

TERRITORIAL PATRONAGE NOT USED

For Interests of McGuire in Congressional Campaign.

FERGUSON CALLS A HALT

He Brands All Such Stories as Untrue.

NO ORGANIZATION FIGHT

Governor Tells Plain Story of Convention.

Guthrie, O. T., June 27.—A daily paper printed outside of Oklahoma having published an article which would indicate that there had been a split in the Republican territorial organization at the End convention, Governor Ferguson was asked by a correspondent of the Eagle for a statement as to the facts relative to that convention.

"No, there was no anti-organization fight, no anti-Flynn fight in that convention, although persons claiming to represent the organization tried hard to inaugurate that kind of a fight on Mr. McGuire," said Governor Ferguson.

"I arrived at End on Tuesday evening and having accepted an invitation to enjoy the hospitality of a friend in the eastern part of the city, did not go to the scene of the convention until after supper on Tuesday evening. I ascertained that reports had been circulated by the opponents of Mr. McGuire that he was making an anti-organization fight, that his friends were heartily supporting him in this, and that the so-called organization was being lined up against Mr. McGuire. I went to most of the members of the territorial Republican committee to find out what I could do as to the facts in the case. It was soon apparent that there was no anti-organization fight being made except by persons who were claiming to represent the organization, who were trying to bring out that kind of a fight. Such a convention had not been held in this territory for many years. It was wrong and not in harmony with Republican ideas in conducting a convention. In company with other friends of the organization I commenced to try to eliminate that feature of the fight, and after the agreement was made by the members of the organization for the convention but little was heard about the organization or anti-organization.

"The candidates, it seemed for a time, could not agree upon a man for chairman and a man for secretary of the convention. When a man would be proposed by one candidate it was objected by the other candidates that they were trying to gain an advantage in some way, and a conclusion could not be reached. Knowing Colonel Lincoln to be an organization man, and a man who had not been identified in any way with the feature of the convention, he was chosen for chairman. He was a man capable of presiding with dignity at the convention, a man of honor, and a man whose name would be in justice to every candidate in that convention. I proposed him to the candidates and he was agreed upon. I also proposed Mr. Kimber of Kiowa county, as secretary, knowing him to be entirely free from any factional quarrel during the past.

"Mr. McGuire did not object to Judge Burford as chairman, did not object to Frank Green as chairman, and did not object to George Orner as chairman, and did not object to John Buecher as chairman, on any personal grounds, as was stated in the dispatch to the paper referred to. End had two candidates for chairman of the convention. It was not deemed best to select one and ignore the other. It is true that Mr. McGuire did make a strong appeal for a man from Oklahoma City for chairman, and gave as his reasons that Oklahoma City was getting nothing from the convention and should have representation.

"The article published in the daily paper referred to was misleading, and its tendency was to create discord after the convention had been held. There has been no split in the history of Oklahoma. The publication of a convention in which the deliberations of the main were more fair. The candidates had not made a campaign of mud-slinging or personalities, and there were no scores to settle. After the result of the convention was announced, I defeated candidate acquiesced in the true spirit of Republicanism and commenced whooping it up for McGuire.

"To repeat to the statement made in that paper to the effect that territorial patronage had been used in the interest of Mr. McGuire, I would state that it is utterly false. The article recently published to convey the impression that an organization fight was made on Mr. McGuire, and that the interference of the governor of the territory prevented the being successful. That was untrue. Such a statement is an insult to the Republican territorial organization of Oklahoma, placing it in the attitude of opposing the nominee for congress and losing out in the attempt. The article was evidently inspired by some one other than the correspondent, someone who had attempted to make a fight and lost out. There is a large volume in almost every instance, which is not commendable, to say the least, and the person who evidently inspired that article was not a candidate before the convention, and had no interest in any candidate whose name went before the convention. The candidates whose names were presented to the End convention on last Wednesday were all above methods of that character in politics. They were men whose honor and integrity were not allowed them to be in any way connected with that character. It all evidently emanated from some one who wanted to do something and did not know how, who felt just a little bit disappointed over what he considered a defeat and tried to cast the blame on the governor of the territory by charging him with stopping the

organization in the so-called fight against Mr. McGuire. A poll of the old organization, in my judgment, would show that a large per cent of the members were personally friendly towards McGuire, but all of them were friendly toward each candidate before that convention.

"The time has come in the history of Oklahoma's politics to quit talking organization and anti-organization. It seems to me of greater importance than any organization or any so-called faction that might be built up within it. At least, we have reached that stage today. The organization at this time constitutes the Republican party of Oklahoma, and in that organization every man who believes in the principles of the Republican party is a Republican party in name. All past differences should and must be eliminated, and when a man begins to talk organization and anti-organization in the future, look upon him with suspicion; he has a personal motive about him somewhere. This statement may be in the plain, but it is true, and it is necessary to be heard by the whole people for those who imagine that somebody is trying to fight them.

"Never before in the history of Oklahoma was a greater demonstration made for a candidate than was made for Mr. McGuire after he was nominated. New Man Takes Charge of Alva Normal July 1.

CHANGES IN FACULTY

Normal Board Meets at Edmond Next Week.

Guthrie, O. T., June 27.—On the first of July the term of James E. Ament as president of the Northwestern Territorial Normal school at Alva expires. On that day T. W. Conway of Sterling, Kan., takes charge of the school, having been appointed to that position three months ago. President Conway has made a visit here immediately. The board of education for normal schools will meet next Tuesday at Edmond to arrange for the fall terms of the two normal schools. The faculties will be slated and in the Northwestern Normal there will be several changes. There are many applications for places on the faculty, but as far as possible the board will favor Oklahoma teachers.

How many members of the faculty will retire is not known, but at the last meeting of the board it was the sentiment of the members that changes must be made. During the first months of the Ferguson administration nothing gave the governor more annoyance than the Alva school. Protests against President Ament's requests for his removal were received daily. Letters were written by Alva citizens asking for his retention. The matter finally culminated at the last meeting of the board of education, when it was decided that a new man should succeed Ament on the first of July.

President Ament attended the meeting at Edmond and accepted the decision of the board. He promised Governor Ferguson that he would have no more trouble from that source, as he was at the head of the normal and he has kept his word. For days after Ament's return to Alva Governor Ferguson heard nothing of the normal school, and it was not for several weeks that he secured accurate information relative conditions at Alva.

With the retirement of President Ament one of the best organizers in Oklahoma goes out of public life. To President Ament, more than to any other person, is given the credit of building the great educational institution of northwestern Oklahoma and one in which all residents of that portion of the territory unite their pride.

The coming session of the board of education will be an important one and will probably last for several days. The board consists of Auditor L. W. Baxter, Treasurer C. W. Rambo, Guthrie; C. M. Thacker, Mangum; E. B. Rankin, Edmond; George E. Nichol, Alva.
