HAVE 225 MEMBERS

Old Soldiers Organize McKinley and Roosevelt Club.

OFFICERS ARE SELECTED

Rousing Speeches Made—Enthusiasm Runs High.

In one of the most enthusiastic meetings of the campaign, the old soldiers of the city organized a McKinley and Roosevelt club of 225 members at the city building last night.

The men who saw the hard service in the war of the rebellion were at the meeting and they were just as much interested about the organization formed as ever they were in the battles of their earlier years.

The officers selected to take charge of the organization are competent men and have the respect and confidence of every one of the members. The men elected are: J. M. Knapp, president; W. F. Walker, first vice president; J. F. Bell, second vice president; L. F. Hanson, secretary; Dr. C. C. Furry, treasurer.

Mr. Knapp said in part: "Comrades of Wichita: I must thank you for the great honor you have conferred upon me by electing me president of the McKinley and Roosevelt club of this city."

"In the dark days of 1861 he shouldered his musket, and at the call of his country he went out with us, endured the hardships of camp life on the battlefield and won his place among the illustrious soldiers of this country. In 1865, when there were several million of laboring men out of employment, Comrade McKinley said, 'If I am elected president of the United States I will rekindle the fires in the furnace and the large manufacturing plants of the country and give the laboring men something to do,' and he has done that. And while Grover Cleveland four years ago was selling bonds to pay the running expenses of the government, Mr. McKinley has not only freed Cuba and run up our flag in Porto Rico and the Philippine Islands, and he now has \$25,000,000 in the treasury, and the best of all the flag is respected the world over."

Mr. Knapp was followed in close succession with lively remarks from nearly every member present. Everything started out with a vim and proved its old loyal colors from start to finish.

Mr. W. G. Jones, an old comrade of the war from New York, graciously and fully responded to the request for a few remarks by saying: "I am not a speaker, but when leaving my home in New York for the summer at Chicago and Wichita, I met some of our old comrades here. I would know when I got out here to keep my mouth shut, for Kansas was to be for Bryan. I had always talked my politics whenever I was in Chicago, Kansas or New York Sunday, Monday, Tuesday, or any other day in the week, and supposed I would have my own way, which I assure you I have."

Mr. Jones told of his pleasure in seeing such an enthusiastic gathering and made many remarks on the political affairs of his state. He said the old soldiers were in line and that they would do their duty this fall. Every man present was interested in Mr. Jones' remarks and they were fully appreciated.
