Jones Beats Merten in Logan County By 62.

COUNCIL IS REPUBLICAN

Republican Districts Considered Safe Were Lost.

Guthrie, O. T., Nov. 8.—From the returns received in this city today it is believed that the Democrats will have from two to three majorities in the lower house of the territorial legislature. It is known definitely that the Republicans will have no majority in the council. Candidates considered safe by the Republicans have been declared defeated, and there are no changes unless in official counts not concluded. One of the closest representative contests in the territory was the Jones-Merten contest in Logan county, in which Jones (Dem.) won out over Merten by 62 majority.

FOOTBALL IN OKLAHOMA

Kingfisher is Pulling Up Some Good Games This Year.

Kingfisher, O. T., Nov. 8.—The football editor of the Free Press writes this: There is a general misapprehension as to what constitutes a serious defeat at football. The worst defeat on record is where one team had 100 and their opponent 0. Michigan university once defeated Oberlin college 81 to 0, and games are not unusual in which one side defeats its opponents by 25 or 30 points.

After Arkansas University defeated Kingfisher College by a score of 25 to 0, and was in turn defeated by Oklahoma university by a score of 28 to 0, it looked pretty much like a 40 to 0 game in favor of the University when they met Kingfisher. The University has a team of old players, they boast as average weight, when attired in nature's garments, only of 170 pounds. The Kingfisher team has some new men and averages to weight barely 100 pounds. With this heavy handicap the Kingfisher team in Monday's game held the University in check in its focus-downs and in many respects outplayed their opponent. The snap and vigor of the home aggregation was good to see and while, of course, the crowd would not have liked to see the crowd reversed, yet all left pretty good at the close of the game. HUNTER WILL FIGHT

Choctaw Nation to Have Contest Over Governorship.

Guthrie, O. T., Nov. 8.—The Durant News says: The News man had an interview this morning with W. A. Durant, who has just returned from Washington, where he has been in company with Hon. A. Hutehewings in the interest of W. H. Hunter for governor of the Choctaw nation.

Mr. Durant refused to state what had occurred, but seemed to be encouraged and says they intend to fight this matter to the last ditch, and that they are confident of winning in the end; that Mr. Hunter had been elected according to Choctaw law, and that he would be recognized as such.

To the News man this continued matter of Choctaw affairs is going to bring up a pretty kettle of fish, not only to the Choctaws, but to every man, woman and child in the Chickasaw and Choctaw nations, and will eventually force this question to a settlement by Choctaw law, and not in an effort of an Indian agent with the United States military behind him.

tion according to Choctaw laws. The question now comes up, suppose McCurtain is declared governor by the Interior department and he should as governor sign the deeds to town lots, to the Indian allotments and to the coal and asphalt lands. Then there would be a suit brought to invalidate all of those deeds on the grounds that McCurtain was not governor of this nation according to Choctaw law, and had no right to give any title to such lands; the contention would then hinge upon the question of who is governor according to the Choctaw law.

It would seem that this question has been recognized by the M. K. & T. railroad, for just the other day in serving notice on the governor of the Choctaw nation in regard to some right of way business, it had the notice served on McCurtain, Hunter and Dukes, and that it would be sure of the right one.

This question of governorship should be settled at once, and settled in such a manner that it will stand a judicial investigation. It should be settled at once, because it is time to take the dog from around the neck of progress in this country. LOCATING LAND OFFICE

Major Tams Bixby Fixing Things Up at Atoka.

Atoka, I. T., Nov. 8.—Major Tams Bixby, acting chairman of the Dawes commission in Atoka today is making the contract for the location of the land office of the Choctaw nation.

The land office building is to be a handsome two story brick structure, 50x100 feet, and to be ready for use by February 1, 1903, on which date the land office of the Choctaw nation will be opened, and the citizens of the Choctaw nation will be permitted to buy 20 acres of land each. There are 1,500,000 acres of land in the Choctaw nation to be divided among 25,000 Indian citizens, and it is estimated that it will take from three to four years, and possibly longer, to complete the allotments in detail.

It is predicted by the members of the Dawes commission that on the first day of February, the first day the land office opens, there will be something like 3,000 people in Atoka clamoring for allotment. The commission has required that the town build an additional brick hotel at a cost of about \$25,000, with modern improvements, the work on which must be begun at once and be completed by the opening of the land office.

There is at this time a very great demand for laborers and contractors to put up the land office building and such dwellings, business and boarding houses as will be necessary to accommodate the people on February 1, and as the land office will be here for something like four years all buildings put up are necessarily to be of substantial character.

As soon as the Indians receive their allotments and deeds for same they will at the end of the first year begin to sell certain portions of their allotment, and this means the opening up, to the white man, of one of the finest farming countries in the United States.

MELON SEED INDUSTRY

Oklahoma Farmers Who Are Using Land for Strange Purpose.

Guthrie, O. T., Nov. 8.—The Jefferson Review calls attention to a peculiar fact in that neighborhood as follows: The raising of melons for their seed is becoming quite an industry in this section of country and the acreage planted to melons is increasing each year. It is a fine country for the growth of all kinds of melons, especially watermelons, as they grow to great size. One raised by Andy Smith, a mile south of town, weighed 10 pounds and was sent to the Wichita fair, being the largest on exhibition.

To raise melons for the seed the planting is done during May; the ground being prepared in a simple manner as for corn, a plow being used and planted about as thick as for corn. Melons do not grow as large where planted thick but more of them, and a small melon has as many seeds as a large melon.

Amount of seed raised per acre ranges from 100 to 200 pounds. The big seed houses usually furnish the seed for planting and take the entire crop. The grower is furnished with a different variety of seed and planted in different fields. All the leading varieties are raised. Kolb's Gem being a favorite. The great seed house of I. M. Perry contracts for most all the seed grown around Jefferson.

Extracting the seeds is done by machinery, and the melons are crushed between rollers. The pulp passes out into a reel covered with a screen with meshes about half an inch square; the seed and

BUILDING AT DURANT

Railroad Grading Gang Making the Dirt Fly.

Guthrie, O. T., Nov. 8.—The Durant Daily News says that the work train and construction gang are about two miles west, laying track at the rate of two miles a day. They use an average of about ten cars of ties and four of steel every ten hours. They expected to reach Mead not later than today.

A full train of material is brought in every day from Hugo, the present material headquarters, and Durant, from now on will be sub-headquarters. Forty cars of bridge material, eight cars of steel and ten cars of ties came in yesterday from Hugo, all of which will be used between here and the Washita river.

PRISONER STRIKES SHERIFF

And Then Makes His Escape in the Darkness.

El Reno, O. T., Nov. 8.—Sheriff George Smith, of Cleveland county, came in last night on a Choctaw trail and Sam Morley who is accused of murdering old man Hartman and wounding several of the Hartman family last March. The train was four hours late and did not get here until it was very dark. Morley was handcuffed and as soon as he stepped from the car into the station of the depot, he struck Sheriff Smith with the handcuffs, knocking him down, he then made his escape in the darkness and has not since been heard from. Morley was to have been tried here at the next term of court on a charge of venue from Noble county.
