

COME TO WICHITA

Merchants Making Regular Trips to This City.

TO WHOLESALE HOUSES

Every Line Is Now Represented Here.

"Let me tell you something which is happening in Wichita today which never happened before," said A. M. Goldstand, of the wholesale hat house, yesterday. "The merchants of the cities in the territory are coming to Wichita to buy. When a merchant in an Oklahoma city, for instance, wants to lay in a general supply of goods, he doesn't wait for the traveling men entirely as he used to do. He wants a little trip and he jumps on the train and comes to Wichita. And he finds every line represented here and goes from one house to another, and sees everything and makes his selection. This custom is growing stronger every day and is becoming part of the life of Wichita."

Inquiry among the wholesalers of Wichita shows that today this city, in a wholesale way, is enjoying the biggest business in its history. Yesterday a gentleman who takes an interest in these matters wrote out this list of Wichita houses which do business outside the city and who have customers in every part of the great Southwest. It is not complete, but it is near enough to be indicative of the magnitude of Wichita's outside trade.

MUSIC AND DRAMA.

"The Angel of the Alley," a new sensational drama in East Side New York life seems to have struck the popular fancy, if we were to believe the press reports of other cities.

The story of the play deals with the ups and downs of Lieut. Bennett, of the U. S. Cavalry. The first act shows us an underground dive where Lieut. Bennett has been decoyed by a beautiful young lady, who afterwards falls deeply in love with him and proves herself "An Angel." It is in this dive that during an altercation over a game of cards, a lamp is hurled at Lieut. Bennett by Harry Morgan, the villain, and during the ensuing darkened scene Morgan takes a revolver from Bennett's sash and shoots his partner in crime and then drops the pistol by Bennett's feet. As his name is on the revolver, Bennett is immediately convicted.

The second act shows us a hut on the Palisades, thereby giving a beautiful prospective view of the Hudson river. It is here where Morgan and his pals have lured the girl, who knows of Bennett's innocence, to fear that she would be called as a witness at the trial. The closing of this act shows a terrific struggle between the girl and Morgan, in which the girl triumphs and escapes.

The third act is a realistic interior view of the death chamber and electrical chair, on the morning of Lieut. Bennett's execution. We are now introduced to all the details accompanying the execution of the criminals in this famous prison: Such as trying the electrical current on the chair, testing the arm, neck and lower limbs, hands, and in fact seeing that everything is in order. The climax of the act is highly sensational, as the heroine bursts through an aperture in the wall, caused by lightning, on horse back with a pardon from the governor, Morgan having confessed while laying at death's door.

The last act is as in all the plays of this class, clear up every difficulty and the curtain falls with everything serene.
