

HOG MARKET TEN HIGHER

Receipts Were Light on Account of Delayed Trains.

NO GOOD HOGS OFFERED

Top Price Was \$6.85 to \$6.95 Bid for Hogs to Arrive.

Hog receipts were light yesterday on account of the storm and five car loads were on the market, four of which came in Sunday night. The market was ten cents higher than last Friday. The bulk of the offerings were common mixed hogs, running to light weights, and the top price was \$6.85. There were some good heavy hogs reported to arrive. The buyers waited until late in the evening for them to come and finally gave it up and went home. The railroads were not making time on account of the snow drifts and no definite information could be gained as to when they would arrive. Some of the consignments were reported that they had consignments of good, heavy hogs on the way and the buyers bid \$6.85 and \$6.95 for them in case they were good as described.

MAY PRODUCTS OFFERED FIRM

Provisions Advanced From Ten Cents to a Quarter.

WHEAT AND CORN HIGHER

Longs Showed Disposition to Close Holdings Out.

Chicago, Feb. 16.—There was quite general liquidation in the grain pits today, but a better feeling developed toward the end of the session and wheat closed strong, with May 4c higher. May corn was up 1/4c, but oats were 1/4c lower.

There was little outside buying in wheat, the trade being mostly local and even that was of a hesitating character. There was a disposition among longs to sell out, and the selling for short account was quite pronounced. Cables were barely steady, which caused the market to open about unchanged. May prices being a shade lower to a shade higher, at 7 1/2c to 7 3/4c.

The weather conditions were bearish, but the winter wheat belt and an increase of 54,000 bushels in the visible supply also added to the selling pressure, and with the support prices declined. May selling off to 7 1/2c. The weakness continued the greater part of the day, but toward the end of the session there was a buying account for shorts and short covered freely, which brought about a rally, the close being strong, with May 4c higher, at 7 1/2c to 7 3/4c.

Corn held fairly steady for a time, but eased off in sympathy with wheat and other grains. There was little feature to the trading, which was rather dull. As prices weakened considerably, long contracts were bought in small lots, and there was also some selling for the short account. A better feeling was manifested in the day on a good cash demand, while the total receipts for the week, after the upturn. The close was strong, with May 4 1/2c higher, at 4 1/2c to 4 3/4c.

Oats suffered a sharp decline early in the session as a result of general selling by contract buyers, and on lack of support. Liberal receipts and the increasing tendency of stocks tended to induce free selling. Shorts covered on the break, but the selling was not in sympathy with wheat, the close being about steady, with May 1/4c, at 36c to 37c.


Provisions were remarkably strong, especially the July deliveries. Scarcity of hogs and the small stocks of provisions were the principal factors. The market was active buyers throughout the day, and there was a fair demand from local operators, including the packing line. The market closed strong, with May 1 1/2c higher, at 17 1/2c to 18c.
