

WILL BUILD BIG ELEVATOR

Stevens-Scott Grain Company are Owners.

CAPACITY OF 75,000 BU.

Work Will Begin by the First of March.

Wichita is going to have another big grain elevator. It will be built by the Stevens-Scott Grain company and will be located on the joint railroad tracks north of the Nevinger elevator.

Mr. Stevens said last night that he had the blue prints and everything was about ready to commence work on the new building. He said work would be commenced by March 1, if not before.

The company has secured a large block of ground and the matter is now up to the railroad, and their consent to give the necessary switch is all that remains of the arrangement before commencing the building.

This matter of a new elevator has been discussed among members of the board of trade for some time and several weeks ago a reference was made to it in the Eagle but no names given.

It was necessary to secure the ground before giving out the information that the building of a large elevator was the intention of the company.

DISAPPEARED WITH FUNDS

Charged Against Dr. Martin of Garden Plain.

The little town of Garden Plain, west of Wichita, is considerably excited just now over the alleged disappearance of Dr. Martin, treasurer of the school board of that town, with over \$500 of the school funds of the board.

Dr. Martin is a well known and high respected citizen of Garden Plain, and has served on the board some time. He enjoyed a large practice and has many friends in this city.

Tuesday he came to Wichita ostensibly on professional business, but it is alleged that he came here and drew \$300 of the funds of the school board and departed for parts unknown.

The announcement that Dr. Martin had disappeared and that the school funds were also missing caused quite a furore. The officers have been notified in the surrounding towns and are on the lookout for the missing treasurer.

SAID IRONS WERE NO GOOD.

Police Had Very Strenuous Time Yesterday.

There was a jolly time in police court yesterday morning. A few days ago a couple of men dropped into Wichita with a box of irons. BOY KILLED AT NEWTON.

Accident Similar to One Here on Same Day.

Roy Dunlap, a call boy employed by the Santa Fe, was run over and fatally injured by a switch engine and train of cars in the Santa Fe yards at Newton, Tuesday.

The accident which caused his death was very similar to that which caused the death of Frank Chaney, in this city, Tuesday. It is a remarkable coincidence that these two accidents, so much alike, should happen in the same manner, the same day, to employees of the same company, and in adjoining towns. While Dunlap lay dying in Newton, the accident which killed Chaney happened here.

Dunlap was 18 years old and was called to his depot at Newton, about 11:30, Tuesday. He started to deliver some message in the yards, and stepped upon the foot-board of a passing switch engine, expecting to ride to his destination. The foot-board was covered with ice, and his feet slipped, causing him to fall in front of the engine. He fell on his back, with his limbs inside the rails. When the engine struck him he was rolled several feet, then was passed over by the engine and seven cars. His right limb was almost severed and his abdomen was badly injured. He was taken to his home, where he died about 2:45 p. m.

PERMANENT SURVEY BEGUN

Corps Begins Work on Line of Winfield and Southern Railway.

The permanent survey of the Winfield and Southern railway began at Winfield Tuesday morning. The first stake was driven and the start made at a point on the corner of Manning and Franklin streets.

The start was made in the presence of the directors and stockholders of the new railroad. Surveyor J. W. Hearty and a corps of eight civil engineers then proceeded with the work of survey. The line will pass the Harvey Jennings place, then down the Walnut Valley toward the poor farm. The work will be carried forward as rapidly as the weather will permit. The surveyors are well equipped for the work, having a complete camping outfit, including four tents.

The promoters of this new railroad are very enthusiastic over the prospects. The road will open up a new field that promises greatly. It will be built midway between the Santa Fe and Frisco roads through a country that is not reached by either. It will place this section within a hundred miles direct line of the Chicago and St. Louis and will reach the great oil country further south.

WOULD BUILD AUDITORIUM

Chamber of Commerce Directors Interested in Matter.

COMMITTEE APPOINTED

To Assist in Securing Passage of Enabling Act.

At the special meeting of the board of directors of the Chamber of Commerce yesterday afternoon Chairman Davidson was instructed to appoint a committee of three to assist in securing the passage of the bill introduced in the legislature some time ago by John Adams, giving cities of the first class power to issue bonds for the construction of public buildings.

Nearly a year ago the Chamber of Commerce appointed a committee to make arrangements for the building of a large auditorium for the city—an auditorium with large seating capacity, and one owned and controlled by the city—that its use could be given free to all conventions that may wish to hold their sessions in this city.

This committee prepared a bill to enable cities of the first class, and especially Wichita, to vote sufficient bonds to build this auditorium. The bill was placed in the hands of Representative John Adams for introduction in the house and the other Sedgwick county representatives and senator have supported it. Besides the instructions to appoint a committee to work for the passage of the bill, the directors adopted a resolution asking the members of the legislature to vote sufficient bonds to support the bill and work for its passage. Mr. Davidson will appoint his committee today and steps will be taken immediately to secure the passage of the bill that work on the auditorium may begin early in the spring.

J. B. Woods of this city, who is now operating a brick plant northeast of this city, was present and made an interesting talk to the directors regarding the brick industry in this city. Mr. Woods believes that this section of the state is rich in brick-making material, and the committee on manufactures of the Chamber of Commerce was instructed to confer with Mr. Woods in regard to the organization of a stock company to operate a plant here.

The proposition of Levi Smith of Kinsey to open a factory to manufacture breakfast food was read and referred to the proper committee, as was also the proposition of the Vaughan-Monnieg Shoe company of Jefferson City, Mo., who wish to open a factory in the west, as was given in the Eagle last week.

Ad N. Jones of the Wichita Traffic bureau, was before the directors with a proposition looking toward the establishment of the bureau here on a firm basis. A special committee, composed of J. Elmer Reese, L. F. Nafziger, Prof. Isey and James Allison, was appointed to confer with him.

IN THE HOLD-OVER

Sheriff Young of Butler County (Captured Alleged Horse Thief).

Sheriff Young, of Eldorado, passed through Wichita last evening, having in charge one of the alleged horse thieves in Butler county on the charge of horse-stealing. Howell claims he was only taking a drive for his health, as the weather here and the roads were short in Butler county. So, he drove out near Cheney, where, it is alleged, he sold the horse and buggy and then left for Nowicki, where Sheriff Young caused his arrest. He also claims that Bill Stafford, now under arrest at Peabody on the same charge, and held for Sheriff Young, is Howell's partner, and he is only acting for Stafford when Stafford is unable to find a good horse. Sheriff Young is doing all in his power to run down and capture horse thieves. Part of Butler county has a Horse Thief association, but the northern part of the county, where Stafford and Howell have been operating, has no flowing reward.
