

HOG MARKET STEADY

Saturday Trade and Week's Record Good.

TOPS UP TO \$3.35

Cattle Steady With a Fair Supply.

The Wichita hog market yesterday ruled steady with Friday's average prices. It was a very fair Saturday business, both in quality of offerings and the supply. It was a dull, dragging trade through most of the day, the morning and early afternoon being quiet, with very light receipts. Later the car stuff commenced to arrive and by the close there was on hand a good line of hogs, all of which were easily disposed of at good satisfactory prices for sellers. There was a good demand especially in the shipping call, all the best of the sale being secured at once. In point of receipts the day showed up about 600 better than Saturday of the week before, and 200 better than on Friday. The Saturday previous was light, the run being only nominal and for some time it seemed to indicate a like situation yesterday, but with the finish showing up decidedly better. The average weight was also better than either the day previous or the same day the week before. The quality as indicated by the weight was about the same as on Friday. There were several loads selling without outside of hogs, and the few which were received contained light cuts, mostly small lumber, if any, to the car. The dockage was a little strong for the number of cars in, which was 3. Some of the cars received contained cattle also, thus diminishing the aggregate quantity for the day. There were some very fair hogs received and these mostly were even, medium running stock in good, firm butcher condition. The wagon trade was light, there being almost nothing at all from this division and only common stuff what was there. The live, strong demand kept the business on the move when once it came in and at a fair season all the stock had been absorbed and the hog division cleaned up. It has been a very satisfactory week all around, the volume of receipts and the quality as well as the strength of the market being in good shape. The week closed with hogs a little lower, about a nickel under last Saturday, but this condition has prevailed all over and due to such as anything to unusually complete accumulation of both live hogs at the receiving centers and also stocks of provisions.

SHIPPERS AND NOTES.

A. E. Alexander of Mayfield was one of the earliest to arrive with car hogs. He had a load of fair heavy hogs which sold at bulk prices. E. B. Jeff Houston of Ponca City was in with a car of good, fair hogs which were sold without dock at the top price. L. M. McCrookins of Derby was a late comer with a car of fair light hogs which sold at bulk prices. Townsend & Gibbons of Andale were the last to arrive, their consignment being good hogs of medium heavy weight and taking the top price. Mr. Gibbons, who was in charge of the shipment, said that not many hogs had been shipped from that section this season. What there are to be found are in good shape and all will come to this market, but he does not look for any very large supply from there. Henry Steinkirchner of Newton came down with the heaviest hogs of the day, averaging 230 pounds and selling at the top of the day. B. Cowley of Rose Hill was on the market with a car load of heavy hogs which sold strong on the early car market. The roads contributing to yesterday's receipts were as follows: Santa Fe 7; and one each from the Rock Island, Missouri Pacific and Frisco. The daily comparisons yesterday were as follows: Saturday, tops, \$3.35; bulk, \$2.95; a narrow range, but the even and regularly running hogs placed there easily at the top prices, and only three points represent the entire car sales; average weight, 245; receipts, 77.
