

RAILROAD INSTALLS SUPPLY HOUSE HERE

New Department Employs 12 Men to Begin.

MORE WILL BE ADDED

Missouri Pacific Increases Its Pay Roll Materially.

Yesterday the Missouri Pacific Railroad company established a supply house in their yards at this city, which will give work to twelve men, and from present indications this force of men will have to be increased later to 25. The new department in giving employment to twelve persons will increase the monthly pay roll of the company here about \$500 per month.

From this house all of the trains that leave Wichita will draw their supplies, and from the large amount of traffic done by the company out of Wichita their present store room will have to be enlarged so that they can conveniently handle the large amount of work that will be done by this department.

In this house will be kept all of the train supplies for both passenger and freight trains, such as torpedoes, tins, oil, etc. A record has to be kept of all that goes out, and this is no small job. More trains are leaving the city now than ever before in the history of the company's business in this city.

For the past few years the Missouri Pacific has been moving industries to Wichita from different places in Kansas and this only shows that this city is considered by the company as one of the most important points on the line.

Heretofore these supplies have been kept at different places along the line, and the trains would get their supplies at those points as they passed through. One of these places was near Lawrence, and this has been established their supply house in Wichita, the trains will leave the city fully equipped and thus be able to do away with other stops which have heretofore been necessary.

IS GREATLY DISAPPOINTED.

Supposed Gold Turns Out to Be Mica.

Will Ingalls, who is employed by the W. S. Payne Fruit and Produce company, for a short time yesterday thought he had struck gold and immediately began to build air castles on the strength of his supposed finding.

The company for which Mr. Ingalls works recently received a shipment of mica from Colorado and it usually arrives here covered with dirt. It was while Ingalls was engaged in washing the mica that he saw a small shining speck in the dirt and at once concluded it was gold. He became greatly excited and called to his employer and showed him what he had found in the mica. At the same time telling him what a good proposition it would be to form a stock company, go to Colorado and buy up this mica ground and begin mining on it.

Mr. Payne quietly listened to his harangue and watched the process of washing out the supposed gold, which turned out to be a small piece of mica.

Mr. Ingalls' fond hopes failed to materialize and he is now fully aware of the fact that he is not gold that glitters.

ASSAY IS RECEIVED.

Or is Very Valuable at a Depth of Five Feet.

E. E. Harvey yesterday received the assayer's certificate of an assay recently made on ore taken from the claims located in the Wichita mountains. The report shows that gold and silver to the amount of \$9 was taken from the ore, and from a mine located farther north ore assaying gold and silver to the amount of \$19 a ton was taken out.

The fact that a hole only five feet deep has been dug on the claims makes the prospects, indeed, very good that at the Wichita mountains. This report shows that gold and silver will be found in much larger quantities.

Thus far the work on the claims has been confined to uncovering leads and digging holes on the mine five feet deep and seven feet wide. This is required to be done by the mining district for the first five years. In order to hold a claim \$10 worth of improvements must be made on the mine, and the work thus far has been done in conformity to this requirement.

Mr. Harvey's claim lies at the extreme south of the body of land being worked by the Elk Mining company and north of it is the claim of C. W. Harvey of Lawton. All of these claims are five feet deep. Gold and silver in larger quantities has been taken from all three of the mines.

In the assays that were made gold is valued at \$20 per ounce and silver at 80 cents per ounce. The assay on Mr. Harvey's claim was made by J. A. Beam of Lawton and showed that one-fifth of an ounce of gold was found and ten ounces of silver, making a total value of \$190.

The assay of the other two claims was made by W. P. Gulick of Lawton, and from C. W. Harvey's mine gold and silver to the value of \$20 was found, while from the Gillispie mine, which lies farther north, at the same depth showed \$5 in gold and \$15 in silver, or a total of \$20 to the ton. From the fact that a mine owned by the Big Four Mining company only showed \$1 per ton at a depth of 15 feet and at 30 feet shows \$3 per ton an idea may be gained as to the probable value of this mine.

Taken from the present indications it will exceed in value the best mines of the Big Four Mining company, which are considered very valuable.

The mines mentioned above are all individual property. The Elk Mining company, in which a number of Wichita business men are interested, have fifteen claims which lie to the north of these claims. The work of uncovering the leads on these claims is progressing rapidly, and in a short time shafts will be sunk on all three. From the assays that have been made it is shown that the claims are more valuable the farther north they are, and the claims of the Elk company are considered by experts to be the most valuable in the mountains. The assays say the ore will be worked by the Cyanide process, which is the cheapest known, and when this process is used low grade ore is a paying proposition. Mines which turn out ore at \$20 per ton have, under this process, paid big dividends. The Homestake mine of Dakota gives \$3.85 per ton and has paid \$100,000,000 in dividends. The Elk company is fully organized, and in a short time will put stock on the market at a very low figure which will be preferred and desirable. Lawton at this time is experiencing quite a boom. People are flocking in there from all over the country. A company has been organized and will build an electric line from Lawton to the mines. A big smelting works is figuring on locating there and it is understood that a cash bonus has been offered to the company, which has been a good inducement and it is expected that the company will soon begin work on this plant.

TO BOWL THURSDAY NIGHT.

Standing of Clubs in Southwestern League.

Bowling enthusiasts of Wichita are very much interested in the games that are to be played next Thursday evening in this city on the Vencedora alleys with the Perry bowling team. The Perry team, since it was defeated by the local team on its home alleys, has been greatly strengthened and is coming here with the expectation of retrieving the defeats administered by the home team. These teams are both members of the southwestern bowling league, which is composed of six clubs.

A schedule has been arranged and fifteen games have been played under it. At the present time the local team leads the league, having won twelve games and lost three.

These games have all been played on foreign alleys and when the team plays at home it will no doubt be able to do better work. A prize of \$25 in money and a silver smoking cup, donated by the Crawford, Metzger and Chuby company of Dayton, Ohio, will be given to the team making the best record.

IS SPENDING \$10,000 FOR IMPROVEMENTS

Telephone Company Connects Eight New Toll Lines.

HAS 2,000 SUBSCRIBERS

Concern Employs 40 Operators to Manage Service.

Ten thousand dollars is the amount of money now being expended by the Wichita Telephone company toward building a more complete and extensive telephone system since the original lines were installed during the first three months the company did business in this city.

The sum named in the foregoing is not being expended exclusively for the purpose of extending the lines in this city, but for placing complete connections with the surrounding towns, which will be a great convenience, particularly for the wholesale and jobbing houses here, as well as the merchants of these towns.

"We have just connected new lines with the Wichita service at Andale, Mt. Hope, Cowden, Malze, Garden Plain, St. Mark, and by Saturday night will have a direct wire to Hutchinson connected up and ready for use," said Superintendent McVay last evening. "Heretofore," he added, "it has been necessary to reach Hutchinson, Okla., via Newton. When we get through with the improvements inside of the city," continued the superintendent, "there will not be a street of any length that is not equipped with a cable. We can install a telephone for any one at almost any place within the city limits. We expect to have all improvements completed and in working order by December 1."

The work of connecting all new lines with the central exchange has been going on for about one week. Since that time the number of operators has been increased from about 25 to 35 girls. When all are finished December 1 there will be forty operators in the employ of the company. It will require that number to manage the many toll and local calls which come in over the system daily.

The number of subscribers has increased from 1,000 to 2,000 since the work of building the new lines commenced. When finished the company will have about 2,100 telephones in service, or more than any other city of the same size, so far as is known, in the country. The company has between 60 and 70 people in its employ, including the 35 operators told about in the above.

R. R. COLEMAN IS HERE.

Mrs. Robert Dennis Arrived in City for a Visit.

Mrs. Robert Dennis, formerly Miss Daisy Lynch, now of St. Louis, but formerly of Wichita, arrived in the city yesterday for a four day's visit with her parents and other relatives. Mrs. Dennis is accompanied by her brother-in-law, R. R. Coleman, who is on his way home at Prescott, Ariz., from a trip to New York city.

Mr. Coleman is the man who built the Wichita & Western railroad, now a part of the Santa Fe system, between this city and Kingman.

TOE WAS MASHED.

Brake Beam Fell on L. T. Cowles' Foot.

L. T. Cowles, who is employed in the yard of the Missouri Pacific Railroad company in this city, met with an accident yesterday.

He was engaged in disconnecting a brake beam which became loosened suddenly and fell on Mr. Cowles' foot, mashing one of his toes.

An ambulance was summoned and he was taken to the Wichita hospital where the injured member was treated.
