TELEGRAM WAS DOGUS
 That Made Mrs. Hardy of Chicago Suicide.
 HER HUSBAND SENT IT
 It Bore the False News of His Self-Destruction.

Chicago, Oct. 12.—Mrs. Philip Hardy, wife of a former onion business man, was found dead in her apartments at 1223 Wabash avenue, today with a bullet hole in her heart. On the floor near her was a magnificently chased dueling pistol, with which she had shot herself. Letters written by the dead woman showed that she had committed suicide under the belief that her husband had committed suicide in New York city following a recent quarrel with his wife. Mrs. Hardy had made careful preparations for her death, and even the letters she left to her mother and others were written on mourning paper.

The telegram which announced the suicide of her husband in New York and which resulted in Mrs. Hardy's taking her own life, was a bogus one. Hardy appeared at the morgue today and admitted to the police that he had caused the telegram to be sent to his wife, who he understood had secured warrants for the arrest of himself and a woman, Hardy, dressing court proceedings, caused the telegram to be sent in the hope that his wife would take no further action in the matter.

 Cape Town, Oct. 12.—The South African league today passed a resolution in favor of a preference for the English language in all official communications, and adopted a resolution adverse to the Dutch language being abandoned, which was a suggestion of Cecil Rhodes.

BUSHWHACKERS IN LEYTE
 Pretty Hard to Catch at It but are Only Robbers, Not Patriots.
 Manila, Oct. 11.—The west coast of the island of Leyte is in a state of turmoil, the rebel Ladroneas are actively plundering, raiding and attacking and then returning to the mountainous regions. The Americans pursue in the mountains. General Mojica's officers are surrendering and his soldiers are being captured and his organization broken up. The captured guerrillas and Ladroneas, when questioned, stated that on the 24th instant, thirty Americans attacked forty-five rebels, rifled their stronghold in the Camarines province and routed them, killing ten. Two Americans were killed and three wounded.

But France's N. Del Casse Is Afraid of Chamberlain's Wrath.
 New York, Oct. 12.—A dispatch to the Herald from Paris says: The French government is being consulted on the subject of President Kruger's landing at Marseilles and passing through Paris on his way to Holland. "The eventuality of the Boer president's visit to Paris," says La Presse, "has aroused great opposition on the part of M. Del Casse. We all remember the intense welcome given to the three Boer delegates. What would it be if the hero of Pretoria were to come in person and present himself before the acclamation of the French nation? Every French peasant knows Kruger Oom Paul's face, and he is admired throughout the country as much as he is in the Netherlands, but the Grand Orator does not wish to cause any trouble with England. The demonstration that would meet President Kruger would have the effect of displeasing Mr. Chamberlain. If the decision rests with M. Del Casse alone we may be sure that the hero of the South African war will be asked to go elsewhere."

To Sit on the Hague Tribunal
 Washington, Oct. 12.—It is understood the president has selected Judge George D. Gray of Delaware to represent the United States on the Hague tribunal, which is to be organized on the Hague permanent arbitration tribunal. Judge Gray is a former senator from Delaware and a Democrat. He was a member of the Paris peace commission and is now a United States judge for the Third judicial circuit. His selection will not involve the surrender of that position.
