## Fair Quality of Oil.

Lawton, O. T., Nov. 9.—Mineral oil has been discovered on the Lawton townsite. The shaft on the Beal addition has been sunk ninety-two feet and curbed with lumber. Colonel Holcomb, superintendent of the work, says the company expects to take from five to ten barrels of oil a day from the shaft. That taken from the shaft will be used for the quality for lubricating purposes and excellent for fuel. The owners of the shaft expect to find a ready market for their product in Lawton.

Bronner, wife of a book-keeper at a local lumber yard, has mysteriously disappeared from her home, talking with her children, two boys and a girl. There is only one reason for her disappearance: she did not like Kansas and wanted to move to some other climate, but her husband, having a good position, was opposed to his wife's wishes. Without telling her husband, Mrs. Bronner left mysteriously. She is believed to have gone to Oklahoma.

# SHERIFF LOVE GIVES SURPRISE

Serves a Warrant on Agent of a Bridge Company

## CHARGES HIM WITH CRIME

Bridge Built by His Company Fell Killing Two Men

Kansas City, Mo., Nov. 9.—Sheriff Love of Kingfisher county, Oklahoma, created a sensation today by serving a warrant on J. W. Hoover, a prominent local business man and agent of an Ohio bridge company, on an indictment returned in Oklahoma charging him with murder. The indictment grew out of the wreck of a bridge built by Mr. Hoover's company in which two men were killed. Mr. Hoover says he has never been in Kingfisher county and his attorney has wired Governor Dockery urging the latter to refuse to grant requisition papers.

## COUPLE OF SAMPLES.

Vegetables in Oklahoma Grow to a Remarkable Size.

Guthrie, O. T., Nov. 9.—The immense fertility of Oklahoma soil is being daily demonstrated. Here are a couple of samples: Two sweet potatoes raised upon the farm of E. A. Sandlin, near Verdun, weighing 8½ and 9½ pounds, respectively, were exhibited in town last Saturday. The row in which these two potatoes were raised was 32 yards in length and produced 12½ bushels of fine sweet potatoes.

## W. S. Hatley, living six miles north of Shawnee and one mile west, was in town with the biggest average turkeys we have seen this year.

The largest measured 23 inches in circumference, or within one inch of two feet.

## OFFERS A REWARD.

Seeking the Murderer of the Ames Family.

Guthrie, O. T., Nov. 9.—The Daily Publicist of Chandler gives the following additional news of the recent horrible murder at Davenport, near that city: Miss Adelia Smith, the young lady who was shot through the right shoulder and painfully wounded, is doing as well as could be expected and will recover.

## The dead bodies of the murdered man and woman, Jackson and Mrs. Ansel, are being held awaiting instructions from relatives in Indiana as to their final disposition.

The officers are on the alert and doing everything possible to run down the perpetrator of the foul murder, and the prevailing opinion is that within a very short time they will succeed in capturing and lodging them safely in jail. Sheriff Tillingham has offered a handsome reward for the arrest and conviction of the murderer.

## RETURNS FROM KINGFISHER.

Found Case of Violation but County Attorney is Away for a Wedding.

Guthrie, O. T., Nov. 9.—Territorial Oil Inspector Ashton has returned from Kingfisher, where he found two cases of violation of the territorial law in regard to inspection. The county attorney of Kingfisher is absent on a wedding trip, but as soon as he returns prosecutions will follow.

## There seems to be many deficiencies in the new inspection law, and the next legislature will be called upon to remedy these defects.

One is that there is no provision in the law for the expenses of deputies when called away from home to inspect oil, the territorial auditor having turned down bills for this service, holding that there was no fund on which a warrant for such expense could be properly drawn. This necessitates the territorial inspector making all the inspections outside of the home towns of the various inspectors, and has caused complaint to be made by the National Oil company of Wichita, Kan., to the effect that the inspector was not prompt in inspecting the oil they shipped into Oklahoma. As the chief inspector cannot be in all places at one and the same time, it is difficult to see how the matter is to be remedied.

## TO ASK A PARDON.

Efforts Will be Made in Behalf of John Love.

Shawnee, O. T., Nov. 9.—Over a year ago, John Love, of this city, was sent to the Kansas penitentiary in the first degree, and since that time every effort has been made to have a pardon granted for him.

These efforts are now about to be focused and the evidence which has been secured, will be presented to Governor Ferguson with a petition that he grant a full pardon to Mr. Love.

John Love was convicted of the crime of killing Wm. Shawcross at the alley which opens into Main street at the Betty's saloon. The killing occurred in December, 1897, and was the result of an altercation between Rabey Hamilton, the latter being well known as a bad and dangerous man. Love fired at Hamilton and the shot killed Shawcross, who was an innocent spectator. Hamilton left the country and has not been seen for months while Love was tried and convicted.

The defense contended, and gave the evidence of Love and his brother, that Hamilton had assaulted Love with a knife and that Love had fired merely in self-defense, but on account of the interest of the parties giving that testimony, the jury did not believe it, and convicted the man.

A witness has been found now who saw the whole affair, including the knife in Hamilton's hand, and his evidence is corroborated by others who were present. This evidence, together with a general petition, signed by hundreds of citizens of this county, most of them prominent another signed by the county attorney, L. G. Pittman, and his deputy, S. P. Freeling, the latter being the present county attorney, both of whom participated in the trial of Love, and another signed by the jurymen who convicted him, seven of whom have already signed, and the other five have not yet been seen.

It is believed that Judge Burwell, who conducted the trial, will also sign the petition. Love's wife and children are in destitute circumstances, living by the mother's labor, while Love has been in most of the time since he was sent to the penitentiary. His warden's certificate attests that fact.

It is the general belief here that he will be pardoned and the hope is freely expressed that Governor Ferguson will exercise his power to free a man, whom nearly everyone believes, is suffering for a crime which was unintended and the result of his efforts to defend his own life.

## ALVA LODGE HONORED.

Will Demonstrate Their Newly Adopted Work.

Alva, O. T., Nov. 9.—Once again Diamond Cross Lodge, K. P. of this city has been honored by being invited away from home to demonstrate their newly adopted work. It is the first rank, and a crowd of at least 500 men and women. The meeting will be held in convention hall and in the history of secret society work there has never been anything to equal it.

Our lodge rightfully feels proud of the distinctive honor tendered them and have accepted the responsibility of "delivering the goods."

## RAISED A BONUS.

Watonga Will Have a New Flouring Mill at Once.

Watonga, O. T., Nov. 9.—The progressive and wide-awake citizens of Watonga are being complimented for their energy and persistence in securing another valuable addition to Watonga's business enterprises in the way of a flouring mill, with a capacity of 100 barrels a day, says the Republican. A meeting of the commercial club was called for Monday night to consider the matter, but so few were present that nothing could be done. On Tuesday Secretary Seely decided to make it go anyway and started out to raise \$200 to secure a site for the mill. This was accomplished in a few hours and before night the club had a warranty deed for lots 1031, and part of 12, in block 63, which was at once turned over to Pierce & Hoberrecht, on condition that the proposed mill will be constructed as soon as possible. Work of excavating for the basement was commenced yesterday, and the mill will be pushed rapidly towards completion.

## LANDS SUBJECT TO ALLOTMENT.

More Than 4,000,000 Acres, Worth About \$13,000,000.

Tablequah, I. T., Nov. 9.—The reports of the Dawes commission and the attorneys of the Cherokee nation show that there are about 4,200,000 acres of land subject to allotment in the Cherokee nation. From this must be deducted reservations of one acre for each county school, one acre for each small reservation for mining schools and new towns along railroads. This allottable land is valued at \$13,100,000. There is now being allotted to each citizen \$25.00 worth of this land. The rolls show that there will be 40,000 Cherokees on the final rolls. The per capita share of each, not deducting the reservations above mentioned, would be \$33.22, leaving a surplus of \$7.72 in land due each citizen.

## MEDICAL BOARD MEETS.

Will Examine for Doctors and Embalmers.

Enid, O. T., Nov. 9.—The territorial medical examining board will meet at the office of the secretary, Dr. E. E. Cowdick, on Thursday, the 11th, for the examining of doctors and embalmers who wish to practice their professions in Oklahoma. Meeting at 102 Monroe street, Enid, O. T., beginning at 8 o'clock in the morning. Licenses to practice these professions are issued by the board only to those who are successful in their tests.

## RUN OVER BY WAGON.

Was a Narrow and Remarkable Escape From Death.

Frederick, O. T., Nov. 9.—Monday afternoon Theodore Myton, the 17-year-old son of Harry Myton, while on the road to Frederick on a load of wheat, was injured by falling to the ground and being run over by the heavily loaded wagon, which would have killed a grown man, says the Enterprise, but from which he will suffer no permanent injuries. The father attempted to grab the boy, who slipped off the front of the vehicle. Before he could stop the team, one of the wheels ran over the boy's back just below the shoulder blade. He was taken to the Prince hotel and medical aid summoned. It was found that the collar bone and a couple of ribs had been broken. By Wednesday he had improved so that he could be removed to his home. His speedy recovery is remarkable from the fact that the loaded wagon which ran over him weighed 1,800 pounds.

had laid the matter before Governor Ferguson, asking that the assistance of the chief executive in getting Hamer prosecuted, but could get no satisfaction. Governor Ferguson, when asked regarding the matter today, said: "It is true that I was appealed to in the matter, several gentlemen from Oklahoma City calling on me and presenting the case. I referred the matter to the attorney General Roberts, who, I believe, held that the territory had no jurisdiction except in a general way. "It seems to be a case where the district court of Oklahoma county, of which Hamer is himself an officer, has absolute jurisdiction. I have known of several cases of dismissal of county officials in the territory for cause, without any connection in the affair by the territory or its officers. If there is anything in this case, it is for the county to take care of it in the district court."

PARDONS ARE GRANTED. Governor Restores Convicts to Citizenship at Close of Terms. Guthrie, O. T., Nov. 9.—The following citizenship pardons were granted by Governor Ferguson to Oklahoma convicts, serving sentences in the penitentiary, at Lansing, Kan., the same being granted on the warden of that institution: William Wheeler, Lincoln county, burglary for two years. Ah-tah-ah-waker, from Caddo county, larceny, two years. Dick Diller, Oklahoma county, larceny, two years. John Coffield, from Lincoln county, attempt to commit suicide, two years. Harry Waterford, Canadian county, shooting with intent to kill, three years. William Wheeler, Lincoln county, burglary in the second degree, two years.

IN STATEHOOD FIGHT. Prominent Republicans Will Give Aid to Delegate McGuire. Guthrie, O. T., Nov. 9.—Prominent Republicans of Oklahoma will assist Delegate McGuire in his fight for statehood, at Washington this winter. A permanent organization is now being effected to send a strong body to congress to work for immediate statehood, and numbers among its members Ex-Governor A. J. Sany, of Kingfisher, Ex-Governor C. M. Barnes, of this city, Sidney Clarke, of Oklahoma City, and Colonel H. E. Hayes, of Enid, the latter two gentlemen having served several terms in the lower house of the national congress. This movement insures a hard working body of prominent Oklahomans in the national capital during the coming session, who will work early and late, with excellent chances of success, for the admission of the territory.

LAW AGAINST LOTTERY. Judge Hainer Calls Attention to Certain Investment Companies. Pawnee, O. T., Nov. 9.—In delivering his charge to the grand jury last week Judge Hainer called their attention particularly to the operations of certain investment companies promoting outside speculations which came under the law against lottery. He further instructed the county attorney to follow up on the grand jury's investigations, and whenever the facts warranted to bring suit and one child.
