

HOGS WERE STEADY

Market Was If Anything a Shade Higher.

TOP PRICE WAS \$4.60

Quality of the Receipts Was Common.

The hog market was steady yesterday and a shade higher. The market opened barely steady and weakened a trifle under favorable reports from other markets.

The top price of the day was \$4.60, which was paid near the close of the day for a good load of medium hogs.

The quality yesterday was only fair. Compared with the day before it did not show up in a favorable light, being, if anything, a trifle worse.

The receipts yesterday were light, only about 80 hogs passing over the scales. The light receipts, however, were due to the bad weather of the day before.

Chicago reported the hog market as slow, while St. Louis quoted it as weak. Kansas City called the market strong.

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CORN MARKET DROPS

Jarring Everything Else Loose as It Falls.

MAY 1-2a5-8 CENT DOWN

Wheat 1-2 Cent, Oats 1-4 and Provisions a Trifle.

Chicago, Feb. 16.—Corn actively liquidation by recent heavy buying, may finishing the day's session 1/2 cent under yesterday. Wheat weakened with corn, feeling the heavy Argentine shipments and lower cables, may closing 1/2 cent lower.

The wheat market opened easy on the heavy Argentine shipments and lower cables, may 1/2 cent depressed at 85 1/2 cents. There was little doing in cash wheat, although there was some activity during the first hour and also during the last thirty minutes. New York reported 25 loads taken for export, Atlantic port clearances in wheat and flour are equal to 25,000 bushels. Primary receipts were 50,000 bushels, compared with 50,000 bushels last year.

The corn market suffered a relapse from its recently acquired strength, the price being unable to withstand the heavy lines thrown on the market. Receipts here were 47 cars. May closed 1/2 cent down at 84 1/2 cents.

Oats, clinging to the skirts of the other grain markets, could do nothing but retrace, which they did. May closing at 23 1/2 cents. The wheat and corn and selling by longs depressed the provisions market, which closed barely steady. Trade was quiet. There was covering of pork and lard and a little nibbling of lard by exporters. May closed 1/2 cent down at 10 1/2 cents. May lard, a shade depressed yesterday at 10 1/2 cents. Estimated receipts tomorrow: Wheat, 45 cars; corn, 575; oats, 200; hogs, 2,500 head.

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
