Seventh Annual Convention For the Seventh Division.

MEET IN FEDERAL BUILDING

Will Elect Officers Today and Have a Banquet.

The seventh annual convention of the Seventh Division, Association of Railway Postal Clerks, will convene at 10 o'clock in the United States court room.

The present officers of the association are: W. L. Tilford of St. Louis; vice president, E. W. Pierce of La Junta, Colo.; secretary, S. F. Cochran of Wichita; treasurer, W. G. Fordyce of Kansas City, Kan.

The business to be transacted this morning will be the election of officers for the ensuing year and the selection of delegates to the national convention of railway postal clerks, which will convene in Omaha on June 14 of this year.

The delegates to the national convention will be instructed either one way or the other. This division has no authority to do it themselves, but the delegates to the main order will. This question is now one of considerable agitation.

Postmaster Thomas G. Fitch will deliver the address of welcome. It is expected that there will be at least fifty clerks here to attend the convention.
