City Regulator
 Makes Suggestions as to How to Build a Wichita.
 To the Editor of the Eagle. If any one doubts the benefits derived from interurban railroads, and especially the farmers, let him take a trip through Indiana and Ohio and learn of the benefits from the farmers of those states and he will not hesitate to not only encourage them, but to give the right-of-way, and help to grade the road. A farmer can take the early morning cars with his marketing, do his trading in town and go home again with one-quarter the expense and one-tenth of the time it takes with his team. He saves his team, has a comfortable ride, no matter what the state of the weather, and if he goes to town on a railroad train he goes to the depot, two to five miles away, waits for the train, and then has to load around all day waiting for a return train, which is uncertain, and walk miles to reach home finally when on an interurban road he can land at his own door, or on his own farm, for every farm house which the road passes is a depot.

Every progressive, wide-awake city in the country is building an auditorium. What are we going to do? I saw a man on the street with a team and a small dog following. One of the horses stepped on the little dog's foot, and the man stopped the team, took the little dog, put him on the seat and wrapped him up in a lap robe. What was the difference between that man and the fellow who stood near by and jeered at the humane action toward the dog? One swallow doesn't make a spring, nor two swallows make a summer, but they make something else sometimes. If taken on an empty stomach. But the

past week is the congregating of that crowd of cranks on the street corner who are saving the country, financially, politically and religiously. If those fellows would use a little of the energy that is wasted in spelling, with a little soap and water, they would not smell so loud. And still the city is being disfigured more and more with hideous built-in boards, while other towns and cities are fighting them with ordinances and courts and legislators. I would call an architect, into the city building and have him devise or draw a plan for fitting the stairway in that building. What an opportunity is open in this city for caterers or cateresses. I have this remark on what I hear ladies say who wish to entertain by giving dinners and luncheons. I would buy the Wichita and Western if I owned the Rock Island-Palco system, and run the Frisco California train through to Pratt instead of to Elmerworth.

One of the first things to commend now is to grade up the ground deep around your barn and coal house, fertilize it nicely, and as soon as the weather will admit, plant trailing vines and trails them over the buildings. There is still to be seen here and there a ramshackle old fence in front of a nice home, and occasionally a good fence without any gate. Why not pull them down in your spring cleaning, and why not pull down that fence between you and your neighbor? Get on good enough terms with your neighbor so that you don't feel like having a fence between you. Thousands of people meet on our streets daily a little old lady, stooped with age and long suffering, poorly clad, but with a bright, smiling, purified face—made so, we doubt, by her patient suffering—carrying a little basket, filled with wads of pennies. She does not intrude herself upon any one in her endeavor to sell her wares, but in a modest, shrinking manner holds up her basket inviting you to buy. We all pass her by, little thinking what it means to her, in her struggle to live, while an occasional purchaser from her would mean nothing to us. I think the Kansas legislature better let the child problem alone. We have a compulsory education law which is almost a dead letter, but which, if it was enforced, would place in the schools a number of kids who do not go to school, and who will not, in fact, but they will work and earn wages and learn trades. Don't drive them from the shop to the streets—or rather, the alleys. It is all sentiment about Kansas kids being overworked in factories and shops. The foremen of establishments have nervous prostration in their endeavors to make them work enough to keep them healthy, especially where there are two or more of them together. The kind of legislation that the average Kansas town kids need is a chaperon, at dark. If all the children now living and to be born in the next twenty-five years were compelled to stay indoors from dark until daylight, the crime and drinking questions would be pretty nearly solved. In the matter of repairing the asphalt pavement I would appoint a committee
