

\$5,760,717 IN THE BANKS OF OKLAHOMA

Decrease Since Report Made in March of \$1,202,811.

NO CAUSE IS ASSIGNED

Report Is Made by Bank Commissioner Cooper.

Guthrie, O. T., July 10.—Territorial Bank Commissioner Paul F. Cooper and his deputy, H. W. Pentecost, have completed the consolidated report of the condition of the banks reporting to the bank commission. The report is up to the close of business on June 11, and shows deposits in 36 banks aggregating \$5,760,717.25. There has been a decrease in deposits since March 12, 1902 aggregating \$1,202,811.61.

FRANTZ MAKES PROPOSITION. Whereby the Denver, End and Gulf Will Go to Guthrie.

Guthrie, O. T., July 10.—Edmond Frantz and Senator H. E. Havens, representing the Denver, End & Gulf railroad company, now building toward Guthrie from End and eventually toward Denver, Colo., were in the city yesterday from End to make a proposition to Guthrie to build the road sure to this city instead of to Oklahoma City. The proposition was submitted to the Guthrie Commercial club, which, in turn, submitted a verbal counter proposition. The two propositions will be submitted in writing at a meeting next week, and the two parties will attempt to come to terms by which Guthrie will get the road.

EDWARDS IN OKLAHOMA. Petitions for the Governor for the Condemnation of School Lands.

Guthrie, O. T., July 10.—Hon. W. C. Edwards, formerly state secretary of Kansas, was in the city yesterday as the general solicitor for the Orient railroad company, and filed with the governor the right-of-way papers, asking for the condemnation of certain school lands in western Oklahoma, over which the Orient railroad will pass.

GRADUATES OF OKLAHOMA. Logan County Leads in Number, and Washita in Showing Made.

Guthrie, O. T., July 10.—Superintendent I. W. Baxter has received reports from 41 of the counties in the territory, with four exceptions, announcing the number of common school graduates. Logan county has the largest number of graduates of any county, aggregating 177.

The hanging will take place at 12 o'clock in the Pottawatomie county jail. The warrant was signed in Oklahoma City.

ILLINOIS RACE OUTRAGES. Governor Orders a Squad of Militia to Proceed to Danado.

Springfield, Ill., July 10.—Governor Yates today ordered Colonel Theodore Smart, assistant adjutant general of Illinois, to proceed to Eldorado, Salina county, with a squad of infantry and protect the lives and property of negro residents there, who, during the past month have been subjected to outrages at the hands of white citizens.

PURE FOOD CONVENTION. Elects Officers and Appoints Committee to Prepare Legislation.

Portland, Ore., July 10.—The National Pure Food association today appointed a committee of three, consisting of J. M. Blackburn of Ohio, A. H. Jones of Illinois and John Hamilton of Pennsylvania, to draft a pure food bill to be presented to the next session of Congress.

DAM IS WEAKENING. Lawrence, Kansas, Is Threatened by Kan River.

Lawrence, Kan., July 10.—The high water in the Kan river here has caused the dam to weaken. Fears are entertained of a break in the dam and a big force of men is at work strengthening the weak place as fast as they appear. The river is now nine feet deep over the dam and the water is still rising.

FLOODS AT MANHATTAN. Six Feet of Water Covers the Blue River Valley Railroad.

Manhattan, Kan., July 10.—The Kaw and the Blue rivers are both overflowing their banks and flooding the lowlands at Manhattan. Throughout the river valleys much damage is being done to crops and the high water from their tributaries is causing a steady rise. The river is flowing over the six feet of the Union Pacific bridge and sixteen inches

extended to them. Washington, July 10.—Secretary Root has received a cablegram from Acting Governor Wright in the Philippines making a general denial of the charge of proselyting by teachers among Catholic students in the Philippine schools. The cablegram shows a complete investigation was made of the allegations.

POLICE CHIEF BOUNCED. Turkish-Bulgarian Fight Shut Averted by Turkey.

Constantinople, July 10.—The threatened Turkish-Bulgarian complications arising from the forcible removal of the flag and coat of arms of the Bulgarian agency at Serres, Rumeilia, for which Bulgars demanded satisfaction have been averted by the dismissal of the chief of police of Serres and Turkey's recognition of Bulgaria's agency there.

ROCK ISLAND FOR DALLAS. Citizens Offer a Bonus of \$50,000 for Entrance to City.

Dallas, Texas, July 10.—Contracts have been signed here by a citizen's committee and the Rock Island company by which that road is guaranteed a bonus of \$50,000 for a right-of-way into the city. The survey has already been made and the road is expected to begin its service into Dallas via Fort Worth within three months.

WASHOUTS IN NEBRASKA. Rock Island Trains Compelled to Go Over Burlington.

Denver, Colo., July 10.—In consequence of serious washouts on the Rock Island railroad near Fairbury, Neb., the Rock Island's passenger trains were run today over the Burlington road between Denver and Lincoln, Neb. This arrangement will continue in effect until repairs are completed on the Rock Island road.

PAGE GOING TO TEXAS. California Scholar to Join Texas University Faculty.

Berkeley, Cal., July 10.—Thomas W. Page, assistant professor of history and economics at the University of California, has accepted the professorship of political science in the University of Texas, and has resigned the position here.

LANDERS' THROAT CUT. It Is Alleged to Be Result of Freight Handlers' Strike.

Chicago, July 10.—Landers, a freight handler, was killed last night, his death being the indirect result of the strike. Landers announced that he intended to return to work today and a group of freight handlers to whom he made the declaration began to abuse him. A short time afterward he was found in a hallway with his throat cut.

THREE DOZEN STRIKERS. Have Been Arrested at Pueblo for Acting as Pickets.

Pueblo, Colo., July 10.—Three dozen strikers have been arrested by the deputies of Sheriff Beaman for acting as pickets in front of boycotted restaurants. About a fourth of the number were women. The arrests have followed the tragedy of a few days ago when a young man, son of the proprietor, arranged by the picketing of pickets in front of his mother's restaurant and their efforts to turn away customers, shot one of the pickets dead and wounded a policeman.

ENGLISH LORD DEAD. William Merton Eaton Dies After Life of 59 Years.

London, July 10.—Lord Chylesmore, (William Merton Eaton) died here today. He was born in 1843. Lord Chylesmore is succeeded by his brother, Major General, the Hon. Herbert Eaton, whose wife was Miss Elizabeth French, daughter of the late F. G. French of New York.

COMBS GIVES ULTIMATUM. Religious Houses Will Be Forcibly Closed After a Week.

Paris, July 10.—The minister, M. Combes, has instructed the prefects of all the departments to notify the religious orders, who have not complied with the law of associations, that unless they are dissolved within a week, their establishments will be forcibly closed. Two thousand establishments are involved.

BRITISH MEDICAL JOURNALS ATTACK MINISTER. Stories About King's Health.

London, July 10.—An authoritative statement regarding the health of King Edward was published in today's issue of the British Medical Journal.

The wound, though still deep, is granulating well. During the last two days the improvement in his majesty's general health has been remarkably rapid. The king has regained his strength almost completely and is able to take restricted diet with a good appetite.

The Lancet also stigmatizes as "base" the sensational rumors circulated and says: "There is not and never has been the faintest shadow of a suspicion of any malignant disease." The Lancet specifically asserts that the king is free from cancer.

BROWNFIELD IS JAILED. Man Who Was Witness in Jessie Morrison Case Held for Perjury. El Dorado, Kan., July 10.—Dr. J. C. Brownfield, who created a sensation at the recent trial of Jessie Morrison by testifying that he heard Mrs. Castle call Mrs. Morrison from the street on the day of the fatal fight between the two women and who was arrested charged with perjury, has been bound over to the district court. In default of \$5,000 bail, he was sent to jail.

QUEEN OPENS BAZAAR. It Is the Biggest Affair of the Kind Ever Held in London. London, July 10.—The coronation bazaar which is probably the biggest affair of its kind ever held, and an organization which was chiefly due to the energy of Mrs. Cornelius Adair, Mrs. Joseph H. Choate, wife of the United States ambassador and other prominent Americans, was opened by Queen Alexandra this afternoon.

FRIGHTENED BUT CALM. Volcanic Cloud Again Appears Over Hartington. Fort Francis, Martinique, July 10.—Between 8 and 5 o'clock yesterday evening a volcanic cloud, charged with electricity, appeared in the sky. The cloud was intensely black and seemed to be filled with lightning bolts and was accompanied by loud thundering and the atmosphere was distressingly warm. The population was frightened but remained calm.

MONEY COMING WEST. About \$2,500,000 Coming in Chicago, St. Louis and New Orleans. New York, July 10.—The money movement to western and southwestern points continues. From \$1,800,000 to \$1,000,000 was shipped direct to Chicago banks today and \$1,000,000 to New Orleans. The local correspondent of a St. Louis bank deposited \$1,000,000 in the St. Louis bank to direct the circulation of another St. Louis institution, which has been absorbed.

CRISIS MORE ACUTE. Lancashire Must Restrict the Output of Cotton. London, July 10.—The cotton crisis in Lancashire is becoming more acute and the trade regards a heavy reduction of the output as being the only salvation. A meeting has been called for tomorrow, to consider the steps to be taken to avert a just action of the spinners in restricting their output, as was done during the last few summers. The general opinion is that a more extensive sale than hitherto will be necessary to avoid heavy losses.

CANADIAN TENNIS GAMES CONTINUED. Niagara Falls, Ont., July 10.—The Canadian tennis championships were continued on the Queen's tennis courts today. In the men's singles finals and the women's singles finals, the present champion, on Saturday.

ATTORNEY FLYNNER IS DEAD. Hamilton, Ont., July 10.—Attorney Flynn was dead here after a long illness. He was the first city attorney of Hamilton and was a member of the state legislature in the 70s. He served through the civil war as captain of an Indian regiment.

POSTMASTER GENERAL PAYS RECENT STRIKE WITH A CANAL. Washington, July 10.—Postmaster General Payne announces the story recently published to the effect that the cabinet was divided on the trust question, part of its members hotly insisting that the

president's policy, to be "a ridiculous canard." It is said that the trust question has not been discussed recently in the cabinet at all, but that the president and the attorney general have taken the ground that they were merely enforcing the law and not developing any new or comprehensive policy. In the same way Mr. Roosevelt and Mr. Knox have from time to time discussed the anthracite coal strike, viewing it in the light of their obligation as executive officers. There could be no division in the cabinet over so simple a program as this.

TRAGEDY OF SHOTGUN. Child's Face Torn Away by the Older Sister. Hutchinson, Kan., July 10.—Agnes Ballard, aged 2 years, was shot accidentally and killed here today by her 15-year-old sister, who was trying to close the breach of a shotgun left open by her brother. The child's face was torn away.

DR. LAUGHLIN ACCEPTS. Will Leave Princeton for Congregational Seminary of Berkeley. Princeton, N. J., July 10.—Dr. Laughlin, instructor in the Bible at Princeton University, has accepted a call to the chair of New Testament literature in the Pacific Congregational Theological Seminary of Berkeley, Cal. Dr. Laughlin graduated from Princeton University in 1883 and the Theological Seminary in 1897.

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
