Crop Situation Better-Bigger Business in Metals.

New York, August 3.-R. G. Dun & Co.'s weekly review will say: It is often hard to read encouraging symptoms of general business in declining prices of commodities, but just now it is reasonable to look for them.

Iron and steel markets were started by reports of sales of steel bars at 90 cents per 100 pounds, but business at the same time was the largest in months at Chicago on a basis of about \$1.35.

While prices are above the 1899 opening in woods, they are materially below figures reached later in the season.

BRADSTREET'S. New York, Aug. 3.-Bradstreet's tomorrow will say: Trade conditions still favor the buyers, and the demand, though faint, is better than in the previous month.

On the other hand, iron and steel markets are not so active as in the previous month, and the volume of trade in finished material, notably bars and plates, is very large.
