VOTE ON RACE LINE

Native Hawaiians Elect Their Delegate to Congress.

HOPE OF RESTORING LIL

Was an Important Factor in the Campaign.

Honolulu, Nov. 16, via San Francisco, Nov. 16.—D. S. Wilcox, the present Royalist candidate, has been elected Hawaiian delegate to congress by a small majority over Samuel Parker, the Republican candidate. His strong vote among the natives in outside districts carried the day against the white and intelligent native voters of the cities. The result of the election produced much depression among all whites, as Wilcox was strongly opposed by Republicans and Democrats alike.

THE REPUBLICANS CARRIED HONOLULU and the island of Oahu for Hon. Samuel Parker by his minority, the Democratic candidate, Prince David Kawānanakoa had only about a third as many votes. Today it is reported that Queen Liliuokalani secretly threw her influence to Wilcox. There is much bitterness against her among the Democrats, who hoped that, even if they did not elect their man, they would at least be able to elect the native vote that Wilcox would be behind Parker.

THE INDEPENDENT PARTY has carried the house of representatives by a large majority. They will have fourteen members of the house, with nine Republicans and six Independents and Democrats. In the senate there will be seven Republicans, eight Independents and one Democrat. With the Independents in control a lively session is anticipated as they are against the ruling system. It is likely, as a result of the election, that congress will be asked to establish some limitations upon the voting privilege.

THE WHITES WANT a property qualification for voters. It is argued that in voting upon a simple color line the majority of natives have shown themselves unfit for universal suffrage. The returns, which are not quite complete, show Wilcox 63 votes ahead. The precincts to be heard from are expected to slightly increase this plurality. Wilcox carried every island but Oahu, where Honolulu is so situated that the population and with a majority of educated natives. The island of Kauai gave more votes to Wilcox than to Parker and David combined.

THE MOST ENCOURAGING feature to the whites of both parties is that the Wilcox majority is so small, which shows that very many races were divided upon other than race lines. If all the natives had cast Wilcox votes his majority on each of the islands would have been much larger than it is. Probably a third of the native population was aligned with the American parties, and it is thought that the future will rapidly increase the proportion.

THE PRESENT PROSPECT is that the congressional committee will be utterly ignored by the commercial and other interests of the islands. It is said that Samuel Parker will go to Washington in an event and that though he will have no official title, he will look after the interests of the islands.

city by the jurisdiction of the district court was discussed and as a result a bill was drawn up to repeal the law giving the court jurisdiction and to have the city regulate their own matters in that respect. Under the present arrangement a property owner only had to file a case in the court and after a fair presentation of the matter he was allowed to have the property taken from the city. This in many cases has been done when the property owner desired to save the taxes which were placed on the property in the city as at the present time.

THE QUESTION of the grade of the various streets in any part of the city is the city is forced to pay the share of the taxes for that purpose. Last year it cost the city and county \$2,000 for the care of the mailboxes situation. The bill which was prepared is as follows:
