WORK WILL BEGIN MONDAY MORNING

Henry Stunkle to Make Improvements on Hotel.

LARGER BY ONE THIRD

Plans Are Finished for \$9,000 Addition to Baltimore.

Nine thousand dollars' worth of improvements will be made to the Hotel Baltimore by the owner, Henry Stunkle, the work to commence at once. Brant & Gribb, contractors, have the plans and will make the improvements.

The \$9,000 will be spent chiefly in enlarging that hotel, although different parts of the present building will be changed some for the convenience as well as appearance.

The extension will be built to the rear of the hotel. There the building now extends only 100 feet in the rear, when the addition is finished, it will extend to the alley, a distance of 150 feet. The annex will be of the same height as the present building, three stories.

Henry Stunkle, the owner, has great faith in the prosperity and future welfare of the city of Wichita and he holds valuable city real estate here besides the Hotel Baltimore. He has 250 acres of the richest farm lands in Sedgewick and Sumner counties which yields him large returns each season.

The Baltimore hotel was at one time during the boom, the largest and best in the city. It did a thriving business for many years and was the highest priced hotel here.

Charles Guyer, who recently bought the fixtures and took charge of the place, is rapidly increasing the patronage. It is nearly always full of guests and it is on account of that reason that Mr. Stunkle decided to build an addition so that Mr. Guyer may have room to supply the demands of his rapidly growing business.

CHURCH WILL PAY OFF OLD MORTGAGE

Reformed Congregation to Clear Indebtedness of 1886.

AMOUNT ONCE DUE \$11000

Last Payment of \$1,500 to Be Made This Week.

Some time during the present week, when the necessary papers arrive from the holder of a mortgage on the Reformed church, of this city, a balance of \$1,500 due on that building and grounds will be paid off. The congregation will then be entirely free from debt for the first time since the church was built in 1886.

The payment to be made this week is the last one due on a mortgage, which in the original document called for \$11,000. All excepting \$2,000 of that sum was paid during the first year the lots were bought and the edifice built. The church then had the money with which to pay the balance, but the person who held the mortgage refused to release the property until the money was due.

As considerable property had already been purchased and sold by the church during the boom, which netted the congregation a fair profit, it was decided to invest the \$2,000 until the last payment on the mortgage was due. The \$2,000 was invested in lots south of Harry street and when the collapse came after the boom, the money was swept away with other thousands of dollars.

Later the church finally raised \$500 of the full amount \$2,000 which later came due and the missionary board of the Reformed church bought the mortgage of the first holder. The board carried the mortgage through all of the remaining years and now, at last, the congregation has the money with which to entirely free itself from all indebtedness.

Rev. Bruce Griffith, pastor of that congregation, is to be congratulated for hard work performed in an effort to at last free the church from all obligations. The \$1,000 necessary to the taking up of the mortgage were all raised during Rev. Griffith's charge.

STOCK COMPANY ORGANIZED.

Patent Boiler Cleaner Will Be Manufactured in Wichita.

The International Boiler Cleaner company of Kansas was organized in this city yesterday and the following officers were elected: A. Dudley Blanton, president; Wm. Walterscheid, vice-president; Chas. Walterscheid, treasurer; Astley Cooper, secretary and I. P. Campbell, attorney. The company's office will be at Walterscheid Bros.' factory, where the boiler cleaner is to be manufactured.

A contract has been entered into with the Wichita company to manufacture these boiler cleaners, a car load of material having been already ordered.

The capital stock of the company is \$10,000 paid up. The directors are: A. Dudley Blanton, W. M. Walterscheid, Astley Cooper, Edward E. Harvey, H. E. Greene and I. P. Campbell.

This company has purchased the rights to manufacture the boiler cleaner from the Roberts company of Denver, Colo.

MRS. KING RETURNS.

She Brings Fine Collection of Souvenirs From California.

Mrs. J. R. H. King returned from a pleasant trip through California much improved in health. She brought as fine a collection of souvenirs as can be found among which is a quantity of gold dust and a nugget of gold worth about five dollars taken from a gold mine in which her brother has some shares. Mrs. King traveled through on the Santa Fe by the southern route and returned on the Southern Pacific and Colorado Midland from Denver to Wichita on the Frisco, taking in all the principal points of interest: Salt Lake City, Manitou, Colorado Springs, Denver, Reno, Nevada, and Summit of the Sierras, made in the world taking three engines to pull a train of seven coaches up and on the top of which is one lone grave, the resting place of the only soldier killed there during the war. She spent the most of her time in California. San Francisco being headquarters and along the Pacific coast.
