WITH "FORTY NINERS"

Miss Davidson Crossed the Plains When Indians Ruled.

EFFORTS AT SILK CULTURE

In Kansas Gave Her International Fame.

Miss Matilda Davidson of this city, whose death was noted in yesterday's Eagle, was one of the most remarkable women of this country. She attained an international reputation in her efforts to promote silk culture in Kansas, at Junction City a few years ago. She crossed the plains with the "forty-niners" when there were no trains and few trails. Repeatedly was the company surrounded by red savages and many incidents occurred that rival the great stories of pioneer history. Miss Davidson was 78 years old.

After five years of very quiet but happy life with her niece, Mrs. Charles Hutton, 221 North Waco avenue, Miss Matilda M. Davidson died Thursday, December 8.

Few other than the friends of the family and the members of Plymouth Congregational church, of which she was a member, knew of her residence in the city, but her acquaintances will recall a strong character and noble woman, whom it was an honor to serve and whom to know. She was born in Philadelphia, arch 12, 1819. She was a member of a family characterized by strong religious and progressive traits, which have made the best part of Western life. As a mere girl she was under the pastorate of Rev. William Ram-say, a Presbyterian minister, who was later a missionary under the American board. It was as a child that she formed the Christian character which remained throughout her long and eventful life.

At Miss Davidson removed to Illinois, going by way of the Ohio and Mississippi rivers. She crossed the plains to Colorado with her mother and brother before there was any railroad in this region. Twice was the company surrounded by Indians. Her brother, William A. Davidson, built the well-known Nivart mill, in the gold camp of Ward, Col., and for several years the family lived near the timber line in the Rockies. William Davidson later secured a home in the Boulder valley, near the station White Rock, on the Boulder Valley railroad, and his progressive spirit was one of the first to try irrigation in what had been considered the sterile desert. With this brother Miss Davidson made her home for many years. The family was generally beloved and was well known in northern Colorado. The tragic death of the son, William Davidson and the removal by death of Mr. Davidson created sensations of sympathy which will not be removed in the next generation.

Miss Davidson will be remembered by many in Kansas for her great interest in silk culture. After she was 60 years of age, she came to Junction City, Kan., and encouraged by the Helling Bros., wash silk manufacturers, she began the study of silk culture, and made great attempts to foster the industry in this state and elsewhere. She wrote a pamphlet instructing in the art of caring for the silk worm and its product, and another in which a very extensive history of silk culture was given. She interested many parties in the enterprise, distributing silk worms, etc. It was found that this was the veritable home of the silk worm, for she discovered that it thrived well on the leaf of the osage orange. Everything promised success, except the government, which failed to protect the raw silk product. This the enterprise came to grief, but its promotion showed the strength of this woman.

Miss Davidson had always a very strong yet childlike Christian faith. She was interested in all good work, and even in her last years has made herself felt in the promotion of worthy objects. Up to three weeks ago her place in Plymouth church was occupied regularly, and though she heard little that was said, her presence was an encouragement to others.

Her abode in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Hutton has been a benediction, compensating for loving attention with her sweet and gracious spirit.

The body will be interred in Oakdale cemetery, Davenport, Ia., where rest Mr. J. Edgar Davidson, the father of Mrs. Hutton, and other members of Miss Davidson's family.

The funeral service will be held Sunday at 9 a. m. at the Hutton residence.
