

HAY BARN BURNED

Sixty Tons Stored in Room on West Douglas.

ORIGIN IS NOT KNOWN

Damage to Building and Contents About \$2,000.

Fire broke out in the store room at 219 West Douglas last night and destroyed sixty tons of hay belonging to J. H. Turner and the household goods of the families living above the room and did considerable damage to the stock and machinery of the Jones Churn Manufacturing company. The cause of the fire is unknown as it started in the hay.

The alarm was turned in from Longacker's barn at 12:30 and the fire department was soon on the ground and laid four lines of hose.

The value of the hay was about \$500 and the damage to the building will reach \$1,000 and the damage to the furniture in the second floor was about \$500. The hay was insured for about half its value, but there was no insurance on the household goods or the contents of the churn factory.

The building is in charge of C. L. Davidson and it could not be learned last night whether it was insured or not.

Mrs. H. E. Thompson said that she had smelled smoke in her rooms about 9 o'clock last night that smelled as if hay was burning and she spoke to her husband about it. Mr. Thompson looked into the building, but did not see any indication of fire. Several men were in the building yesterday and it is supposed that the fire was caused by a match being dropped on the floor.

The families of Harry Burt, a barber, L. Hovora, a hack driver, H. Black, a hack driver, J. R. Triffin, a laborer, and A. D. Kepler, lived on the second floor of the building. Their goods were damaged more by water and smoke than by the fire. The fire broke out through the second floor, but did little damage.

The fire was a head one for the department as the room was filled to the ceiling with baled hay and the heat made it impossible to drag the stuff out. An entrance was finally effected through the rear wall and the hay taken out as fast as the smoke and heat would let the men work. The hay was still smoldering at 2:30 and will probably continue to burn for several hours.

REPORTS TO CITY COURT

County Attorney Tells Him to Go Home.

The deputy sheriff then went to the telephone and called up County Attorney Conly and asked him what he should do. He answered to tell Gordon Hill to go home and report next Monday morning when some of the officers and Judge Harvey would be present.

Mr. Hill had to go home and he will report next Monday. A reporter for the Eagle saw Mr. Hill buggy riding last night and asked him if he had been trying to break jail. He was not, but he had seen by the Eagle that a warrant had been issued for him and he took bondsmen and went up to see about it. He said he was not guilty and he would be on hand to face his accusers and that he had been tendered any amount of bond so that he had no idea of going to jail.
