

TO PAVE 14 BLOCKS

Two Petitions Were Presented to Council

PRAYERS WERE GRANTED

Seneca and University Avenues Will Have Pavement

BOND ORDINANCE PASSED

Authorizing Issuance of \$40,000 4 1-2 per cent Bonds

At the council meeting last night petitions were presented for paving fourteen blocks of street on the West Side.

The pavement will extend from the west side of Seneca street to the west side of Hiram. It will end at the Friends university drive on the campus leading directly to the front door of the building.

Seneca street is to be paved from Douglas avenue to University. From Douglas to Texas it is to be 36 feet wide, from Texas to Maple 48 feet, and from Maple to University 36 feet.

The ordinance authorizing the issuance of \$40,000 in refunding bonds was passed by the council. The issue is to be made to pay the principal of bonds issued in 1873 and expiring on July 1.

The special committee appointed some weeks ago to confer with a like committee of the school board relative to installing an elevator in the city building reported. The proposition submitted was that the city is to put in an elevator to cost about \$2,500 and the board of education would maintain and operate it.

The contract with W. Kiersted of Kansas City for making plans and specifications for a storm water sewer was accepted. According to its terms the city is to pay \$1,200 for the complete plans and specifications to cover the territory south of Twenty-first street to Lincoln and between the Little Arkansas river and Chisholm creek.


An ordinance was passed placing a penalty for operating slot machines in the city at not less than \$100 nor more than \$500, or not less than thirty days in jail nor more than one year, or both with fine and imprisonment.

The ordinance increasing the bonds of the city clerk and his assistant from \$500 to \$1,000 was passed.

The mayor was instructed to appoint a city scavenger without pay. This man is to clean up the alleys in the business section. Many of the merchants have asked that one be appointed and each would pay a small sum to have him clean away the papers and boxes in the rear of their stores.

The special committee appointed to see what steps should be taken to protect the city from floods from the Little Arkansas river reported that the Central avenue dam should be widened 30 feet and the creek drive in Riverside park should be raised to the Woodman bridge.

The city clerk was instructed to advertise for bids for repairing the hose houses. This will cost \$200.

The city clerk was instructed to notify parties having barbed wire fences to remove them, and also that all trees and hedges should be trimmed to the proper height.

Mr. Pierce wanted a flagman put at the Douglas avenue crossing of the Frisco tracks. Mr. Rudolph was present and stated that a flagman would be put to work this morning, so the matter was not discussed.

Mr. Schell of the franchise and license committee moved that the city attorney be instructed to prepare an ordinance making a license of \$50 for all electrical workers. This would do away with the fee business which has been unsatisfactory.

The petitions for sidewalks were laid on the table until next meeting. The petition to open a street from Main to Tremont between Harry and University avenues was referred to the public improvement committee.

Bids were opened for building cement walks as follows: H. P. Milton, 10 cents square foot; sand, 25 cents cubic yard.
