

OF OBERLIN CARTER  
It Is Said That He Will Be  
come a Recluse.  
TO DEVELOP HIS MINES  
A Study of His Life in the  
Prison Walls.

As a climax to a series of brilliant social affairs, by means of which the time has been passed this summer at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, the army officers there arranged recently for a ball to be given in Pope Hall in honor of the young ladies who have been spending the summer at the post with relatives.

It never was more brilliantly lighted, and the music of the orchestra was never more beautiful than on the occasion of this ball in honor of the visiting young ladies. The hall stands only a short distance from the hospital wing of the federal prison, and during the entire time of the dance and until the janitor had turned out the last light a man sat in a window of a cell in the hospital ward of the prison and watched the dancers.

The watcher in the grated window was Oberlin M. Carter, former captain of engineers, serving a five-year sentence for embezzlement of government funds, and the dancers were women and men who had been his friends before his downfall.

Formerly one of the proudest and most haughty of the regular army officers, Oberlin Carter realizes the impossibility of wiping the blot from his name, relates the New York Herald. He understands that he cannot again enter the circle which formerly knew him and he has decided to abandon the beaten paths of civilization and become a recluse. He is financially interested in several mining ventures in the western states and territories, and he will bury himself among the mountains and develop these properties after his release, on November 23 of this year.

The former captain has told his plans only to his most intimate friends. He has denied himself to all visitors at the federal penitentiary, except his lawyers, one or two steadfast friends and his relatives. It is to these he has confided on the subject of his sufferings while in prison and in regard to his plans for the future.

He is said to have nearly a million dollars, and the government has commenced suit against him in the federal court at Chicago to recover the greater part of this, alleging that it is the fruit of his embezzlement. This suit will require his attention for a short time after his release, and he will be turned his face from civilization.

During a greater part of his term Carter has been a prisoner "trustee," and has been at liberty to go outside the prison walls on errands for the officers of the institution. However, the fact that the quarters of his old friends in the army are so close to the prison gates has kept him inside.

He knows that should he meet a former associate and greet him in the old way he would be snubbed, or the officer would be court-martialed for speaking to him. This was one of the penalties imposed by the court before which he was convicted, and he has not the spirit to subject either himself or former comrades to the ordeal of meeting in public. This is one of the reasons he will become an exile upon his release.

He was one of the "good fellows" of the army and his acquaintance was wide. He is deemed to go through like a stranger to all he knew before his downfall, and he has concluded that it would be easier to do this in some out-of-the-way place where he is not liable to meet former acquaintances.

Carter has remained in his cell during his leisure hours at the prison, and the greater part of his time has been spent in studying. He has had charge of the landscape gardening at the institution and is well versed in the business. He has kept up his studies of civil engineering and is now one of the best civil engineers in the United States. He intends putting this knowledge to use when he goes to his mines and begins the work of redeveloping them.

The laws, he said, should be enforced in the spirit in which they were intended, with due regard for the rights of the citizens and not used as instruments of oppression and blackmail, nor for the unwarranted curtailment of individual liberty. Charles F. Murphy today took steps to carry the fight into Hugh McLaughlin's territory by preparing to sign Tammany headquarters in Brooklyn.

INDICTMENTS ARE RETURNED. Confidential Secretary of Governor Dockery Is Arraigned. St. Louis Oct. 12—W. A. Morrow, confidential secretary of Governor Dockery and Thomas E. Barrett, former member of the St. Louis court of appeals, were indicted by a grand jury of appeals against each of whom three indictments charging fraud in connection with the naturalization of foreigners during the election of 1890 were returned yesterday. The trial of Morrow was set for November 7, Barrett will be tried about the same time.
