HONOLULU may be said to have had another representative at the Olympic games besides Duke Kahanamoku. Harry Norton, the sixteen-year-old stowaway who was given his passage on the Finland in view of his resolve to get there somehow, used to live in this city. He came as a stowaway some years ago on the Oceanic liner Sierra and after his first trip, came here and worked for some months.

Norton started on his adventurous career by leaving Toledo, his home city, when he was nine years old, sneaking aboard a passenger train, hiding under the seat and going to Milwaukee. From Milwaukee he worked his way around the country by all the methods known to the common or garden variety of tramp. He got to be an expert at "riding the rods" and was at home in a "side-door Pullman," as Trampdom calls the freight empties.

Los Angeles held the fickle affections of the thirteen-year-old until the following April. He worked in a factory and a shoe store during the four months. Then he threw up his job and headed for San Francisco, paying his fare on the train for the first time

in his pleasure jaunts. A sea voyage was the prospect which struck his fancy, so he stowed away one Saturday morning in a first-class stateroom on the steamship Sierra. He was not discovered until Monday, when a stewardess going into the room for an extra pillow found an extremely seasick youth. They tried to get rid of him by leaving him in Honolulu, which was the destination of the boat, but the boy didn't like the prospect of being a permanent resident there and they found him still on board when the boat was a couple of hundred miles out in the Pacific. Norton took quite a liking to the sea as a result of this voyage and signed up with a ship's crew going to Alaska. He claims to have been an apprentice with the Pacific Coast Steamship Company for a number of months and says that Port Captain Hibben of that line took upon himself the responsibility of being his guardian.
