

DOES THE AXE KILL?

Dr. Cinel Says Guillotined Persons Live for Hours.

AWFUL THEORY TESTED

Results so Far are Not Conclusive Either Way.

New York, Oct. 19.—The Journal contains the following article on a recent interesting theory propounded in Paris: "Does the stroke of the guillotine cause instant death?" This question, discussed for more than a century, is raised once more by the assertion of Dr. Cinel, the famous French physician, that mental activity continues for three hours after the head is severed. Guillotining is therefore a most prolonged and cruel method of inflicting death. The most famous test of this question was made in 1844 by the French Dr. Volpau on his friend, Dr. Couty de la Pommerais, executed for murder.

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NEVER IMITATED IN QUALITY.

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Dr. Cinel, according to the cable reports of the Associated Press, declares in the Medical Journal that feeling and consciousness remain for three hours in the head decapitated by guillotine.

Dr. Brown Squard, one of the most famous and successful investigators of the century, performed many experiments tending to throw light on this subject. He decapitated a vigorous dog and immediately expressed fresh blood into the head. The eyes of the dog exhibited terror and agony.

Dr. Cinel says that the blood after decapitation first comes from the large vessels of the neck, and that there is hardly any drain upon the circulation in the cranium. Absolute death does not occur for three hours.

THE MOST FAMOUS EXPERIMENT WITH A GUILLOTINED HEAD.

The most famous and historical of all experiments with a decapitated head is that made on Dr. Couty de la Pommerais, executed for murder in 1844. He made an anti-mortem agreement with his friend the great physician Velpeau, which is thus recorded distinctly in his ear: "Monsieur Couty de la Pommerais, in memory of our agreement in life, can you at this moment lower three times the lid of your right eye?"

"If at this moment, whatever may be the other contractions of the face, you can by this triple experiment of the eye warm me that you have heard and understood, and by an act of memory and of permanent will, control your palpebral muscles, your zygomatic nerve and your conjunctiva, at the same time dominating all the above, all the horror of your other impressions—that will be enough to liberate me from the guillotine."

Dr. Couty de la Pommerais accepted the proposition and Velpeau was on the scaffold on the day of execution. The head fell and the head was handed to him.

Holden, Mayor Quesada, Mayor Thomas Dargatz, General W. Greeley and wife, Governor Barnes of Oklahoma, Clark Howell, Governor Schofield of Wisconsin, Archbishop Ireland, ex-Vice President Stevenson and wife, Booker T. Washington, Dr. and Mrs. William R. Harper and Captain McCulla.

All those forming the presidential party were greeted with cheers as they alighted at the door of the club house. The favorites with the crowd, after the president and Generals Miles and Shafter, were Governor Mount, Governor Schofield and Captain McCulla.

In the reviewing stand proper there were with the president General Miles, General Shafter, both in full uniform; Governor Tanner, Mayor Harrison and Chairman Truxax of the Jubilee committee.

Several of the posts carried thirty old banners that had waved in battle thirty-five years ago and to every one of the lattered flags the president called the attention of those about him and every head was bent until the flag had gone by. Behind the veterans of a former war came numerous civic societies, rank after rank, until it seemed as though they would never end.

As the military division, commanded by Brigadier General Fitzsimmons, of the Illinois National Guard, approached the reviewing stand, it was met by the band of the Sixth regiment of Infantry from Fort Sheridan, and then such of the fighting men of Chicago who have returned from the war.

Directly behind the reviewing stand, the president and the crowd, thinking some new excitement was on, hastened from both ends of the square toward the center. Seeing the waving banner that marked the march, the police made desperate efforts to push the crowd back toward the ends of the square but without avail.

The president stepped once more upon the reviewing stand accompanied by President Revel of the Union League club. As soon as quiet had been restored he spoke as follows: "I witnessed with pride and satisfaction the cheers of the multitudes as veterans of the civil war on both sides of the contest passed in review. (Great applause.) I witnessed with pride the wild acclaim of the people as you watched the volunteers and regulars and our naval reserves—the guardians of the people on land and sea—pass before your eyes.

"I wish I might take the hand of every patriot—man, woman and child—here to day (applause) but I cannot do that (Voice from the crowd: 'But you've got our heart!') (Prolonged cheering, and so I leave with you not only thanks, but thanks of a great nation for your patriotism and devotion to the flag." (Great cheering.)

After the conclusion of the president's remarks there were loud calls for General Miles and General Shafter, but neither of those gentlemen would make his appearance and the crowd, after cheering the president as he left the club house for the honor of Captain McWilliams, slowly dispersed.


