

TAMMANY DID IT Comes to the Rescue of Captain Shields' Democrat.

HE GETS PRINTING MONEY When the Democratic Central Committee Said He Shouldn't

Political sensations are popularly expected to come out of an action on the part of B. E. Kies, taken last week. This was the giving of money for county printing to Captain Shields of the Democrat.

Inasmuch as the Democratic central committee had paid otherwise, and not to Captain Shields, and that the organization Tammany decreed otherwise and carried its point, the event may be pivotal in county politics and part of Sedgewick county history, for it is claimed on the streets that there is much bitter feeling over the matter that political trouble may ensue.

Last Friday Mr. Kies, of the Commoner, was paid for county printing by the county commissioners a large sum. He was called upon by a committee of Tammany, who asked that he pay the 45 per cent over to the Democrat, Captain Shields called upon Mr. Simpson of the Democrat.

It will be remembered that last winter B. E. Kies of the Populist Commoner having received the county printing, announced that he would give 45 per cent of the county printing to any paper the Democratic county central committee would designate.

The first payment after this, Mr. Kies, at the request of the Tammany organization and holding that the designation having once been made it could not be changed, passed the money over to Captain Shields.

Just what the political lightning concealed in the maneuver is, is not clear. It is said that Harry Stewart, who is managing Judge Dale's campaign, had a leading part in nullifying the action of the Democratic central committee and giving the money to Captain Shields.
