National Banks of This City Make A Good Showing

THEIR FOUNDATION SECURE

More Attention Is Paid to Securities Than High Interest.

The three National banks of this city have just completed their statements of their business and the condition of their banks at the close of business on the sixteenth day of this month, as per call by the comptroller of the currency.

To the average reader a bank statement is all like Chinese characters of which he knows nothing, but to the people who have taken the trouble to find out something about banks, the combined statements of the National banks of this city will convey some pleasing facts and conditions.

What the people want to know is that the banks are safe places in which to deposit money. Any honestly managed bank is safe, and the National banks of this city are no exception of a short time during the boom, when everybody was carried off their feet, shows that the people here are reasonably good about getting the money they borrow out of the banks.

Now, then, for the statements. They show that there are deposited in the National banks of this city the best sum of \$2,000,000. This is the amount of money they would have in any of the banks if every one of them should call for his money, a thing which never happened to a bank in good standing. They show that the National banks of this city have a total of \$1,000,000 in loans. This is not so very large and secured by the best of securities. Then back of all this is the cash in the vaults of the banks to the amount of \$1,000,000.

Conservation has always been the policy of the three National banks of this city. Seven years ago their assets have been full of money and loans were very much desired. They have not attempted to increase their profits by accepting doubtful securities. This policy has not only made lower loans, but it has reduced the rate of interest, because the man with the ill-gotten money always wants more at a low rate of interest and he gets it. This policy has made less profits for the banks, but it keeps them on a safe, solid footing, and that is what the people want.

And coming from the highest representative of the company in this city and Mr. Walsh's statement that the company was prepared to build the line at once shows that the company means business. Mr. Walsh expects to have the full particulars of the matter in a few days, but he has been notified by the company headquarters at St. Louis that the instructions are coming and he firmly believes that within a few days after the franchise has been granted, the workmen will be on hand to begin the construction work.
