

TUBBS FOUND DEAD IN THE OKLA HOTEL

Was in the Best of Health When He Retired Last Night.

CAUSE, HEART FAILURE

He Was Superintendent of College Buildings and Ground

Guthrie, O. T., April 2-N. W. Tubbs, superintendent of the buildings at the A. and N. colored university at Langston, and in charge of the grounds at the Ton-lawa preparatory school, was found dead in his bed at the Oklahoma hotel in this city, this afternoon. The supposition is that the deceased came to his death by heart disease. Mr. Tubbs came here Monday from his home at Newrick, and went to Langston yesterday. He returned last night, stopping at the Oklahoma. At six o'clock he ate a hearty supper and retired early. In the best of health. He was in the habit of leaving the city on some of the early trains, and when he did not appear for breakfast nothing was thought of it. A meeting of the board of regents of the Langston school was scheduled for this afternoon, at which meeting Mr. Tubbs was expected to be present and take part in the business. He did not come, and a messenger was sent to the hotel to ascertain his whereabouts. The porter went into his room and found the door locked. The lock was broken and when entering the room it was found that Mr. Tubbs was dead, evidently having expired some time during the night. The body was discovered, death having come early in the night. Nothing could be found in the room that would indicate either that the deceased came to his death by heart disease. The deceased was a resident of Newrick, where he was a contractor and builder. He has a family living there now. He was about 47 years of age and a close friend of Governor Jenkins, by whom he was appointed to the office which he held at the time of his death. Telegrams were sent this afternoon to relatives in Newrick and friends in other parts of the territory. It is expected that some members of the family will come here on the night train from the north to take charge of the remains.

NELSON ISSUES ORDER

Permitting Cattle to Be Shipped From Ponca Reservation

Guthrie, O. T., April 2.—The following statement was issued by the Oklahoma Live Stock Sanitary Commission today. It was received from Washington and is in regard to the changing of the quarantine lines in the Ponca-Indian reservation. "It is hereby ordered that section 7 of H. A. 1 order 85, dated January 19, 1902, be amended so as to permit the shipment of cattle for other purposes than immediate slaughter to points in the non-infected areas from that portion of the Ponca Indian reservation, Oklahoma, situated south of the Salt Fork of the Arkansas river and east of the right of way

Miller, of Oklahoma City, at a price of \$1,850. The plans for the monument were submitted to the parents of the dead soldier and were decided upon. The terrible winter last year made an appropriation for the monument, which was followed by a fund prepared by the citizens of Hennessey, which aggregated in all, \$2,000. The remains of Roy Y. Cashion were brought from Cuba a few months ago, and interred in the cemetery at Hennessey.

PARDON FOR ELDRIDGE

INSPECTOR IS AT WORK AT GUTHRIE NOW

Investigating Old Charges Made Against Ferguson.

REGARDED AS A JOKE

Holmes the Affidavit Maker Cannot be Found.

Guthrie, O. T., April 2.—The "affidavit man" has not ceased his operations in Oklahoma. The inspector who is looking up the McAttee matter in Enid was here yesterday and today, in regard to the charges filed last December against Governor Ferguson and John P. Renshaw, who are chairman and secretary respectively of the territorial Republican central committee. Both men were at that time federal office holders, and during the campaign circulars were sent out over the territory by the finance committee, consisting of McNeal, Cottingham, Greer, Jones and others, with the names of Ferguson and Renshaw signed, asking for funds. There is a federal law covering this matter, and the finance committee acted without the knowledge of the other men. As soon as Ferguson discovered that the circulars had been sent out, they were recalled and others sent out over the territory, signed by the finance committee. It was thought that nothing would come of the matter, but before Ferguson's appointment circulars were prepared and filed with the interior department, signed by John Holmes. A short time after the charges were filed a letter was sent to John Holmes at Guthrie, which was afterwards returned by the postoffice authorities here, stating that there was no such person as Holmes receiving mail at the office. It is believed that a meeting was held in this city and these charges prepared and a fictitious name signed, in order that the man bringing the charges might not be brought before the public. Jos. W. McNeal, a member of the finance committee, made a statement to the effect that Ferguson had nothing to do with the circulars, and that he and other members of the finance committee were responsible for the circular letter. Governor Ferguson stated this afternoon that he believed that nothing would come of the matter, and that it was only an attempt to embarrass him in his present office. Even if the circulars were sent out by Ferguson and Renshaw, probably nothing would come of the matter at this time, as Renshaw is out of office and Ferguson is no longer postmaster of Watonga, which was the case during the campaign.

TESTIFIES IN THE PEOPLES MURDER TRIAL

Says Mrs. Peoples Acknowledged Their Home Was Ruined.

Oklahoma City, O. T., April 2.—In the case of the territory of Oklahoma against W. P. Peoples for the murder of McLaughlin, Sallis Jackson, a domestic servant in the Peoples household, gave testimony favorable to the defense. She told Mr. Phillips and wife being in the Peoples' residence on Tuesday evening before the tragedy. Mr. Peoples and Mr. Phillips went down town. Witness saw Mr. Peoples when he came back. Mrs. Peoples was not at home. She had some way with McLaughlin. Witness came to her and said she was going to see Bennett's. McLaughlin met her at the corner under the electric light, and caught up with her on the crossing and they went on together. When Mr. Peoples came back and asked where Mrs. Peoples was, witness said she had gone to see Bennett's. He asked who had come with her. Witness replied "the young man who works at Haley's drug store." He asked if the young man was in the habit of coming there. The witness answered "yes, sir." Witness said McLaughlin never came there when Mr. Peoples was at home. Mrs. Peoples would be there. On the Tuesday evening before the homicide Mr. and Mrs. Peoples went down town and returned together, when Peoples picked his grip to go away. When he left Mrs. Peoples went some distance with him. After supper, Mrs. Peoples, the children and witness went up stairs to retire. Mrs. Peoples later asked witness if she did not hear a noise in the back porch. Mrs. Peoples went down and put her arms around him and both cried. Witness then went away from the house and stayed all night. She had only seen McLaughlin at the house twice but had heard him there at other times. "The prosecution objected to this latter clause and it was stricken from the court record. Robert A. Myer told of meeting Peoples the morning of the tragedy on Main street in front of Boston Wilson's drug store. He had halted Peoples and the latter was walking with his head down and did not recognize him. He halted Peoples and the latter was looking sad, stopped, looked around and shook hands. He noticed Peoples was looking sad and tears were on his face. In answer to questions Peoples had stated that his home was ruined and he had nothing to live for. He had also met Peoples on the previous day and at the time his face was red and his eyes were of glassy appearance. In answer to a question from the prosecution witness said Peoples was sober at that time.

ENCAMPMENT WAITING FOR INVITATIONS

From Some Community That Wants the Organization.

SEPTEMBER IS THE TIME

Oklahoma City Working on Organization of Battery.

Guthrie, O. T., April 2.—Adjutant General Burlingame is actively at work preparing for the next annual encampment of the Territorial National Guards. An order has been issued, authorizing the holding of an encampment, but no time or place has been decided on. It is probable, however, that the encampment will be held in September, as it was decided last year not to hold the encampment as late as it was held then. The companies over the territory are being recruited up to the maximum limit, and it is anticipated that at least 500 men will be in attendance at the encampment. A battery has been organized at Oklahoma City, but there may be some difficulty in securing equipment. Under existing conditions it will be necessary for the militia department to purchase the equipment, but if a bill is passed which is now pending in congress, the Oklahoma City battery will get its equipment free of all charges, being furnished by the war department at Washington. As yet no invitations have been received from cities asking for the encampment but these will begin to come in soon. It is understood that Guthrie will be an active candidate for this meeting, as Guthrie got out of the race last year in favor of Perry.

BOOKS ARE REMOVED

From the Land Office at Perry to the Guthrie Office.

Guthrie, O. T., April 2.—The records and books of the Perry land office have been transferred to this city, and two clerks are now in charge of the business in the Perry district. The change was made a few days ago, and everything with the Perry office was moved here. This will make the land office here a busy place, as there is much business since the districts have been consolidated.

FAVOR COLORED WOMEN

Massachusetts Newspaper Ladies Will Stand by Them.

Boston, April 2.—The newspaper women of New England at a meeting here today took decisive action on the color question. The following resolution was adopted: "Resolved: That the New England Women Press association instruct its delegates to the biennial meeting of the general federation of women's clubs to be held in Los Angeles, Cal., in May, to consider all discussions and legislative acts of the convention, the necessity of maintaining the rights of our colored club women as of paramount importance. To this end they shall vote for reorganization on state lines, according to the Massachusetts plan, if given opportunity; or for the best substitute of this measure approved by the leaders of the state delegation at the time, preserving the unity of the states vote and influence by concerted action with other delegates."

SETTLERS BY THOUSANDS

Are Getting Into Northwest Country Through St. Paul.

St. Paul, April 2.—During the past 24 hours over 2,000 settlers have left St. Paul for northwestern points along the Northern Pacific, Great Northern and Bow lines. The number includes those who have been delayed in the city because of the trouble around Bismarck and those who poured into St. Paul today on the early trains from central and southern points. The number of settlers who will pass through the St. Paul gateway on Thursday will in all probability be larger than that of today. The train loads of emigrants, mules and livestock which have been held at Minnesota transfer because of the blockade commenced to move forward last night, and the congestion of business at that point is largely broken.

BRINGING TROOPS HOME

Cholera at Manila Hastens Work of War Department.

Washington, April 2.—In order to expedite the return home of troops in the Philippines, the secretary of war has directed that transports sail from San Francisco for Manila according to the following schedule: Kilpatrick, April 20; Sherman, April 26; Crane, April 27; Logan, May 1. With the transports already on their way to Manila, and those already there, it is calculated that all the troops that have been in the Philippines since 1899 will be back in the United States or on their way home by June 1 next. One reason for hurrying these troops home is the prevalence of cholera in the Philippines.


