

Preliminary Arrangements for Grand Electrical Parade.

DURING THE FALL FESTIVAL
Gov. Stanley and Pres. Cohn Return From Milwaukee.

Charles G. Cohn, president of the Wichita Carnival and Street Fair association, returned last night from Milwaukee, where he, in conjunction with Governor Stanley, made temporary arrangements with P. J. Toomey of St. Louis for the production of the electrical pageant here next fall. There are twelve floats and each one is lighted with 30 incandescent lights. They represent the Creation and the six days of the week. It has been pronounced by people who have seen it to be the finest pageant ever given in connection with any carnival. It is the plan of the carnival people to have the floats drawn by horses and the trolley poles will be used for lighting purposes only. On each side of the floats men with chemical light torches will march, and these lights will add much to the beauty of the scene.

It is proposed to have the pageant during the latter part of the carnival week and it has been predicted by outside parties that thousands of people will attend the carnival to witness that event. There will be additional features in connection with the floats and it is estimated that it will take the pageant an hour or even longer to pass the corner of Main and Douglas. The pageant will be formed on East Douglas avenue and will proceed up Main street above the court house and return along Main street and Douglas avenue again. The electrical floats will be preceded by a float from which innumerable Roman candles will be fired.

A meeting of the executive committee will be held within the next few days and more definite action in regard to the matter will be taken.

Mr. Cohn was seen at his office last night by a reporter for the Eagle and said concerning the pageant: "It was the prettiest thing of its kind I have ever seen. It is almost impossible to describe it and if it is decided to give the pageant here, the event will attract many thousands of people to Wichita. Of course Governor Stanley and I could only make temporary arrangements with Mr. Toomey for the pageant, but the carnival association can make no mistake in bringing it here. The display was of such a character as to cause representatives from St. Louis, Louisville, Cedar Rapids, etc., to attend in order to get ideas for similar displays. If the pageant is produced in Wichita, it will be the third one in the United States and the first one west of the Missouri river."

Governor Stanley is very anxious that Wichita should have the pageant and thinks that it will be the finest attraction that could possibly be secured for the carnival.

TO SET ASIDE JUDGMENT
Many Attempts Made in a Foreclosure Case.

A much repeated petition to set aside a judgment rendered in the case of Judge Dale in the district court. The title of the case as it originally appeared in the court was the Ohio and Western Mortgage Trust company against Kaufman & Kohr. About ten years ago a mortgage held by the plaintiffs in the case against the defendants was finally foreclosed and judgment was rendered in favor of the plaintiffs. Some time after the judgment was rendered a motion to have the judgment set aside was made before Judge Dale.

This motion, however, was overruled by the court. Later on the defendants filed a petition to have the judgment set aside. The petition came up in the regular order and Judge Dale decided the case in favor of the plaintiffs. The defendants took an appeal to the supreme court, and when the case came up the supreme court sustained the finding of the lower court. The case was then returned and Kaufman & Kohr, the defendants, filed a petition to have the same judgment set aside. In the petition it was stated that the plaintiff had set itself up as an Ohio corporation, being duly incorporated under the laws of Ohio.

The defendants looked the matter up and rendered a verdict against the case. 
