**CAMPBELL IN HARPER**  
**SOUND SLEEP**  
Exposes to True Populists  
Democracy's Designs.

**SCOFFS AT IMPERIALISM**  
As an Issue, and Scorns  
Democracy's Champions.

Harper, Kan., Oct. 22--In his old home county of Harper, I. P. Campbell on Saturday addressed two audiences, telling them of Democratic duplicity and conspiracy, and advising good Populists who hope to stay out of the Democratic party to vote the Republican ticket this year.

Mr. Campbell's speech was a wretched day. The dust came down the country roads and the streets of the city in clouds which made it almost impossible to see a block ahead. The wind was strong, and the day so decidedly unpleasant that coming any distance to a political meeting or for any other purpose seemed almost folly. Added to that, the Democrats and the Democratic Populists, with their usual tactics when they hear that Campbell is billed for a speech, attempted to keep their fellows away from the meeting.

But in spite of dust and Democrats, when Mr. Campbell stepped to the front of the starry opera house here, he faced a godly array of people, nearly all men, and a large percentage of whom were Populists, largely from the country. Mr. Campbell talked straight out to them. He told them of the serious condition in which the Populist party found itself in the year of 1899; of Democratic treachery and conspiracy; he told how the Democratic party never had done anything progressive and for the people and never would; he went back many campaigns and traced the paramount issues of that party, proving in the end that the only thing the Democratic party sought a paramount issue for was because it thought that on it it might be able to get into office. He had a character sketch of Mr. Stevenson, the Democratic nominee for vice-president, for whom the Populists of Kansas are supposed to vote this year, and for whom Towne, who was acceptable to the Populists, was stricken down. He related Stevenson's history during the civil war, and his political career since the war, when he has always affiliated with Democracy and Cleveland, gold-standard Democracy at that, and then told the Populists that Stevenson was taken because he was too harmless to injure the west, so it was thought, and too acceptable to eastern Democracy to be named in the year 1900 when Democracy was trying to get together with itself and get into office.

Mr. Campbell exposed the hypocrisy of Democracy telling when he read Boner Cookran's and David B. Hill's apologies for supporting Bryan this year and then read some of their diatribes against the Nebraska reform four years ago. Then Mr. Campbell said, they had thought Bryan too dangerous to be tolerated, an anarchist, a Populist, a vicious man; but now, since Bryan had eliminated silver and the Kansas City platform had taken up with "Imperialism," Mr. Campbell said Bryan was good enough for these eastern Democrats.

Mr. Campbell wants to know how the Populists are expected to subordinate all their creeds and take up with imperialism. He wants to know when his party ever made imperialism the paramount issue. He wants to know what there is about imperialism, anyway, that Populists should be expected to forget all about everything else in the way of principles that they hold dear.

Mr. Campbell was the recipient of congratulations from all sides when he finished. His forcefulness was noticeable. His energy was commendable.

Driving to Attila, near where his ranch is, Mr. Campbell spoke at that place Saturday night.

**POPULATION OF ALABAMA**  
Compared as to States of Increase  
With Previous Counts.

Washington, Oct. 20--The census bureau has made public the returns of the population of Alabama. The population of the state in 1900 is 1,828,805, as against 1,523,057 in 1890, representing an increase

since 1890 of 315,690, or 20.3 per cent. This rate of increase is slightly greater than for the decade from 1880 to 1890, when it was 20 per cent, but somewhat less than that for the decade from 1870 to 1880, when it was 23.8 per cent. From 1820 to 1830, the first decennial period in the history of the state, its population increased 12 per cent and in the following decade 20.8 per cent, but subsequently the rate of increase declined until the decade from 1890 to 1900, when it was only 3.4 per cent. The population in 1900 is more than fourteen times as large as the population figure for 1820, in the first census taken at its organization as a state in 1812.

**Home-seekers' Train Wrecked.**  
Helena, Mont., Oct. 20--The first section of the westbound Northern Pacific passenger train, that left St. Paul Tuesday night with a large contingent of home-seekers, was wrecked today near Eddy, sixty miles west of Missoula. An earthslide had displaced a rail and the train left the track. The engineer and fireman were injured seriously and Royce Dorley of Missoula, fatally.

**Armenians Massacres Resumed.**  
Paris, Oct. 20--A special dispatch from Constantinople in the Paris Herald says new and frightful massacres of Armenians have just occurred in the district of Diarbekir. The Musselmans, it is asserted, pillaged, outraged and killed during five days without the intervention of Turkish troops. Eight villages, it is added were entirely destroyed and burned.

**Millions for American Rails.**  
Pittsburg, Pa., Oct. 20--The government of Chile has placed an order with the Carnegie Steel company for 12,000 tons of steel rails. Mr. Alphonse, in speaking of the order said that his government was beginning a new system of development in its colonies in India and Java and that its projects contemplated the expenditure of many millions of dollars, much of which he thought would come to the United States.

**Redmond's Advice to the Irish.**  
London, Oct. 20--John Redmond, M. P., chairman of the Irish Parliamentary party, has issued a manifesto to the Nationalists in which he says he finds that the results of the elections show that the Parrellite split is ended and that there is a universal desire for a united movement based on Parrell's policy of holding aloof from all English parties.

**PRICES ARE MEETING**  
Of What the Farmer Buys  
and What He Sells.

**FARM STAPLES ADVANCE**  
While Manufactured Staples  
are Lowering.

Washington, Oct. 22--A remarkable fall in the prices of manufactures in nearly all the great classes is shown by the official figures of the Treasury Bureau of Statistics prepared for the current number of the Monthly Summary and by the recent issues of Dun's and Bradstreet's. Comparing prices at the beginning of the present month with those at the beginning of the present year, a fall of from 10 per cent to 30 per cent is shown. Tin plate shows a reduction of 34 per cent on October 1, 1900, as compared with January, 1, 1900; refined petroleum, 21 per cent; common window glass, 12 per cent; wire nails, 0 per cent; barbed wire, 25 per cent; Bessemer pig iron, 45 per cent; steel rails, 20 per cent; yellow pine lumber, 1 per cent; sisal rope, 25 per cent; Manila rope, 3 per cent; leather, 10 per cent; shoes of various grades, from 7 per cent to 10 per cent; woolen goods of various grades, from 5 per cent to 12 per cent. The price of leading articles of manufacture and farm production are regularly gathered by the Bureau of Statistics for publication in its monthly Summary of Commerce and Finance, and it is from that source that the publications of Bradstreet's, Dun's Review, The Iron Age, and the Cincinnati Price Current that the figures given herewith are obtained.

What is nearly all the gain relating to manufactured articles shows a reduction in October 1, 1900, as compared with January 1, 1900, nearly all figures on prices of farm products show an advance during the same time. Corn shows an advance from 25 1/2 cents per bushel on January 1, to 44 1/2 cents on October 1; wheat, from 73 cents per bushel on January 1, to 83 cents on October 1; barley, from 45 cents per bushel on January 1, to 59 cents on October 1; hops, from \$4.50 per 100 pounds on January 1, to \$5.20 on October 1; cotton, from 7 1/2-16 cents per pound on January 1, to 10 1/2 cents on October 1; cotton seed, from 12 1/2 per ton on January 1, to 17 1/2 per ton October 1.

**JAPAN CRAVES LEADERSHIP**  
In the Chinese Emergency and Looks to Marquis Ito.  
(Correspondence of the Associated Press)  
Yokohama, Sept. 20--The resignation of the Japanese cabinet and the probable coming into power of Marquis Ito is the theme of the hour. The change came as a surprise, although it was deemed inevitable in the not distant future. It was doubtless unwelcome to Marquis Ito himself, who has by no means yet got his new party in proper trim for harmonious and successful work. Although the latter is well organized, it is made up of many incongruous and warring elements, and early trouble is predicted for it, especially in view of a distribution of officers before it is brought under any sort of discipline. The ostensible cause of the sudden upheaval in politics here is doubtless the real one, namely the necessity which has arisen for a more decidedly strenuous foreign policy in view of the situation in China. It is generally felt that Japan has thus far kept herself too much in the background in the negotiations progressing on the neighboring continent and that the time has come for her to assert herself, her geographical position, her eminent services in the recent recess of the negotiations and, above all, her superior knowledge of what an ought to be in China, all entitling her word and counsel to be held of greater weight than that of any other nation. Marquis Ito is the only man to whom the country can turn in this emergency, as has been the case for many years past, whenever an important crisis has arisen. A significant feature of the present case is to be found in the fact that the marquis is now credited with strong

**WOOD SAYS CUBA IS QUIET**  
Yellow Fever's Ravages Largely Due to Spanish Immigrants.  
New York, Oct. 20--Major General Leonard Wood, governor of Cuba, arrived today from Havana. He will proceed immediately to Washington and return to Havana by way of Tampa, Fla. General Wood said: "I came up from Havana at the request of the department and to make preparations to take my family down to Cuba, as I shall be unable to come up again during the winter. I shall return to Havana before the end of October, in order to be on hand for the constitutional convention, which meets November 4, next. Affairs are quiet in Cuba and the people are busy preparing for the convention. The death rate in Havana, including yellow fever, is smaller than for many years. The recent increase in yellow fever cases is attributed to the large immigration of Spaniards. The immigrants are not immune and are susceptible to the disease not only in this account but from the fact that they have no conception of sanitation when exposed to the effects of the disease. However, we are making arrangements to establish a quarantine system of detaining them on hulks until they can be forwarded to their destinations in the country districts. Of course many will stay in Havana, finding employment in the warehouses and factories, and we must expect to find cases of yellow fever among them."
