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ITS NOW HOME RULE

Police Department Will Probably Have \$1,300.

FOR THE FIRST MONTH After Having Paid Policemen and Other Expenses.

On the first day of July the Metropolitan Police commissioners turned over all the effects of the department to Mayor Ross and the city council. The police department and its affairs has now been for one month under home rule and the change has been quite beneficial to the business man and tax payers generally.

Mayor Ross said yesterday that he thought the department would be able to turn over to the city about \$1,300 after paying the expenses of all the policemen's salaries, lighting, fire, water, meals for prisoners and such other incidentals that occur. The months of July and August are considered to be the poorest months in the year for financial returns. However, taking July as the minimum, the receipts for twelve months will aggregate over \$12,000.
