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WITH A TIGHT REIN

Bulls Ruled the Corn Pit at Chicago Yesterday.

MADE PRICES ADVANCE

Wheat Also Higher and So Were Provisions.

Chicago, April 12.—Corn bulls had a tight rein on the grain markets today and easily sent prices soaring. Everything in the corn situation was bullish, and with a good show of strength in wheat, trade became active. Closing prices for May wheat were 5 1/2c higher.

Interest in corn easily outran all else of a speculative nature. The gradual advance of the past week seemed to have been preparing the country for destructive action in this market. The depressed stock in the Southwest market and given St. Louis and Kansas City good argument for advancing markets, and today, when the cable list showed wheat and the Southwest was still stronger and cheaper marketplaces of 7 1/2c, buyers cheaper article in this market, prices responded with vigor. To augment the growing bullish sentiment, receipts were light. The early easy feeling in wheat retarded an immediate bullish response in corn, and May corn closed 5c higher at unchanged and closed very strong. Shippers were not so sure, although many covered, they still had a bad day. The common belief among traders was that stocks at St. Louis and Kansas City had been reduced to such an extent that those places must supply their actual demands in Chicago. Speculators of offerings accelerated the upward-tendency of the bull crowd keeping a tight grip on their lines for further profits. The market was very nervous and active at times, though, because of the disposition not to sell, and closed very strong.
