SURVEY IS IN PROGRESS

Route of Orient in Kansas Not Yet Decided.

The surveying on the Orient road is being rushed and according to reports the officials are well pleased with the progress being made.

When passing through Kansas City a few days ago, Chairman J. E. Evans called at the office of R. J. Martin and had an interview with Mr. Martin and Attorney Braley. These people, he said, seem pleased to receive and converse with Emporia people as to progress, and readily state their work to do.

Not all of the line beyond Wichita has been definitely located. Grading began at some points quite a while ago. The officers wish to remind as that there are a multitude of matters to be attended to in connection with surveys, propositions, contracts, etc., in order to materialize as big a thing as the Orient.

SEARCH-LIGHTS ARE UNPACKED

Were Made in New York by a Marine Gun Fitter.

Yesterday the searchlights for the Street Fair were unpacked by City Electrician McVey and set up. There are two of these searchlights for the carnival which throw a beam of light six miles and one which throws a light one mile. They are built a good deal like the motor which is used in automobiles and are quicksilver like a locomotive headlight. These received here in Wichita which Mr. McVey will soon light up are marine searchlights and were manufactured for that purpose. Exhibitions will be given with them, shafts of light being thrown into the heavens for six miles. Also the parades will be witnessed gloriously in their fierce rays, or as Secretary Lockwood says, "Night will be turned into day." The searchlights are in the city building. They are very neat affairs handsomely mounted, and will be an interesting part of the entertainment next month.

NEW SEWER IS READY

Connection With Main Sewer Will Be Made Soon.

The new addition to the sewer system in the Third ward has been completed and as soon as the flush tanks are placed connection with the main system will be made and the whole put in operation. The new sewer comprises 12,721 feet of pipe, 14-inch 12, 14, 18 inch pipes and laterals. It connects with the main sewer at Washington avenue and Douglas, goes east from there to Cleveland, north on Cleveland to First, where it divides into two branches and runs north to Third in the alleys to the east and west. Another branch goes up Indiana avenue. Another goes up Ohio avenue. Still another runs up Wabash to First and then branches into two alleys which go north to Third street. The new system will accommodate a thickly populated section of the city and will be of great benefit. The work, it is said, has been well done.

ARRANGE FOR BOOTHS

Executive Committee Hold an Important Meeting.

INNES MAKES PROPOSITION

Erect Band Stand for Carnival Week.

One of the most enthusiastic meetings of the business men of the city in connection with the Street Fair and Carnival was held in the council chambers of the city building last night. Matters concerning the closing up of the necessary arrangements for the coming festival were taken up and disposed of.

President Cohn, of the carnival association, who has been in the case for some time, took charge of the meeting. A number of reports concerning the transaction of the executive committee were made and afterwards the business of the session was commenced.

One of the first reports given was that of the committee in charge of the flower parade. The arrangements for this parade are being made as rapidly as is possible and from the indication the present time it will be one of the most complete things of the entire carnival.

The queen contest was looked into by the executive committee and everyone is much interested in the outcome of the contest. The committee in charge of the contest will hold a meeting today to decide definitely just when the contest will end, but from statements made from members of the committee last night, the voting will end on the 21st of this month.

It was decided to expend \$100 for the purpose of securing suitable robes for the queen who will be elected in the contest now on. The robes are to be selected by the queen elect herself and after the carnival the robes are to become her property. All of these arrangements are under the management of the queen contest committee and they are to see that the queen of the carnival secures the robes.

Mr. W. P. Innes of Innes & Co., announced last night that his firm instead of building a booth, would build a fine band stand to be placed some place in the exhibit space for the use of the bands playing for the carnival. The stand is to be lighted with electricity and will be something after the pattern of the band stand in Fairmount park in Kansas City and will cost several hundred dollars. The city will take the stand after the carnival and place the structure in Riverside park. This proposition met with the approval of the committee and if the location can be made satisfactory to everyone, the construction of the stand will commence within a few days.

The plans are already out and the stand as planned will be a magnificent thing. On all sides electric lights will be used. Wichita is to have a great carnival ball during the carnival week. A committee of enthusiastic persons was selected last night to take charge of the matter and it was decided to hold the ball on Saturday night. The members of the committee are: Mr. C. R. Fulton, Mr. Fred Doid, Mr. L. R. Dulaney, Mr. George Bergman and Mr. Luther Gates. These gentlemen have already seen to the clearing of the streets on the night of the ball and a large band will furnish the music. The idea will take with the people and an event of the nature which they will manage will be largely attended.

Mr. George Walker, who has been arranging for the horses to be attached to the electrical floats reported to the committee last night. Mr. Walker will have everything in readiness for the parade and to help the matter along, an appropriation was made last night.

Mr. Sam Hess, for the committee on building reported that the committee had decided to put in two arches for the entrance of the fair. One arch is to be on Main street and the other on Market. The plans for the Market street fair are already out and will be one of the finest arches ever seen in a street.

The question to the bands for the carnival came up for discussion and after a vote it was decided to have at least five bands here during that week. These bands are Pror's band of St. Joe, the Ellsworth band, Blackwell band, Halstead band and the Commercial band. Negotiations are now on for the other band and the matter will be definitely decided within a few days.

The ladies are to have the privilege of selling the confetti which has arrived for the carnival. It will be sold on the carnival grounds and will be something entirely new in this city.

At the meeting last night the announcement was made that the Emporia special trains into the city during the fair. Other roads have signified their intention of doing the same for the week.

Mr. Charles G. Cohn, who has just returned from the east is very enthusiastic regarding the carnival. Mr. Cohn while in St. Louis, saw the floats, which are being made for the parade here. Mr. Cohn, in speaking of them said: "They far exceeded my expectations. They will be ahead of anything that any city in the west has ever produced. The floats will be completed within a few days and will be shipped east. The latter part of the month they will come here and will be placed in position for the parade. When I went through St. Louis the first time I called on Mr. Toomey, but the floats were not completed. I was much astonished when I saw them the last time for the change was so great.

"The representation on them are all modern and are very beautiful. Wichita will be surprised when she sees these floats and they will pronounce the event the greatest thing that Wichita enterprise has gotten up."

Mr. Robert Norris of this city has received word from his mother, Zoe Anderson Norris, from Switzerland. She announces that she will climb Mount Blanc and if successful there will attempt the Matterhorn and other European peaks.
