Chicago, Oct. 18.—Speculative activity on the board of trade today was confined chiefly to wheat, which closed higher for December.

December wheat at the opening registered a gain of 1/2 cent over night in response to an advance at Liverpool and additional news of the evil effects of dry weather in Argentina.

The oats market was a narrow one. Elevator interests offered moderately at the best price, but values held in sympathy with the surrounding market.

Provisions were quiet and prices easier because the run of hogs was greater than had been expected.
