**DOLD WILL DO BIG BUSINESS**

Will Build More Switches and Kill Cattle

**ON LARGE SCALE**

Has a Good Word for Cattle Feeders.

There was a force of railroad surveyors at the Dold Packing house yesterday surveying switches on the east side of the packing grounds and north of the present switches. Fred Dold said that they were going to use the new switches for the purpose of storing cars and possibly they may build car repair shops on that part of the grounds.

It is now expected that the Dold house will start two weeks from tomorrow. Manager Fred Dold has written to the men who formerly ran their branch houses to get ready for business and he has been hunting up the cattle that are being fed in the territory tributary to this market. It is his intention to kill good cattle and if they do not ship them he will send his buyers after the cattle.

It sounded like business last evening when Mr. Dold asked a reporter for the Eagle to tell the cattle feeders that he wanted a chance to buy their good cattle and he wanted to know where they are located. The big packers all buy cattle in the country and Dold is going to do the same thing if the good cattle do not come to this market.

People of this city have longed for the time when the new Dold packing house would commence business, but they have generally regarded it as a pork packing establishment. There are not many who know that Dold has one of the best beef killing houses in the west. Everything about it is modern and up to date and he can kill four hundred cattle a day easily and more if the occasion requires.

The Wichita hog market is all right and it will be better when the Dold house starts, but this cattle killing is going to be the big thing for this market. It takes local consumption of cattle to make a cattle market. When Dold starts his cattle killing there will be no profit shipping fat cattle past this market any more than shipping hogs past Wichita and all the shippers know how much money there is in that when Dold is running.

It was a dark day in Wichita when the Dold house burned to the ground, but the Dold house of today is worth more to this city than three packing houses like the one that was destroyed by fire. Things seem to be coming about in Wichita now. It is going to be the great packing center west of Kansas City and the people who go to the packing house and the stock yards this time next month will be able to see more than they have ever seen in that section before. Dold will not have to go slow to build up a trade because he has a reputation already made. All the years that he has done business in Wichita is worth something and people know what they will get when they buy of Dold. They will get the best.

The people in Boston and New York think the world outside those places is a small affair, and even the newspapers do not give much news from other sections of the United States. He thinks the east is not in it with the west.
