

IN SIX MONTHS TIME

Orient Road Expects to Have 120 Miles in Operation.

WORK TO COMMENCE HERE

Wichita's Proposition to be Submitted Next Week.

Judge John A. Eaton, representing the legal department of the Kansas City, Mexico & Orient Railroad company, and who is managing the Wichita end of the proposed road, was in the city a short time last night between trains. He has been in Harper county and was on his way home. To a reporter for the Eagle he said that the proposition made by the Commercial club regarding the request for the shops was still in the hands of the officers and would be presented to President Stillwell upon his return from New York, which will not be until next week. The matter will then be taken up and considered.

Judge Eaton had been away from Kansas City for several days and did not know just what arrangements had been made.

W. C. Edward of the construction company, is now in Harper county with the chief engineer, E. L. Martin, chairman of the executive board of the road, who was in Wichita looking over the field, is quoted as saying that work on the line would be commenced at Wichita at once and that 120 miles of track south would be built and in operation within six months time.

Judge Eaton's stay in Wichita last night was brief and he had no time to talk over the situation, but there seems to be no question in the minds of the people here but what Wichita will be made a division terminal.

In referring to the situation of the Orient road yesterday's Kansas City Journal says: The directors of the Guardian Trust company will not at their meeting next Friday take any action in the matter of the trusteeship of the bonds of the Kansas City, Mexico & Orient Railroad company, owing to the inability of President A. E. Stillwell to be present at the meeting. As a result of the meeting of the trust company directors to consider financing the new railroad company has been postponed to June 25 and only minor business is expected to be transacted at Friday's meeting.

Mr. Stillwell had expected to reach Kansas City today, but was detained by engagements in New York. He is now expected to be in the city next week. Chairman E. L. Martin of the executive board of the Kansas City, Mexico & Orient said yesterday that progress was being made in all the departments of the work on the new road. The engineers are finishing the route, the financial arrangements are being made and the negotiations of the Mexican government are being closed up.

M. P. Paret, chief engineer, and W. C. Edward, one of the directors of the Kansas City, Mexico & Orient construction company, left last night for Wichita, where they will at once start the work of building the 120 miles of track from that city towards the Canadian river, this construction company having taken the contract for that part of the new roadbed. Mr. Martin said yesterday it was expected to have the grading finished within ninety days and that the rails would be laid and the road put in operation from Wichita 120 miles southwest within six months. Contracts have not been awarded for other parts of the line and it is likely nothing in this direction will be done until the return of Mr. Stillwell.

CARS HAVE BEEN SHIPPED

Manager Nelson Telegraphed That Four Were Started Last Week. It is likely that the street railway company will receive four new summer cars within a very short time. The officers here received a telegram from the factory at Newark, Ohio, stating that they had been placed on board the cars ready for shipment on June 13. They will arrive over the Prince road, but Manager Nelson of the street railway company, inquired at the railroad office here if they had heard anything from them and the answer came: "We have not." It is the supposition that they have been delayed in transit at some point on the road.

OFFICERS WERE POWERLESS

300 Harvest Hands Take Charge of Santa Fe Freight. Charley Walker, the Santa Fe station agent here, was in the city yesterday and told his experience with a crowd of harvest hands who were beating their way over the line. Tuesday a gang of 300 hit the town from all directions, and as they were out of money they were bent on getting to the center of the wheat belt by means of their way on the train. An attempt was made to get on the California fast freight, but being unsuccessful they took charge of a local freight and issued orders to suit themselves. Agent Walker and the train men were under orders, and they tried to eject them, but without success. The officers of the road were appealed to by telegraph for instructions and orders were issued to assist the assistance of the sheriff and his deputies. Being greatly outnumbered, the officers were simply powerless as the men were in a position to resist to the bitter end any attempt to arrest them. Almost every season the railroads have such experiences. Two years ago the officers in Wichita had a similar trouble with a gang of harvest hands who had taken charge of a Santa Fe train. Unless the number is too large the railroad men do not attempt to put them out.

ACCIDENTALLY SHOT

FRANK TRIPP'S OF COLWICH RECEIVES WOUND IN NECK.

Was Brought to Wichita Hospital Yesterday for Treatment.

Frank Tripp, son of a farmer living near Colwich, was accidentally shot in the neck yesterday. He was brought to Wichita yesterday afternoon and placed in the city hospital, where he will be under good medical treatment. Dr. Jordan has charge of the case and he says the patient will recover, although the wound is quite severe and painful.

WILL BE ARRESTED

All Boys Caught Bathing Within City Limits Without Suits On.

Chief of Police Cubbon yesterday issued instructions to the entire police force to immediately arrest all boys caught bathing within the corporate limits who were not attired in bathing suits. This order is the result of numerous complaints from the residents in the neighborhood of Twelfth and Bittling, where it seems the boys have converted a portion of Little river into a "swimming hole." Since the bathing season opened boys, ranging in age from 12 to 20 years, have daily congregated at that point. They made no pretense of covering their nakedness and seemed to delight in using boisterous and profane language to the end that it became a nuisance to the people in that locality. In some instances gardens have been trampled and destroyed. Vegetable products have been pulled up and other mischievous and lawless practices indulged in. A written complaint was sent to Chief Cubbon yesterday and he immediately ordered the arrest of every person who is guilty of this practice in the past. The chief says the boys can bathe there, but they must don bathing suits and keep within the limits of law and decency.

TO STOP EXPECTORATING

Councilman Dewey Will Fight for Such an Ordinance.

The proposed ordinance providing for the prohibition of the vile habit of expectorating in the street cars will probably come up at the next meeting of the city council. There are those who will not support a movement of this kind. While complaints of this kind have not been frequent, the ordinance is a precautionary measure against such violations. Councilman Dewey is an ardent supporter of the proposition and to a reporter for the Eagle he said yesterday: "While but few complaints have been made, I have seen people spit in street cars and use the floor for a cupholder, and I think it is the most disgusting sight I have ever seen. Men who have no more moral decency than to spit in a car and spit amber all over the floor for the ladies to mop up with their skirts, is not fit to be classed among human beings and should cast their lot among dogs."

EAST ADDITION TORN DOWN

Metropole Hotel Improvements Continued—Will Excavate Soon.

Workmen have about completed tearing down the east one-story addition to the old Metropole hotel, and as soon as the debris is cleared from the site, work will be started on the foundation excavation for the purpose of building the addition full four stories. It is expected the new building will be completed by the fall of the year. A new roof is also being put on the main building, and while all of the changes have not yet been decided upon, the interior of the hotel is already unrecognizable. Mr. Hamilton, the new proprietor, is still enlarging on the plans and when the remodeling is complete Wichita people will not know the place. Mr. Hamilton intends to make the dining room and kitchen the best in the state. At present the first floor is almost gutted.

NO DAMAGE DONE

Tuesday Night's Storm Caused Uneasiness for Wheat.

It was thought that the storm of Tuesday night did much damage to the wheat, but such is not the case. The storm, however, was a very hard one and in some places the wheat was blown over, but this is not general. Farmers will soon be harvesting as rapidly as possible and not until the last stalk is out will they rest in peace. At this time of year severe storms are liable to occur and town people do not appreciate the many things which the farmer has to contend with. The storm in town did some damage—crossing light wires, burning out fuses, etc., and many people were up expecting a more serious storm. Even the policemen were scared and threatened to leave the city.

SAFE BLOWN OPEN

Robbers Secure Money and Checks at Florence, Kan.

CAPTURED AT AUGUSTA

One of the Gang Thought to be a Wichita Boy.

A safe in one of the leading hardware stores in Florence, Marion county, was blown open some time Tuesday night. It is supposed that the safe was opened some time between 12 o'clock and daylight. No clue to the parties was found at that time and immediately after the robbery was discovered telegrams were sent out over the state in hopes that something might turn up. The safe contained considerable money, most of it in silver, and this was in a coin sack. There were also a number of checks, which had been cashed during the afternoon after banking hours. Just what all of these amounted to, or how much money was in the coin sack could not be learned, but it was supposed to be quite a sum.

Last night ex-Sheriff Sidney Blakeman of Butler county was in the city and reported that two men had been captured at Augusta yesterday morning about 9 o'clock by City Marshal Charles Donnellson. A telegram had been received by Marshal Donnellson earlier in the morning, telling of the Florence affair, and when the morning freight train came in on the Santa Fe, he was there looking for suspicious characters. Before the train came to a standstill two men jumped from a box car immediately in front of him, and when he commenced asking questions concerning them and their destination they gave him no satisfaction, but only asked about the Prince train for Wichita. Marshal Donnellson piled more questions and one of them became angry and attempted to make a gun play. On this move by him Marshal Donnellson arrested both of them and immediately placed handcuffs on them. After being taken up town they were searched and about \$40 or \$50 in silver in a coin sack and a number of checks on different banks for various amounts were found. In addition to these, the men had in their possession several revolvers and watches, supposed to have been taken from the store. Marshal Donnellson immediately telegraphed the authorities at Florence, and the men were taken to that county last night.

It was thought at Augusta yesterday that these men were connected with the safe robbery which recently occurred at that place, but nothing definite is known. A man claiming to be from Wichita and who is now running a merry-go-round in the city, said yesterday that they were Wichita boys, but the Wichita police claim to know nothing in regard to their identity. The authorities here learned of the robbery early in the day and were on the alert for them.

STUDENTS MAKE RESOLVES

Wichita Commercial Students Organize Against Cigarettes.

The students of the Wichita Commercial College have formed an anti-cigarette society which is now in operation. Over 200 of the scholars also signed a resolution to totally abstain from the use of the vile habit of cigarette smoking. This declaration is the result of the article in last Sunday's Eagle on the "City Regulator." The agenda made in this young set of students is worthy of considerable commendation. The object of the society is to promote the interests of the anti-cigarette movement, believing that the use of the weed is injurious to health and impairs the mind. Equalizers Raise One Man's Personal Property From \$300 to \$15,000.

The county commissioners yesterday adjourned their meeting as a board of equalization. Yesterday they raised an assessment of personal tax from \$300 to \$15,000. Several of the men who own lands, property not plotted came before the board and registered their kick against the raise in valuation on their land. However, all but one of them went away satisfied as soon as they fully understood why their property had been raised, although the valuation of some of it was raised from \$20 to \$50 per acre. The board has done a great deal of work since the first of last week, when the meeting began. They expressed it as their opinion last night that, although there were still many things that would stand equal in the tax assessment, as a whole, was in a better condition than ever before. There are still many improvements which might be made, but in consideration of the short time allowed the board in which to equalize the taxes, they believed that things were left in a very good condition.


