At 11 o'clock every day breakfasts are served at the hotel. The menu is French and Italian, is extremely good, and it is a relief after the "rag-time" and popular airs one hears in public at home.

There are probably no more beautiful women in the world than those one sees in San Jose. In the dress of an evening is the place to see them, as their selection

go out on the streets, and never unless much "chaperoned." English and American visitors appear but palely pretty beside the rich, dark beauty of the Spanish señoritas and the Costa Ricans.

By a common understanding, the working girl never dons the shawl, but substitutes a narrow silk scarf fringed at either end. While still another class of women, the laborers, are scantily dressed with sleeveless chemise, low cut, and sometimes entirely of the shoulders.

ANSELL CAUSES THE ARREST OF A WOMAN FOR ROBBERY.

On the complaint of E. F. Ansell, claiming to be a foot racer from Topeka, Doby Jones, alias Steele of No. 14 Wichita street, "Chick" Hawkins and Nick Carter, two colored employees of the bank, were yesterday arrested on the charge of highway robbery.

Ansell claims he went to the Jones warehouse on Saturday night and engaged in a card game with the two negroes and the woman. The game was broken up, he says, by them making an attempt to gain possession of his money, he having been so unwise as to have "flushed" a large roll of bills.

According to the story told by Ansell to the police, he ran from the house and was pursued by the three. He was caught, knocked down and held while his pockets were rifled. He claims to have been robbed of \$100. The robbery is alleged to have occurred about 4 o'clock Sunday morning.

Ansell made complaint to the police and Detectives Sutton and Massey took up the matter. After investigation they caused the arrest of the three parties accused about 2:15 o'clock Sunday afternoon. They had their preliminary before Judge Kirk yesterday afternoon, Ansell in the meantime having sworn out a state warrant against them.

When the trial was called by Judge Kirk "Chick" Hawkins suddenly refused to be interrogated and waived examination. Nick Carter was bound over to the district court, and Daley Steele, or Jones, as she is sometimes known, was released under bond of \$500. The trial of the three will come up Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

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
