## AUDUBON

By GEORGE FITCH

The pinnacles of fame have become pretty well crowded during the last forty-two centuries and for many years it has been almost impossible to discover one which is not crowded with gentlemen who have swarmed up out of obscurity and attached themselves to history with grips which even death and reform cannot shake.

The encyclopedias are congested with the records of men who have become famous by heaving their way through the enemy or by constructing melodious and durable poetry or by penning breathless romances, or by carrying the same congressional district twelve times in succession. Men have hoisted themselves out of the city directory and into "Who's Who" by hundreds of methods. They have devised new religions and have been barbecued in the interests of the same. They have fought Indians and grafters. They have invented sewing machines, steam engines and airships. Men have risen to immortal fame on the wings of faith, cherubim and monoplanes, but only one man has risen very far on the wings of birds. Audubon is about as famous as any of the rest and adopted this novel process long before Wilbur Wright was born.



Audubon was born in Louisiana, May 4th, 1780, and when he set out to break into the hall of fame he found that all of the best known jimmies were in use. Besides he didn't know how to use them. He couldn't fight, he couldn't write poetry, he couldn't carry a precinct, let alone a state, and he could not invent rotary gasoline engines nor non-refilling bottles. The case seemed hopeless. But audubon was no ordinary man. And when a man isn't ordinary, he

can't be stopped by ordinary means. Every morning Audubon was awakened in his Louisiana home by 37 varieties of birds. This gave him an idea. Instead of shooting them, he resolved to introduce the birds of America to the American people. It took Audubon many years to do this, but he finally accomplished the task in several large quarto volumes beautifully illustrated. When he had finished, the birds of America were better known than the poets, and Audubon was balanced on a large and commodious pinnacle all by himself. This teaches those of us who are still unfamiliar and are inclined to law it to stiff competition, that there is more than one way to rise—and that when the elevator is not running, the resourceful man will try the lightning rod.

## PLANS PROGRAM OF EVANGELICAL BOARD MEETING

Several hundred people are expected to attend the annual meeting of the Board of the Hawaiian Evangelical Association which will be held at Lihue, Kauai, July 10-16. They will participate in one of the most comprehensive programs ever arranged by a local organization.

Plans for the convention have not been fully completed as yet and will not be formally announced until the first day of the convention at Lihue. Annual reports of the various committees will be read and other business transacted while a quartette, specially trained under the direction of Fred Butler will furnish the music. The quartette, which will sing daily at the sessions will consist of Messrs. Frank Murray, Akana, Theodore Richards and Fred Butler.

Rev. W. B. Oleson, secretary of the association, will read his annual report on Hawaii and P. C. Jones, president of the board will make his annual report and at the same time tender his resignation. Mr. Jones' resignation comes from his desire to retire from active business and social life and according to members of the board will be accepted with much regret.

### MAINE LOBSTERS.

Never before in the history of the lobster pound on the Maine coast, and that means in twenty years, have the lobsters in the pounds come through the winter as well as they have this year, says the Lewiston "Journal." The cause is found in the severe winter. All the pounds have been frozen up and the ice on the water has been many inches in thickness. As a result the lobsters have been in the dark during the cold months and have not crawled. When they do not crawl they do not fight as much, so they have passed the winter quietly and have grown and are now in the best of condition.

### PUBLIC WIRELESS FOR PHILIPPINES

Governor General Gilbert has taken up with Major General Bell the subject of allowing the public the use of the wireless station in Manila until such time as the bureau of posts shall have its own station in working order.

General Bell has taken the matter under consideration and it is expected that in a few weeks the question will be decided.

### RUSSIANS FOR HAWAII AWAIT TRANSPORTATION

A cable from Commissioner Dr. V. S. Clark of the Territorial Department of Immigration received yesterday by Secretary Kearns, informs the department that there are 82 Russians at Kobe, Japan, awaiting transportation to Hawaii. Dr. Clark recommends that the steamship companies be authorized to bring them over. It is not believed that these Russians represent the result of Dr. Clark's recruiting work. On the contrary, it is thought they are Russians who have friends and relatives in the Islands and who were gathered there under the old arrangement with a labor agency.
