

FOSSETT NOW U. S. MARSHAL

Appointment Made Yesterday By the President.

TO SUCCEED THOMPSON

One of the Pioneer Settlers of Kingfisher County.

AN OLD TIME OFFICER

Served in Kansas Towns in the Early Days.

Washington, March 29.—(Special.)—The Eagle correspondent has positive information tonight that United States Marshal Harry Thompson of Oklahoma has resigned and that President Roosevelt has appointed William D. Fossett, his chief deputy, to succeed him. The information has come from such eminent authority that it cannot be doubted.

W. D. Fossett, made the race into Oklahoma on April 22, 1890. He was at the west line on a fine horse and when the shot-signal was fired he sprang to the front. He made a famous ride and was the first man on the farm in which the town of Kingfisher was built. He was immediately on the south of him, there being two town organizations at that time which subsequently became one under the name of Kingfisher. The crowd was rampant in those days and one day a mob went to the land of Fossett to settle upon it. He stood inside his barbed wire fence with a Winchester and the shadow of a dreadful tragedy seemed to hang over the place. The crowd saw in Fossett's face, blue eyes that he meant business and not a man stepped across the line of his land. He was a noted man in Kingfisher from that hour.

When Harry Thompson was appointed United States Marshal, Fossett was made his chief deputy. Previous to that time he had done good work in reading Oklahoma of its outlaws, being in several expeditions where desperate men were to deal with.

FIRE

DESTROYING A BIG HUTCHINSON HOUSE.

AT POINT OF DEATH

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RETURN TO CHRIST

DEMOCRATIC PLANS GIVEN

Would Give Filipino People Their Independence.

ON VERY LIBERAL TERMS

Within a Year After Hostilities Had Ceased.

SOME RIGHTS RESERVED

Among Them Land for Army, Navy and Coaling Stations.

Washington, March 29.—The Democratic members of the senate committee on the Philippines today agreed upon a sub for the Philippine government to be offered. It provides for the restoration of the islands to the United States on very liberal terms, which are set forth that the United States shall relinquish all claims of sovereignty over the Philippine archipelago, but that the United States shall continue to occupy and govern the archipelago until the people thereof shall have established a government and until sufficient guarantees have been obtained for the performance of our treaty obligations with Spain and for the safety of those inhabitants who have adhered to the United States and for the maintenance and protection of all rights which have accrued under the authority thereof.

A constitutional convention is provided for, the members of which are to be selected by voters who speak and write English, Spanish or any of the languages of the archipelago. This convention is to number 50 persons, and is to meet in Manila not more than a year from the cessation of hostilities in the islands. This convention is to proceed to form a constitution and organize such government as they may deem best adapted to promote the welfare and secure the peace and happiness of the inhabitants of said islands; provided, that said convention shall provide as follows:

First—That they shall belong to the United States and continue to be the property thereof, and the United States shall guarantee to the said convention for a naval, military and coaling stations and terminals for submarine cables, the same to continue under the control and sovereignty of the United States.

Second—To carry into effect the treaty obligations of the United States with the kingdom of Spain and for the maintenance and protection of all rights and property acquired under the authority of the United States.

Third—That no inhabitant of said archipelago shall ever be permitted to possess or acquire property on account of his or her adherence to the kingdom of Spain.

It is then to be the duty of the president of the United States to issue his proclamation declaring the independence of the people of the archipelago.

The president is also authorized and requested to negotiate an agreement between the United States and the Philippine archipelago and Great Britain, France and such other powers as he may deem best, providing for the perpetual neutrality and inviolability from all foreign interference with the territory of the archipelago and also for equal opportunities to trade between the archipelago and foreign countries.

Full amnesty is granted to all the inhabitants of the islands on account of political offenses and the hearing of arms against the United States.

Within sixty days from the election of officers under the Philippine constitution and their inauguration, the president is to cause the armed forces of the United States to be reduced to the minimum as specified as possible.

TELEPHONING TO BE DONE FROM RAPIDLY MOVING TRAINS.

Omaha, Neb., March 29.—W. B. Knieken, general passenger agent of the Chicago & Northwestern, called on a local newspaper office from Chicago, when the long distance telephone in an observation car of the new Northwestern-Cairo Pacific overland train is installed next week. The arrangement is to have a telephone in each observation car, and was carried on for the purpose of facilitating the new arrangements for telephoning from the train. The new telephone arrangement is the first of its kind and is installed for the convenience of passengers who wish to communicate with their homes without leaving the train. There will be stations at Chicago, Omaha, Ogden and Oakland, California.

RETURN TO CHRIST

Pope Leo Declares the Present Condition of Society.

Rome, March 29.—The Pope today published a long encyclical letter. After thanking God for prolonged life, he reiterates once more the teachings he has already promulgated in the Catholic world. He declares the present condition of the church and the present state of society as having drifted into a state of anarchy. He attributes the people to return to Christ and the Roman pontiff as the only source where the world can hope to obtain peace and salvation.
