyer could say that the president was "pleased to hear we combined his name with the queen's in our services, and he thought the trust bond between the two countries was found in the Christian good-will uniting the churches of both."
