

WILL BE A SURPRISE

Sentiment on Expansion in the Country.

SEDGWICK COUNTY LOYAL

Hon. Wm. Wallace Finds No Haul-Down-the-Flag Voters.

W. M. Wallace of Kingman, who is campaigning in the interests of the Republican ticket in this county this week, was in the city yesterday. He has been very active in the campaign in this part of the state and in different counties, helping in Republican local affairs and attending fairs and reunions.

Mr. Wallace has done a great deal for Republicanism in Kansas this fall. He has stuck right to work and gone where ever called. He has been at the little places and the big ones and he knows the sentiment of the public, for he has been in close touch with the voter for two months. Asked yesterday by a representative of the Eagle as to the effect of the war issue upon local politics, he said:

"In my judgment there is a big surprise in store for the opposition. While it is an off year and there is not the interest taken that is usual in national or state campaigns, yet about all the interest outside of the nominees and their immediate friends on the fusion ticket is taken by the Republicans and those who are in favor of expansion.

"Expansion," Mr. Wallace said, "is the issue, and it is a winner. No party has ever successfully opposed it. We are a nation of expansionists. We had no sooner parted from the mother country and set up housekeeping for ourselves than we commenced to expand, and we have been at it ever since. In 1802, under the leadership of Jefferson, we bought in the Louisiana country from France, which comprised all of Louisiana, Arkansas, Missouri, Nebraska, North Dakota, South Dakota, nearly all of Minnesota, Wyoming, Montana, Colorado, Kansas, Oklahoma and all of the Indian Territory. It was supported only recently that this also included the Oregon country, containing Oregon, Washington, Idaho and the western portion of Wyoming and Montana, but it is now settled that this northwest corner came to us by discovery in 1792 exploration in 1803, Astoria settlement in 1811 and by Spanish cession in 1819. The Louisiana country and Oregon country contains 1,282,000 square miles, or 76,961,280 acres. Then again in 1819 we took from Spain Florida and the lower part of Alabama and Mississippi, containing 462,369 acres. Again in 1845 we had secured the Texas country, including Texas, half of New Mexico, a corner off of Arkansas and the western portion of the center of Colorado, containing 325,811 square miles. Again in 1848 we took from Mexico, California, Utah, western part of Colorado and New Mexico and nearly all of Arizona and all of Nevada, containing 22,568 square miles.

"In 1850 we made the Gadsden purchase, adding to the lower portion of Arizona and New Mexico, containing 29,535 square miles. Again in 1867 we made the Alaska purchase with her 360,320,660 acres. In 1897 we secured in the Hawaiian Islands with their 4,000 square miles, and 1898 secured by taking Porto Rico and the Philippines. All of these acquisitions were bitterly opposed; every sort of an attack was made upon those who advocated expansion.

"The consent of the governed" was an objection raised then as now, and the ancestry of Black Hawk, "Little Bull" or "Wabasha" was not considered when we took in the territory west of the Mississippi river, and I know of no one bewailing that fact today. The immense distance our people would be removed from the capital was another great objection, and yet the Philippines are today, by means of our splendid modes of transportation, really more accessible than those western acquisitions were then. "The constitution" was another barrier that was held up against expansion. In passing upon this question, America's greatest jurist, Chief Justice Marshall, said: "The constitution confers absolutely on the government of the union the power of making war, and making treaties, consequently the government possesses the power of acquiring territory either by conquest or treaty. Time and again has the question been passed upon by our highest tribunals and different administrations. Expansion has been a great Democratic doctrine and was led and upheld by such men as Jefferson, Jackson, Polk, Douglas, Benton and many others. The sum paid for these acquisitions was declared by congressmen and senators to be enormous and downright extravagance. The culprits due to this government of all these acquisitions, including the Philippines, has been but \$7,000,000. The state of Kansas alone is cheap at that amount."

"You have been over Sedgwick county a great deal, how about the sentiment here?"

"The Republican ticket will be elected," he answered without hesitation. "I have an exceptionally strong ticket, each candidate is worthy of the support of every good citizen on his individual account, but that isn't all," he added. "Kansas is the place where John Brown's thirty-three sons were marching on. It is the place over which the great slavery agitation raged in the 1850s, the place where after the rebellion 186000 veterans came, bringing their splendid women, with love of country in their hearts, and implanted patriotism in Kansas soil. Their children, nursed at patriotic breasts, were reared in patriotic cradles, going to sleep with patriotic songs, and put to bed with patriotic prayers. Kansas is a glory today with pride over the return of the gallant Twentieth. From all over this state went the bravest volunteers that were enlisted in the late struggle. The brightest star in the galaxy of heroes shines for Kansas. It was our boys who helped to make Old Glory in these far away islands, and there she will float as an emblem of freedom and protection as long as the nation stands, and the voters of this state and of Sedgwick county will not knowingly support a party or its nominees who are in favor of hauling down the old flag."

"I meet these voters every day, voters of all parties. Everybody is busy but I have found that every man who expects to vote has figured out this expansion

EFFECTS OF THE BOOM

Old Obligations Cause Ben W. Aldrich to Go to Bankruptcy Court.

Ben W. Aldrich, the Douglas avenue druggist, by his attorney, J. N. Haymaker, filed his petition for voluntary bankruptcy in the federal court yesterday. His indebtedness, alleged to be about \$15,000, consists entirely of obligations assumed during the boom. Some of these obligations are in judgments and are still hanging over him. Mr. Aldrich desires to clear up his record and start out afresh. He was mayor of the city during the boom, or some time previous, and all of his efforts in those days were based on the great growth of the city while under his efficient rule. Judge Wall will appoint a day for the creditors to meet and put in their claims and the past business of Mr. Aldrich will be settled up and cleared away.

GIFT TO ST. FRANCIS

Popular Hospital Remembered in Tim O'Connor's Will.

BEQUEATHS ALL TO CHARITY

Will Filed for Probate—Edward Harvey Named Executor.

St. Francis hospital, in this city, has been remembered handsomely in the will of the late Tim O'Connor, who died a few days ago at the hospital. The will provides for his funeral expenses, and one dollar is given to his sister in Canada, while the balance of his property, both personal and real, is bequeathed to the Sisters of the Sorrowsful Mother of the St. Francis hospital. Mr. Edward Harvey of this city is named as executor of the will without bond. It is thought the property will amount to considerable, as besides the real estate which the deceased owned, there is thought to be personal property to the amount of several hundred dollars.

Mr. O'Connor's magnanimity was brought out by the great kindness and care shown him during his last illness. He was taken to the hospital and every attention was shown him by the Sisters. He was given a home with every luxury and comfort afforded by the splendidly equipped hospital, and although his illness was bound to prove fatal, the attention shown him by the nurses and physicians won his undying respect for the institution, and before he reached the final stages of his illness he made known his desire to make a will. No one about the hospital knew of its contents until after it was signed up and witnessed.

The property left to the institution will go a long way towards further equipping it for every demand made upon it in the way of finely furnished apartments and apparatus that is in every way up-to-date in modern hospitals.

The will is dated September 20, 1898, and was witnessed by John Bunick and Mathias Scheer. It reads as follows: "In the name of God, amen. "I, Tim O'Connor, being of sound mind and memory and of a disposing mind, recalling the certainty of death, do make and declare this to be my last will and testament, hereby revoking any and all former wills by me made.

"First—I desire that all of my funeral expenses and costs of my sickness shall be first paid out of my personal property, and if my personal property is not sufficient to defray these expenses, then I wish that my real estate as may be necessary be sold first.

"Second—I bequeath to my sister, Catherine O'Connor Dalsey, one dollar.

"Third—it is my will and wish to bequeath, and I hereby do bequeath to Sister Mary Seraphima, Eberth all of my personal and real property that I may die possessed of. This includes three houses in the city of Newton, Kansas, and it is my intention by this will to bequeath all of my property, except such as is needed to pay my funeral expenses, and the one dollar bequeathed to my sister, who now lives in Canada, to the Sisters of the Sorrowsful Mother of the St. Francis hospital at Wichita, Kansas, who have given me a home until my death and who nursed me in my long sickness; and to her I will and bequeath all property of every kind and description whatsoever that I may have when I die.

"It is my wish that Mr. Edward Harvey of Wichita be the executor of my will and I request that he may serve without bond.


