

FOR OPENING WICHITA STREET

Council Passed Ordinance Establishing Benefit District.

NO MORE AUCTION SALES

Are to be Held on the Streets of Wichita.

MUCH BUSINESS DONE

At Meeting of City Council Last Night.

An ordinance was passed at the council meeting last night designating the benefit district for the opening of Wichita street.

The benefit district is bounded as follows: Beginning at the Arkansas river on the south line of First street, thence east to the west line of the alley between Main and Market streets, thence south to English street, thence west to Main street, south to Lewis street, west to Water street, thence south to Lincoln street, thence west to the river.

The cost of opening Wichita street from Lincoln to Lewis street will be considerable and the appraisers made the district large so that the cost would not be a burden to any taxpayer in the district which will be benefited by the opening.

The matter was brought up last night on account of the letting of the contract for the grading of the Orient railway between Milton and Wichita. The street will be used by the Orient railway company, but this fact was not to be considered by the appraisers, as it is the right of way for the company to procure an entrance into the heart of the city.

Mr. Davidson of the public improvement committee at the beginning of the session last night offered a resolution instructing the city attorney to prepare an ordinance creating the position of gas inspector of this city and setting the price of gas supplied to consumers. Gas of a certain quality is to be supplied at a certain price. This action was taken on account of the objections which people have made because of the poor quality of gas sometimes furnished.

Mr. Burton introduced a resolution instructing the city attorney to prepare an ordinance forbidding the sale of any kind of being held on the streets of this city and designating the hay market as the place for holding public sales. The council adopted the resolution. There have been made complaints to the council because of the sales conducted at the corner of Douglas avenue and Water street and the commission determined to do away with the crowd that frequents this corner by having the auction sales in the market place, which was purchased for this purpose.

Mr. Lacey stated to the council that many people in his ward had called on him and asked if there was no some way that the fast driving could be stopped on North Lawrence avenue. This street has been put in fine condition and a number of people use it for a speedway, until it has become dangerous for persons to cross the street. Mr. Lacey stated that the same was true of Ward seven, and both gentlemen favored putting a mounted policeman on these streets. The matter was referred to the police and public improvement committee, with power to set instructions to enforce the driving ordinance on these two streets.

The street car company has asked the city engineer for a line for them to build a new street car bridge across the Arkansas river. Mr. Davidson of the public improvement committee stated that there was considerable talk to the people of this city for a new bridge across the river and if such was built the street car bridge should be placed a considerable distance away from the proposed bridge. The company was willing and the council passed the motion directing the city engineer to give the company the line twenty-five feet north of the north line of the present wagon bridge.

Some time ago the city engineer was instructed to prepare plans and estimate for building a sanitary sewer in the east part of the city. Last night he reported. The boundaries of the new district are Matthews avenue to Hydraulic avenue and that section of the city south and west of Chisholm creek and connecting with the Washington sewer. The estimate for the cost was \$12,000. The city attorney was instructed to prepare an ordinance declaring it necessary to build this sewer. The property owners of the section to be benefited have petitioned for this sewer.

Mr. Wynkoop Kierstead, the civil engineer of Kansas City who has made proposals for making the plans and estimates for building a sewer over the entire city. This report is expected at the next meeting and at that time the city clerk will advertise for bids for this work.

FRONT DOOR PRIED OPEN

Burglars Thus Gained Entrance to Hardware Store.

SHOT GUNS AND REVOLVER

Were Taken From Rowlee's Hardware Store Saturday Night

Burglars pried open the front door of Rowlee's hardware store some time Saturday night and carried away two shot guns and a revolver.

The front doors of the building are solid and face on a street that is traveled a great deal at all hours of the night. The thief or thieves used a jimmy and pried the doors until the lock was sprung.

They made a thorough search of the room for valuables. They tried their jimmy on the money drawer but because of its construction they could not force the lock open. There was considerable money in the drawer.

The two shot guns were of the best make and are of extra quality. They would be comparatively easy to identify. The revolver was a good one. The total amount of goods stolen is about \$75.

A petition was presented asking the council to repair the bridge across Chisholm creek on Hunter avenue, and the street commissioner was instructed to put the bridge in a condition that it may be used by the public.

On a motion by Mr. Scheff John Kouzitz was instructed to finish the sidewalk on South seventh street from Fairview to the Little river.

PLANS ARE HERE. Frisco Will Have Terminals in This City.

Plans for the new Frisco terminals were received yesterday by M. H. Rudolph, freight agent for the Frisco. Mr. Rudolph and other Frisco officials are looking them over, after which they will report to the building department in St. Louis.

The plans call for a round-house, coal chute, oil house, round-house office and a network of tracks arranged most conveniently.

The round-house will be built large enough to house twelve engines, and will be erected on Kellogg street. It will be of the latest model.

In the matter of yards the company has plenty of space and will build to equal anything in the city. Between Division street and Kellogg there will be twelve tracks. Two separate tracks will run east of the freight depot for loading and unloading cars. Several switches will be built west of the passenger depot where sleepers will be placed before the departure of the trains. There will also be a beautiful park on the west side of the depot. It will extend the full length of the building and will be about 100 feet wide. East of the depot a platform 15 feet wide and 200 feet long will extend to be used in handling baggage. To facilitate freight delivery the exits in the freight house will be so arranged that all delivery wagons will travel in one direction to the exits and leave in another.

It is thought the new buildings and yards will be completed by June 1, when the Frisco contract for using the Santa Fe tracks expires.

TWO BOYS ARRESTED. They Are Charged With Stealing a Box of Candy.

Charles Phelps and Roy McDaniels, two boys about 16 years of age, were arrested by the police yesterday on the charge of stealing a box of candy from the Bryer candy factory. The two boys went into the factory while most of the employees were at dinner yesterday. It is alleged that they picked up a box of candy and started to leave when some one saw them and gave chase. The lads were captured, but the candy was not recovered.

On Roy McDaniels was found a large collection of old coins. A great many were Spanish coins, and the police are working on a clue that Roy has robbed some house and carried off these coins, although some have been reported in this city. Both boys have been in the hands of the police before.

SMALL BANK ROBBED. Safe Was Blown Open With Nitroglycerine.

The police were notified yesterday that the State bank at Dexter, a small town twenty miles south of Winfield, was robbed at 2 o'clock Monday morning and relieved of \$500 in silver, gold and greenbacks. The robbers entered the frame structure and after paying their way into the vault used nitroglycerine to blow open the safe containing the money. It is alleged that the robbers used 30 o'clock yesterday morning, when one of the officers visited the bank and found the safe literally blown to pieces, and many of the books and papers inside the vault badly damaged. The sheriff's office at Winfield was immediately notified and a posse with bloodhounds went over to take up the trail.

The burglars are thought to be two strangers who had been hanging around town most of the day and who had been talked about as suspicious characters. A bandage was missing from the section house and it is supposed that the robbers stole this after the robbery and went south in the Missouri Pacific train toward Arkansas City. The Dexter bank is owned and controlled by the Winfield national bank.

WILL PLAY IN NEWTON. Y. M. C. A. Basket Ball Team Leaves for That Place Tonight.

The Y. M. C. A. basket ball team will toss the horse hide with the Newton boys tonight. Company D basket ball team challenged the Y. M. C. A. boys of this city some time ago, but this is the first opportunity that has come up that challenge could be accepted. The boys will leave on the 1:15 p. m. train.

CITY JAIL WAS EMPTY. Rather Unusual Occurrence Happened Sunday.

All day Sunday the city jail was empty, something that has not happened for months. There was not even a drunk taken in Saturday night, and on Sunday morning the last prisoner was released. This was so unusual that the officers, when they reported for duty went down and looked over the jail, as was their wont when there were prisoners in it. Twenty-four hours was a long time for the jail to be empty and yesterday at noon two boys were put in, and last night three more were added and the jail presents a respectable appearance now.

While wrestling at Fairmount Saturday Guy W. Levy severely wrenched his right leg by falling on the stone steps. The injury will keep him confined to his room for five or six weeks.

GROUNDHOG CAME OUT. Saw His Shadow and Crawled Back Into His Hole.

Did you see the groundhog yesterday? He came out all right, and those who got up with the sun were able to get a glimpse of the little rascal.

He did not stay out long, only a few seconds. The sun appeared and this indicated to the groundhog that this was not a good time for him to come out, so he dodged back and pulled the hole in after him.

The weather man with his highs and lows, is of the same opinion. There is a high in the north, a low in the southwest and a low in the northeast, and Mr. Todd and the groundhog agree that this will bring rain or snow before night.

HORSE WAS KILLED. In a Runaway in East Part of City Sunday Morning.

A horse belonging to Mr. Carr of South Green street became frightened at a dog Sunday morning and ran away. About the first jump and the dog barked. This scared the horse more than ever and in his plunges one shaft of the buggy was broken and a piece ran into him. He broke away from the rig and went plunging down the street with the piece of shaft sticking from his side and his trail was marked by a stream of blood. Finally he ran into a barn and soon after died. He was a very valuable animal. None of the occupants of the carriage were hurt.

CLAIM WAS REJECTED. County Commissioners Refused to Allow Damages to Engine.

At the county commissioners' meeting yesterday, on motion by Mr. Bradbury the claim of Gus Anderson for \$800 was rejected. Mr. Anderson owned a threshing machine and while crossing the Nickerson bridge across the Nickerson west of Clearwater the engine went through the bridge. One man was slightly injured in the fall. Mr. Anderson asked the commissioners to give him \$800 for the damage to the engine and the cost of getting it out of the river. The commissioners and the auditor thought his demand was too much and so it was rejected.
