Wichita is coming to be known as a city of sumptuous feasts, but the banquet given at the Hamilton last night in honor of Hon. J. C. Pollock, of the federal court; Judge Dale, of the district court of this county, who will retire next Monday, and Hon. Thomas C. Wilson, who will take his place on the bench of the district court, by the Sedgwick county bar, will long be remembered as one of the brilliant events in the history of the city.

The Hamilton is gaining fame for its banquets, but that of last night excelled them all. The banquet hall fairly glittered in magnificent splendor. There were great banks of palms and evergreens in the center of the room and halls leading to it. Large circles of evergreen, bespangled with incandescent lights that sparkled like brilliant diamonds in a dense forest, hung from the ceiling and entwined the massive pillars midway of the hall. The table was lavishly decorated with carnations and other beautiful flowers too numerous to mention. Added to this were the guests in full dress, seated around the outer side of an immense table in the shape of a letter L.

At a smaller table in the triangle formed by the larger table sat the toastmaster of the occasion, Hon. C. V. Ferguson, with Judge Pollock on his right and Judge Dale on his left. Judge Wilson sat at the right of Judge Pollock, and around the table were the committee appointed by the bar, Judge Stiles, County Attorney Otto Eckstein and Kos Harris. Judge Hook had been invited, but failed to attend, and his chair at the center table was left vacant.

According to a Los Angeles, Cal., newspaper, Miss Allie Fitz, formerly of this city, but who now lives at that place, is the heroine of an attempt made by a purse-snatcher to steal her pocketbook. The following is the story:

"Within sight of a score of people, a hold robbery was committed late Saturday night at the corner of Third and Hill streets. Miss Allie Fitz, telephone operator at Hotel Van Nuys, Broadway, was the victim, and the man who robbed her was captured in less than two minutes and positively identified.

"Miss Fitz was en route to her home, and had reached the corner of Third and Hill streets and waited a moment for a car to pass. She had noticed a man close behind her, but paid no attention to him. When she stopped to arrange upon her and a small sum of money, and tried to wrench it from her hand, she struggled with him and screamed, but he secured her purse; not, however, until she had an opportunity to get a good look at him.

"The thief ran east along Third street toward Broadway, and a young man named Duffrey, who had witnessed the robbery, gave chase. The thief did not know that he was being pursued until he had crossed Broadway, and then he dropped the purse. Duffrey caught him before he got to Spring street, seized him around the body and called for assistance. Within ten feet stood Detectives Kelly and Jones and they at once took charge of both men. It took but a moment for Duffrey to explain that his prisoner was a purse-snatcher, and when the officers took him back toward the scene of the robbery the purse was found just where Duffrey had seen him throw it.

"The prisoner was taken to Third and Hill streets, where Miss Fitz promptly and positively identified him. Then he was taken to jail. He gave the name of H. Newton, but that name he believed to be assumed. The prisoner would make no statement about the case, nor would he tell anything about himself, where he came from, where he resided or how long he had been in the city. He will be prosecuted on a charge of grand larceny."

Miss Fitz is well known in Wichita, having lived here for many years. She was a telegraph operator, employed in the main offices of the Western Union at this place for some time. Later she was employed in that capacity at the Hotel Carey. She went to California a short time ago, hoping to benefit her health.

For Congressional Convention at Wichita March

A delegate convention of the Republicans of the seventh congressional district of the state of Kansas is hereby called to meet in the city of Wichita, Kan., Tuesday, March 8, 1904, at 2 o'clock p. m., for the purpose of nominating a candidate for congress. The basis of representation in said convention shall be one delegate for each 20 votes and fraction of half or more cast for Chester T. Ford for congress in 1902, and one delegate-at-large for each county; provided that no county shall have less than two delegates, and provided that Ford county shall have one additional vote by reason of the vote of the Old Soldiers' Home, under which rule delegates are apportioned to the various counties as follows:
