

MAYOR ROSS WINS

Big Victory for Him at the Primaries Yesterday.

FIVE OUT OF SIX WARDS

For Him by Overwhelming and Pronounced Majorities.

The result of the Republican primary election yesterday was an overwhelming victory for Mayor Ross, who will be re-nominated today.

The trouble in the First ward occurred about half past five and was of the kind sometimes occurring at a hotly contested primary.

The contest was a warm one, probably the hottest seen in years. It is principally pitiable for one thing—that the wards where the party factional wars have waged in the past were more nearly unanimous than ever before.

There has been some controversy about whether the officers of the new court are elective or appointive on account of the closeness of the time of the creation of the court to the election.
