DOWN TO RIGHT PRICES

Trade Settles So Slowly as to Avoid Loss. HIGHEST POINT MARCH 16

Range Was But 4.5 Per Cent Lower May 16.

New York, May 25.—R. G. Dun & Co.'s weekly review of trade tomorrow will say: Transaction to a more normal range of prices after a time of extraordinary buying, speculation and rise, is not wholly delightful, however, as it may be to business health.

Foreign industry has been on a reduced scale. Practically the entire corn crop has been planted under favorable conditions and reports from the oats crop are likewise good.

Perhaps the most favorable report for the week as to distributive trade comes from the grocery business, in which the sharp advance in refined sugar, due to its claim to the enhanced price of the raw material and not to any settlement of the trade war, has stimulated demand in other lines.

The decline in cotton was rendered seasonal by the failure of the firm which had most strongly resisted it and for some months had led the campaign for high prices in the belief that stocks for the rest of this year would scarcely meet demands with the next crop in doubt.

Weakness in wool, as yet not enough to prompt heavy buying, has hindered free purchases of goods, without doubt, and there is of late somewhat more competition of cancellations and slow collections.

The nominal price of Bessemer pig is held without change at Pittsburgh and without transactions. Bessemer is offered much below the \$24.50 asked by the association, while prices of finished products of iron and steel have declined more than 10 per cent within two months.

M'GOWAN SHOT THE FILIPINO. And Is to Be Court-Martialed for It. Washington, May 25.—The report of the court of inquiry into the case of Captain McGowan, United States navy, who, it is alleged, shot a Filipino who was attempting to board the Monadnock in Manila Bay, reached the navy department today. Later Secretary Long made the following announcement: "The court finds that proper discipline was not exercised in the shooting, and that Captain McGowan was at fault in not reporting it to the commander-in-chief. You find that Captain McGowan made provision for the support of the widow and children of the deceased Filipino. They recommend a court-martial, which will probably be ordered."
