GEORGE YOUNG IS OUT

His Friends Announce His Candidacy for Mayor.

BURTON MEN AROUSED

Interesting Contest Is Sure to Result.

It has been announced by the friends of George Young that he will be a candidate for mayor before the Democratic convention which will be held on Saturday, the 9th. This was a surprise to a majority of the Democrats in the city as it had been supposed that James W. Burton had a clean sweep in the mayoralty contest. It was decided just a few days ago that George Young would be a candidate and since that time his friends have been putting forth their best efforts for their man.

The announcement of Young's candidacy has caused consternation in the ranks of Burton's followers. They supposed that the final act of the drama and while they have been working steadily, their efforts were not as determined as they would have been had they known that George Young was to be in the fight. There is talk among the Burton men of some sort of a promise that the Young followers had declared that they would keep out of the race and let Burton have the field this year. Since the announcement that Young is a candidate for the coveted position, the Burton men have been putting forth their best efforts and the contest in the primaries will be a battle royal. While Burton has had the benefit of an organization of longer duration, yet the Young men are not so slow in getting organized themselves. Just what the situation is in regard to the various wards of the city is hard to say, but one thing is certain, the Young faction has caused some commotion in the political machinery of the Democrats in Wichita.

A number of other men have been talked of as candidates for the position of mayor. It has been merely talk, though, for no other man has allowed their names to go before the public as active candidates. It has been claimed by the friends of Sam Amidon that he would be a candidate, but the ex-county attorney has not allowed his name to be used in that sense. If there should be such a strong fight in the convention that a candidate could not be agreed upon, it may be possible that Amidon's supporters would throw their energy into the fight for their man. The ability of George Young to make a campaign in well known and he has a large number of supporters. As has been stated before his candidacy will cause a big fight in the primary set tomorrow.
