

TWO RAILROADS MAY CONSOLIDATE

Civil Engineers Survey Terminals of Frisco.

AND THE ROCK ISLAND

Blue Prints Will Be Made of Properties.

No sooner had Civil Engineers Albin and Wounder, employees of the Frisco railway, returned to their headquarters at Springfield, Ill., after being in Wichita several days, during which time they took bearing for the making of blue print plans for the company's park at this place, than they were sent back to Wichita. This time on an order to survey the terminals of both the Frisco and Rock Island railroads. The men worked all day yesterday on the Frisco's holdings and this morning a survey of the Rock Island's property will be made.

With the commencement of this work the employees of the two roads are making many speculations as to what the result will be. Said one: "I believe they are going to consolidate the two roads and do the business through one terminal."

"They can't, there is too much business. The only manner in which the two roads can consolidate and transact the business of the two companies successfully and conveniently, is to use one terminal for the freight department and the other for the passenger business."

These and many other conjectures on the part of the employees as to what the result of the survey will be, are heard frequently.

A complete drawing of blue print plans will be the result of the survey. Everything belonging to the Rock Island and Frisco railroads within the city limits is included in the survey. Side tracks, passenger stations, freight depots, section houses, coal chutes, and all out-buildings, no matter how small, in addition to these, the ground owned by the companies is being surveyed.

The instruction to the civil engineers came from the general offices of the Frisco. From that it would appear that it was the Frisco instead of the Rock Island which did the buying. Ever since a deal was made between the two roads it has been the opinion of every one that the Rock Island bought the Frisco.

When the survey is completed the orders to the engineers call for blue print plans of the two terminals.

RUNS INTO TRAIN.

Box Car Shoved on Maine Line Damages Engine Cab.

The mixed train which runs on a branch of the Santa Fe line between this place and Englewood, collided with a box car last night just as the train was entering the yards in the vicinity of the freight depot. One side of the engine cab was demolished and some damage was done to the boiler. Fortunately the Englewood train had come to a standstill and the box car was not running very fast or the damage might have been more serious. The box car was being switched by a Santa Fe crew when it was shoved over a sidetrack to the main line. It immediately came to a standstill when the collision occurred and the passengers said they did not even feel the effects of the coming together. The engineer of the Englewood train narrowly escaped injury however, as that part of the cab looked in the one in which he has his seat.

any great change within the next twenty-four hours, and that he does not look for snow to fall in this city, and all the incoming trains from both east and west are covered with snow, and the trainmen have been telling of the heavy snow storm that prevails in Eastern Kansas.

It was reported that a severe storm was raging in Northern Kansas yesterday and that it was blowing this way and that within a short time a cold wave would strike Wichita. George T. Todd, in charge of the local weather bureau, said there was no such a storm and that the snow fall in the past twenty-four hours has been very light.

A fall of one-half an inch at Concordia was the heaviest in the state, and one inch at Springfield. Most was the heaviest snow fall in the contiguous states.

Cloudy, threatening weather is general east of the 105th meridian, upon which Denver, Colo., is situated, and clear weather west of it. Snow was falling at the morning observation at St. Louis and Little Rock.

Light precipitation has been general in the past twenty-four hours over Nebraska, Kansas, Missouri, Oklahoma and Arkansas.

There has been a slight rise in temperature over the eastern Rocky Mountain slope, from Nebraska to the Gulf.

The minimum in temperature during the past twenty-four hours at Wichita was 24 degrees; the maximum 29 degrees.

THAT STORM SEWER.

IS SHORT CHANGED ON FRISCO TRAIN

Charles Taylor Is Arrested for Serious Offense.

W. A. DAVIS LOSES MONEY

Ten Dollar Certificate Turns Out to Be a One.

W. A. Davis, an elderly man of 55 or 60 years and a total stranger in this part of the country, was short changed out of \$9 while on the east-bound Frisco passenger train due to arrive here yesterday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock. The matter was reported to the police and Charles Taylor a news agent was arrested and placed in the city jail, charged with the offense. Last evening the matter was adjusted by Taylor returning the \$9 to Davis and depositing \$10 for costs in the case. He was then permitted to go free.

Davis, accompanied by a 17-year-old son, is en route from Idaho to Wilber, O. T., where he intends making his home with a sister. He tells the following story as to how he lost his money:

"I became quite well acquainted with the young man, Taylor, while en route to Wichita. He allowed me to read some of his magazines and we conversed together frequently. Just before arriving in this city, where I had to change cars, Taylor asked me to let him have a \$10 bill for some silver. I handed him the ten and he counted out the silver to me. He lacked considerable of having \$10. He appeared surprised that he did not have the required amount, and I returned the silver to him. He gave me back the bill. I stuck it in my pocket. It is all I have. About an hour after the time of arrival I had occasion to pay for a small purchase. I drew the bill from my pocket and was surprised to find that it was nothing but a \$1 certificate. I reported the matter to the police and Taylor was arrested."

When caught by the police Taylor was at the passenger station awaiting the departure of the west-bound train to go out on another run.

He at first denied having come in on the train that Davis did, also that he ever saw the man before. Davis, however, is positive that Taylor is the man who short-changed him and Taylor was locked up last night Taylor agreed to make Davis' loss good and the former will not be prosecuted.

"I don't care to prosecute the man," said Davis, "all I want is my money back. I am poor and am anxious to finish my trip. I understand it would require some time if I passed the charge against Taylor."
