## BUCKEYE CLUB HOLDS MEETING

Adopt Resolutions on Death of Rev. Charles Simpson, Ohio Pastor

Members of the Buckeye Club of the Ohio society of Honolulu held their regular meeting last evening at the home of W. A. Bowen. With the president, Rev. W. D. Westervelt absent in Australia, and the vice president, Paul Super on the high seas returning from the mainland, the meeting was called to order by the secretary, Mrs. Weedon, after which the Rev. W. B. Olson was asked to preside for the evening.

Following the reading of a paper by Dr. Whitney on a trip to Australia and New Zealand, Professor and Mrs. Jewett of Oberlin, O. were called upon. Mrs. Jewett was born in the island, leaving when she was 14 years old, and has but recently returned. Her comparison of conditions existing then and now proved very interesting. Several visiting Ohioans were recognized with honorary memberships and it was determined that the subject to be discussed at the next meeting would be that of the new constitution proposed for Ohio.

Before the meeting adjourned for refreshments, W. A. Bowen offered the following resolution in honor of the late Rev. Charles Simpson, pastor-in-law of Mrs. Frank C. Atherton and an Ohioan, which was adopted:

Resolved, That the members of the Buckeye Club of Honolulu wish to make special note of his departure, and our permanent records, therefore be it hereby, Resolved, that the members of the Buckeye Club of Honolulu, and others here assembled, do now express our sense of loss of friend and brother, the death of Rev. Charles Simpson, and instruct our secretary to convey to his family our deep sympathy and love.

## ROCK DISCOVERS NEW TREE ON HAWAII

HILO, Hawaii, July 26.—Once more has the island of Hawaii blossomed into the limelight as being the home country of a new species of tree. Professor Joseph F. Rock, the well-known botanist attached to the department of agriculture, and the College of Hawaii staff, has found an absolutely new genus of tree growing in the vicinity of Twenty-Nine Miles.

During last February when Rock was on the island before, he ran across the tree but could not ascertain then whether or not the genus was new, as the trees were not bearing. Now, however, he has secured blossoms and can state definitely that the trees are not at the present time known to the botanical world.

There are only three trees, two of them males and the other female. He will make a microscopic study on his return to Honolulu and will give the genus a name.

## MODERN SURGERY SAVES WILLIE LUDLOFF'S LEG

Willie Ludloff, who was badly injured in a collision between an automobile and a street car last Saturday, is doing nicely in the Queen's Hospital. It is believed now that, not only will his leg be saved, but that he will not even be a cripple from the accident. The broken parts of the thigh bone were brought together by means of a steel plate applied in a method of surgery now coming into much vogue, the results so far giving promise that the limb will be restored to normal shape and soundness.

## MOKUAWEOWEOWE NOT ACTIVE

In order to ascertain whether or not the unusual activity of Kilauea was affecting in any way the crater of Mokuaweoweowe, Dr. Day, one of the volcano experts now located at the volcano house paid a visit to the higher up crater during last week.

He found that Mokuaweoweowe was unusually quiet and not at all affected by the wonderful activity displayed in the crater ruled over by Madame Pele.

This seems more or less to refute the popular idea that the two volcanoes are connected, and that when one is active it affects the other. Further trips will be made to Mokuaweoweowe from time to time and a careful tab will be kept on its happenings in connection with those of Kilauea.—Hawaii Herald.
