



HIDDEN FROM OFFICERS

Case of Cuban Itch Discovered on North Main.

Dr. Jordan says that he discovered a case of smallpox or itch yesterday on North Main that had not been reported, or rather had been hidden from the health board until the patient was almost well. He regards this as a wrong to the community and direct opposition to the board of health. The disease was almost wiped out and next week the desolation hospital would have been cleared of the last patient. But the discovery of the case on North Main street leaves the health board at a great disadvantage in its warfare. Dr. Jordan says that the disease is bound to spread in such cases and that it should not be allowed. People in the immediate vicinity where such a case has been harbored are unwittingly exposed. EASTER AT CHURCHES

Elaborate Program of Services Arranged

FOR MORNING AND EVENING

Stereopticon to be Used at St. John's Chnrch.

Wichita churches, always superior in the splendor of their Easter services, have out done all past programs in the elaborate arrangements for today. All the churches have provided special music and pretty floral decorations. The various programs of the day are given here:

CENTRAL CHRISTIAN CHURCH.

The music at the Central Christian church will be of especial interest on Easter Sunday. At the morning service the choir will sing the Easter anthem, "Alleluia, Christ is Risen," by Geo. Burdett. Messrs Harvey and Johnson will sing Shelley's "Songs of Praise the Angels Sing," and for offertory Mr. Jack Shields will sing "The Resurrection," by Shelley. In the evening the male choir will sing Gounod's "Nazareth," a quartette consisting of Messrs Johnson, Messrs Harvey and Johnson, will sing "Behold, There Was a Great Earthquake," by Herbert, and the beautiful Easter cantata, "Death and Life," by Harry Rowe Shelley, will be sung by the choir, the solos being given by Mrs. H. Childs, Miss Blanche Childs, Miss Edith Johnson, Messrs E. E. Harvey, M. M. Johnson and John Charles. This will constitute a very interesting program, to which the public is most cordially invited.

REFORMED CHURCH.

Easter will be celebrated at the Reformed church, corner South Topeka avenue and Lewis street, at 11 o'clock this morning. The sacrament of baptism will be administered and a class of new members will be received into the church by confirmation, which will be followed by the celebration of the Lord's Supper. A brief Easter sermon will be preached by the pastor, Rev. Bruce Griffith. The music will be of an exceptionally fine order and will be under the direction of Mr. Henry Huttman. The chorus choir of thirty-five voices, assisted by special soloists, will render the following during the services:

Professional—"Christ is Risen," choir. "Gloria in Excelsis," by Dudley Buck, choir. Chant—"Lord's Prayer," choir. Gloria, by Richard Wilkinson, choir. "Te Deum in C," Dudley Buck, choir. Solo parts by Mrs. Griffith, Fritz Huttman and Miss Brown.

Solo Anthem—"From Glory to Glory," by Globe, Miss Lena Knoblauch. Offertory Solo—"Easter Sunshine," by Metzke, Fritz Huttman. The church will be decorated in a manner appropriate to the occasion. Other services of the day as usual.

SUNDAY AT ST. JOHN'S.

An elaborate musical program has been arranged for Easter day at St. John's Episcopal church. In the morning the full choir of thirty-two voices will sing "Praise Ye, the Father," by Gounod, for the professional. Upon arriving in the stalls they will sing Barnby's "Break Forth Into Joy." Instead of the usual vindex the choir will sing "Christ, our Passover," by Chappell. After the first lesson will be sung a "Te Deum" in B minor (No. 5), by Dudley Buck, and after the second lesson a Jubilate in B flat, by Lansing. Immediately after the prayers the choir will sing Barnby's Easter anthem, "Awake Up My Glory." During the offertory Miss Larimore will sing "The Easter Ale," from Arthur Sullivan's "Light of the World," and for the recessional the choir will sing "We March to Victory," by Barnby.

In the evening the professional and recessional will be the same as morning. The "Lord's Prayer" will be chanted and after the first lesson the "Magnificat" as arranged by Caleb Simper, will be sung. After the second lesson the Nunc demittis in E flat, by Simper, will be rendered, and after the Psalms the choir will sing Gloria in Excelsis (old chant). The responses will be chanted as usual and after the prayers the choir will sing "Break Forth Into Joy." For the offertory in the evening the full choir will be heard in Barnby's "Awake Up My Glory."

The services will begin promptly at 11 a. m. and 8 p. m., and the indications are that St. John's church tomorrow will be crowded early at both services.


