City Regulator

Makes Suggestions as to How to Build a Wichita.

To the Editor of the Eagle:

I would not grant a franchise to any company for anything in this city without the most positive assurance that it should not be bonded until consent should be given by the city.

I would not give any more orders for electric blinkers. The gasoline blinkers are far more preferable and give a better light.

If the construction company of the telephone system's men come along and commence cutting down trees just take an ax and chop down their poles. They have no rights in the premises, they have no franchise; they are simply contractors putting in this line for the company and the line is in the construction company's hands until completed and accepted by the Telephone company, who have the franchise.

I would try and persuade the owners of property along Little river facing the park to tear away their barns, outhouses, coal sheds and pig pens—grade the bank, soil in blue grass and beautify the grounds. What a fine opportunity is offered the owners of property south of Murdoch avenue to enhance the value of their property by a move of that kind and so all the way to the Woodman bridge.

I see the railroads are making special or some concessions in the freight line for Wichita. That is, are giving it in some lines the same rates that they are giving smaller towns around. But let it be announced that the Railroad Commission have postponed indefinitely their meeting in this city, and see how quick they will raise the rates—higher than ever before. I would gather statistics, compile and condense, and produce such an array of facts as to document that would be unanswerable, and insist on the meeting of the Commission as soon as possible.

When they get two telephone systems in full operation, I imagine there will be a decided change in the manner in which the average customer will be treated by central. The point will have been passed when you will be told that you can't help yourself.

I see the city will be put to an extra expense of lowering the manholes to comply with its last grade. Next year they will probably have to raise them. A short time since the telephone company was given the grade for their manholes, and now in some places they stick up since the last grade from six to ten inches higher than the street.

I would have a city auditor and publish every bill allowed, to whom allowed and for what purpose and the amount.

When the franchise was given the street railway company it was expressly understood that the relaying of the granite blocks should be done in a workmanlike manner. They were simply thrown in.

I see we have a patent-right burial association. Mark Hanna says: "There are no trusts, save the companies or corporations who have patents. Now, won't some one get out a patent on dying and stop this pernicious way of shuffling off the mortal coil without paying someone for it? What a bonanza! The profits of the steel trust will pale into insignificance."

Yes, the electric blinkers are burning these nights. Of course when the moon passes the quarter they don't show, but during the dark of the moon you will be able to find them.

If I was a married woman I would buy my husband a pair of heavily-stained pugles and look them on him with a Yale lock while the women are wearing socks.

Walking down street to town yesterday morning, I saw two young girls about 9 or 10 years old sitting on the parking, gazing intently on a pamphlet with pictures in it. It was one of those miserable quick medicine pamphlets, containing illustrations and printed matter that would make the inhabitants of hades tired. It can be stopped.

When a company has a franchise, with a signed contract to perform certain specified things mentioned in the contract, and they fail to perform them, it seems to me that the contract becomes null and void. When the gas pressure during the noon hour and sometimes during the morning hours is so weak that the housewife cannot poach an egg, then what?

You have no right to couple or turn on your hose and throw water on the sidewalk or across it and compel pedestrians to walk out in the street to get by.

It's all right to pave West Douglas avenue, but it would be better to build a new bridge and make it twice as wide, with a solid asphalt or concrete floor.

Murdoch avenue bridge ought to be widened to conform with the arch at the entrance.
